Edison Says His Most Important Inventions Were Light and Power

CLEWISTON, Fla., Feb. 25.—Electric light and power were Edison's most important inventions. Radio is getting better all the time. Even the "cheaper sets" are pretty good," and the development of the telephoto process of picture transmission will be rapid.

These were the thoughts of Thomas A. Edison, 82-year-old wizard, as he sat on the steps of a home here while Mrs. Edison and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford (inside as luncheon guests of B. G. Dahlberg, president of the Southern Sugar company, whose plantation and sugar mill they had come to see).

Edison had come out into the warm sunshine unaccompanied. He looked tired as he strolled on the soft green lawn and studied the shrubs along the house. As he rested on the steps a bird dog bounded up and was rewarded by a pat.

A Botanist Now

A mile distant a giant sugar mill hungrily digested trainload after trainload of sugar cane, while the man who made the electric power possible toyed idly with a piece of shrub.

There was something in his squeezing of the shrub that suggested his quest for a plant with plastic fruit or rubber base. Nearly a group of local residents discussed the man and his work. The question of his most important invention was raised, and fifteen answers were offered by the fifteen people present until the man best qualified to settle the dispute was consulted.

"My most important invention," said Edison—"Oh, that was electric light and power. I had a lot of trouble with that, and spent a lot of time on it, too."
