'FIGHTING' BOB DEFENDANT IN SLANDER SUIT

Pastor of Los Angeles Labeled Deputy Sheriff, Claim.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20.—Rev. R. P. "Fighting Bob" Shuler, the radio-broadcasting pastor of Trinity Methodist Episcopal church, was named defendant in another slander suit today when he was charged with libeling the deputy sheriff who killed John Hawkins, Folsom convict, in a jail break.

The action was brought by attorney for Deputy A. F. "Casey" Jones, who claimed that the Rev. Shuler had broadcast that the shooting of Hawkins was "deliberate" murder. The church and radio station KPEF was named as co-defendants with Shuler in the \$150,000 suit.

Hawkins was wounded fatally in the county jail elevator a month ago when he and Robert "Zeke" Hayes, another life termer, attempted to escape. Jones was wounded in the gun fight.

Rev. Shuler was charged with broadcasting that Hawkins and Hayes were given the gun so that they both could be shot down. The pastor was alleged to have told his congregation that Frank Dewar, then jailer, planned the asserted "frameup".

Rev. Shuler faces trial in municipal court on a charge of libeling the fourth degree of the Knights of Columbus through publication of an alleged oath in pre-circulation pamphlets. The pastor played Almerie Semple McPherson after her "kidnaping" and the police during the William Edward Hickman hunt.

Loreman Tells of Geological Formations Indicating Oil May Be Found in Klamath Basin

Editor's Note—This is the first of a series of articles to inform the readers of the paper of the work being done in Klamath county by the Bonanza Oil company in an attempt to develop a resource which they believe is here. J. E. Loreman is geologist with the firm. Other articles will tell of the formation which the geologist states is in Klamath county, and of the activities of the company.

Twenty-two years ago J. E. Loreman, prominent merchant of this county, discovered indications of oil in a well being dug for him near Bonanza. He was interested enough to secure the services of a geologist, who spent almost an entire summer in a preliminary survey as to the possibility of oil production in that section. This geologist's report was very favorable, but owing to inadequate transportation facilities, no tests were started in that territory until about 1921.

Later prospective activity in other sections of Klamath county, however, brought into this county J. E. Loreman, who was at that time checking up on geological conditions in Oregon and Washington.

Attends University—In a recent interview with Mr. Loreman he stated that he was born in Hoodsburg, Penn., July 14, 1876; moved with his parents to York county, Nebraska, 1878; no schooling except by his mother until fourteen years old; went to school part of the three months winter term when he could be spared from the ranch and range. Entered university at Lincoln, Neb., in 1894, finished in 1898 with two degrees, geologist and mineral engineer. He adopted the geological engineering branch of science as it afforded a wider range for travel with outdoor life, which he felt he was more adapted to, he said.

His geological research work has afforded him the opportunity to travel in every state in the union, including Alaska, every province in Canada, and four countries in South America.

Been in Many Fields—He served in the geological survey of Kansas and Oklahoma under Charles M. Gould, scout for Prairie Oil and Gas company. He was field geologist for Shafter Brothers Oil and Refining company in Montana; chief geologist for the Heffell and Elder Oil & Gas company of Calgary, Alberta. He located and supervised the drilling of the first producing well in the Okotuk field in Alberta. This also was the first producing well in the province.

Located Cat Creek Field—He further states that he located in 1912 the Fort Norman oil field in the McKuskie river basin in northern Alberta; this is the furthestmost northern producing field in the world. He located and mapped the Cat Creek field in Montana, now a great producing area, in 1916, four years before he could induce any interests to drill it. Mapped the Sunburst field in Toot county, Montana, two years before production was brought in. It was through his reports and recommendations that the discovery of the Bonanza anticline.

Finds Complete Structure—This structure is complete in every detail, the formations exposed on the top of the structure axis is the middle Miocene of the tertiary system of the cenozoic age. The structure is fully enclosed with impervious formations so that if oil once accumulated it could not escape. The collecting area is so large as to afford big producing wells. Mr. Loreman says. The formations are of the kind that produce more than 50 per cent of the oils of the United States. He has been much encouraged in the work he has done in the location of the Bonanza anticline, he says. This work has been checked by such eminent and nationally known geologists as Dr. W. R. Hayward of Santa Barbara, Calif., Dr. F. R. Stoner of Tulsa, Okla., and the noted geologist and mining engineer, L. S. Barnes of Los Angeles. All of these eminent men have pronounced that in their opinion this structure was one of the most favorable for the production of oil.
