PELICANS AND MEDFORD PLAY THIS EVENING

Fastest High School Team in Southern Oregon to Play Here.

The ability of the fast Pelicans will be tested tonight when the classy and fast Medford High School team invades the Pelicans court at 8 p. m.

Coach Carlson feels that this will be a good warm up game for his boys before entering the high school tournament.

The Medford Hi is considered the best high school team in Southern Oregon and possibly the state and hope to win over the undefeated Pelicans who have taken on the best in the valley this season.

The boys from Pelican won their twenty third victory from Alturas Saturday night 75 to 21. Alturas had won 15 straight games up to that time. In the twenty three games the Pelicans have scored 1197 points to their opponents 531.

Red Wanner who has an unusual knack of locating the hoop has scored 376 points, enough to win a league championship, with Peterson following with 250 and Louie Anderson possessing 205. The other players are well up in the scoring with from 20 to 150.

NOTED RUNNER WINNER AGAIN

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 22, (A.P.)—Percy Williams' flying feet have brought him to the Canadian National indoor 60-yard championship in record-equalling time.

The slim Vancouver sprinter, Olympic 100 and 200 meter champion, was beaten in one of the trial heats of the 60-yards at the Canadian National indoor track and field championships here last night but came back to win the final in 6 and one-fifth seconds, equalling the world's record.

In the semi-finals, Williams, off to a bad start, was second by half a foot to G. D. Powell, of Toronto, a comparative unknown. Powell failed to place in the final, Jimmy Fitzpatrick of Hamilton, being second and L. Miller of Hamilton third.

HOUSE REFUSES TO PASS GAME FISH MEASURE

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 22, (A.P.)—The first round of a biennial battle of the fish was won by the commercial fishermen Thursday afternoon when the lower house failed to pass Peter's bill making the steelhead trout a game fish in all the waters of the state.

After nearly two hours of hot debate with the advocates of the commercial fishing industry claiming that the passage of the bill would ruin the third largest industry in the state and the sportsmen and their supporters equally insistent that the steelhead is a game fish and should be retained as such, the vote was called for twenty-nine members of the house voted against the bill. With two absentees this was a sufficient number to kill the bill.

OREGON TRAIL HIGHWAY OPEN

Detour Built Around Section Which is Flooded.

THE DALLES, Ore., Feb. 22, (A.P.)—The old Oregon Trail highway near Quentin was opened again yesterday when crews constructed a detour around the hillside, allowing traffic to pass around the quarter of a mile of flooded highway.

The detour was only temporary and it was feared that it wouldn't stand up longer under heavy traffic. Highway crews were rushed to the damaged road, where the surface was washed down to bed rock when a stream of water from three to six feet deep swept down from melting snow above.

A few cars got thru the ragged road-bed before the detour was finished, but four or five vehicles became stalled in the flood.

An Indian youth, with pony and lariat, made "skookum" money by pulling the cars up to the steering wheels in water, out of the flood. One motorist who mounted the roof of his car to keep from drowning fell into the swirling water and was rescued by the native and his horse.

INSANE LOVER MURDERS GIRL

Police Sergeant Says He Must Prove Devotion by Shooting.

EAST ORANGE, N. J., Feb. 22, (A.P.)—Margaret Bowes, 20, was instantly killed and her twin sister, Frances, seriously wounded when they were shot early today by Peter J. Mooney, sergeant of the Lackawanna railroad police.

After shooting the girls, Mooney shot himself over the heart. Frances and he were taken to the Orange Memorial hospital, both in a serious condition.

In Mooney's pocket was found a note, written in pencil, which said:

"Murder is the only way I can prove my love for this girl."

The shooting took place on Heddon place as the sisters were on their way to work.

Mooney, according to police, stepped up to Margaret, placed a revolver against her neck, and pulled the trigger twice. He then turned on Frances, police said, and fired two bullets into her body.

After the shooting, Mooney ran about a block before he turned the weapon on himself.

Mooney, the police, were told, had been a boarder in the home of the Bowes and had paid court to Margaret. Recently she had spurned his attentions.

The sisters were employed in a toy factory.
