DEATH HINTED IN QUEER NOTE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 22. (AP)—Squads of officers were dispatched to the ocean front near Venice early today after a note was delivered to District Attorney Byron Flint telling him to "fish for Calie where you fished for Aimee and you may find her." The note was believed to refer to the missing Mrs. Calie Grimes.

Mrs. Grimes disappeared recently and fear that she had been "made away with by guilty parties" was expressed by Deputy District Attorneys in charge of prosecution of seven underworld figures and police officers indicted by the grand jury following Mrs. Grimes' affidavit that she aided in "framing" Congressman Carl I. Jacobson more than a year ago on a morals charge.

Calver City police were sent to Baldwin Hill to search that district, while other officers were combing the ocean front. Calver City officers said that they had found nothing.

The note which precipitated the search was signed "Oxide". The search for Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, following her purported kidnaping in 1926 centered on the beach near Venice. The note at first was dismissed as a "frank" message, but a subsequent report to Calver City police that a woman answering Mrs. Grimes' description was seen in the Baldwin Hill district several days gave it weight.

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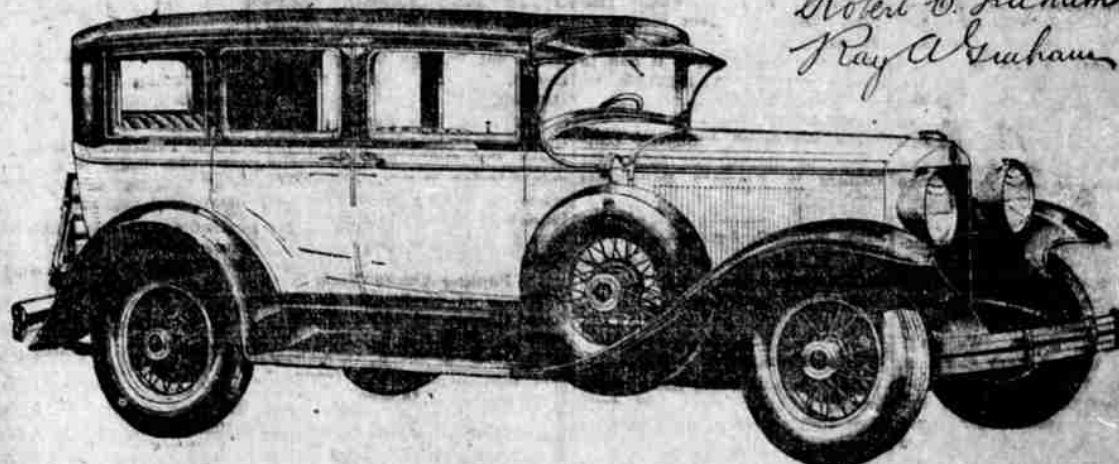
