The Klamath Falls branch of the Oregon State Motor Association advised that the roads to Spokane are in poor condition, with snow between Walla Walla and Colfax and water flooding the roads via Pasco and Riverville. The latter route is advised however. On this route traffic is all getting through and the water is not offering any great amount of difficulty. Considerable snow is found around Spokane. The Columbia River is still frozen over and none of the ferries are running. For this reason travel to Central and Eastern Washington is being routed via Pendleton and Walla Walla.
