LINE UP GOOD CARD FOR NEXT LEGION FIGHT

Washington Fighters Will Feature Fights on March 6th

Determined to stage a fight card which would more than make up for the failure of the last main event, the American Legion and boxing commission today announced the line-up of what appears to be one of the best balanced cards ever undertaken in Klamath Falls. It will be held March 6, in the Legion memorial hall.

Three boys with reputations as long as your arm, have been imported from Seattle, two from Aberdeen, two from Spokane and one from San Francisco. The fact that the fight came to Washington at this time has given Klamath the big chance to get good fighters at a reasonable price.

"Klamath fans at the last fight card showed that they were willing to support fights as long as they were conducted on the square," said Walter Waggoner, member of the boxing commission, and an ardent booster of the gentle art of glove and tape.

"We had a tough break when Nalls Gorman ran out of the main event at the last minute, but at that, we put on a pretty good card, considering the circumstances. However, not one fan asked for his money back when informed of the situation before the card started. Now we're going to try and do our part by staging some real bang-up fights for the boys."

The fight card is as follows: Joe "Spark Plug" Boyd, the Aberdeen terror, vs. Orville Durr, Spokane, ten round main event; light heavyweights.

Bob James, a good tough boy from Aberdeen, vs. Jack Broadlove of Bend, six round semi-main event; weight 152 pounds.

Strawhat Jackson, Spokane, who has met such boys as Ollie Neffham, Johnnie Walker and Buzzard Burnell (he defeated Burnell), will meet the well-known Ray Hoffman, in a four-round special event; weight 156 pounds.

Eddie Morris, San Francisco welterweight, who has met the sensational negro welter, Jack Thompson, will meet Joe Siegfist, who has met Sammy Mandell, and bears a good reputation.

Finally, the tough Roy Rose, who has yet to lose a fight in a Klamath ring, will tangle with a clever youngster from Seattle by the name of Pete Magallanes. They will weigh 128 pounds.

Without going into details about the respective records of each fighter, it does look as if it would be a great card. As usual, it will be sponsored by the American Legion.

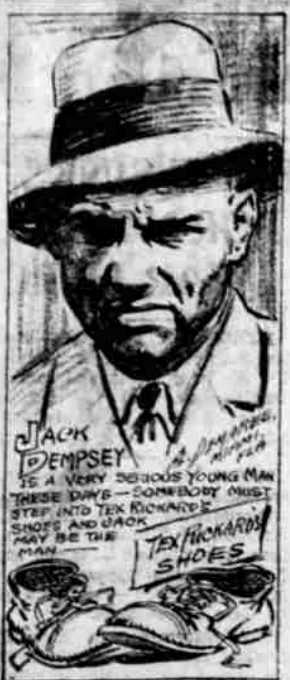

10 KNOCKOUTS FEATURE BOUTS

Amateur Fights in Portland Also Include 30 Knockdowns

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26. (A.P.)—Featured by ten knockouts and thirty knockdowns, the annual Pacific coast amateur boxing championships got under way last night. Thirty preliminaries were completed with the final bouts scheduled for tonight. Several thousand spectators, including a large number of women, witnessed the show. Martin Zundel, featherweight of the Los Angeles Athletic club and Eddie Volk, featherweight star of the Multnomah club, divided spotlight honors last night, each winning two fights. Zundel won both of his by knockouts. Volk taking one by the knockout route and the other on a close decision. Red Walker, University of Washington featherweight, also took two bouts, closing the bill with a sensational battle with Johnny Adams of the Portland gym. Walker taking the decision after the judges ordered an extra round.

Two Klamath Students Out for Practice

OREGON STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 26.—Two Klamath Falls men—John Montgomery, junior in vocational education and Arthur Gutanson, special in vocational education—were two of 80 men to be issued a suit for spring practice in football. Coach Paul J. Schisler, head football coach, is developing an offensive system of practice that is expected to be a problem of Oregon State opponents next fall. The men are now playing a group of inter-squad games in which Montgomery is a quarterback and Gutanson an end.

Every night the gridiron warriors go through their drill with a vigor that resembles that of fall practice. Many different combinations are used on the picked teams to accustom the men to each other's individual style of play. Coach Schisler believes in having at least two teams with either one capable of taking the field when occasion demands.

ODDS TEND TO FAVOR SHARKEY IN BIG FIGHT

Experts Pick Boston Gob As Winner of Battle Tomorrow

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 26. (AP)—The melodrama of Miami Beach, that strange and mysterious little affair left upon the sand dunes here by Tex Rickard, is moving toward its climax in a series of episodes that need only a little soft music, the strumming of a few guitars, to make the fantasy complete.

It is strange, yet also true, in its tropically colorful background and in its astonishing assurance of financial success, but still mystifying, is so far as who shot at Jack Dempsey yesterday just before the dawn, and what will happen in the ring when W. L. (Young) Stribling, the heavy-weight pride of the south, and Jack Sharkey, the Boston sailor, fight for ten rounds to a referee's decision at Flamingo Park tomorrow night.

No heavyweight "elimination" ever has had so fantastic a setting or a succession of such preliminary events as this, not even Tex Rickard, were he alive to see his boom venture near completion, would recognize the almost finished product of promotion and ballroom. Tex never would have "seen anything like it."

This is the south's first heavyweight fight of national interest since the palmy days of New Orleans as a fight center and few of those in the gathering here can recall that. This is also a major bid for fame by William Lawrence Stribling, 24-year-old Macon youth—the son of an acrobatic father and father of an acrobatic child, who has helped enlighten the training proceedings. Stribling, because he is to fight before a southern gallery of friends, relatives and admirers, is the sentimental favorite, the hope of Dixie, but Sharkey, the hard-punching sailor, is the choice of most of the assembled experts to win. Yet there is a wide divergence of critical opinion, not only because of so many conflicting developments in training but also because of the uncertain evidence in the records of the two fighters.

Sharkey, especially during the past few days, has appeared to better advantage than Stribling in the daily workouts. The Boston tar's punches have seemed more effective. He is probably ten pounds heavier and appears in better all-around condition. But Stribling, if he feels no ill effects from his rib-injury and has nothing the matter with his right hand, has a variety of weapons at his command. Always a skillful defensive boxer, Stribling's punching power seems greater. They are both fast and resourceful, though the Georgian is more apt to do the unexpected. Sharkey has poundage and experience against good men in his favor but Stribling has fought, rather than trained himself into condition. The betting, such as there has been of it, ranges from odds of 6 to 5 on Sharkey to even money. If there is any change in waging sentiment it probably will be in Sharkey's favor.

GIANT RUSSIAN FLATTENED BY FORMER CHAMP

NEW YORK, Feb. 26. (AP)—Strangler Lewis, ex-world's heavyweight wrestling champion, defeated Kola Kwariant, giant Russian, in a flimsy hmatch at the 71st armory here last night. Tossed out of the ring after an hour and 13 minutes of wrestling, the Russian could not continue and Lewis was awarded the decision.

ALICE HARVEY KLAMATH HIGH VALEDICTORIAN

Miss Alice Harvey, chosen valedictorian for the Klamath Union high school, has a scholastic standard of 95.3. After graduating this spring, Miss Harvey plans to enter either the University of Oregon or Washington.

Paavo Nurmi Was Ill, Says His Defender

NEW YORK, Feb. 26. (AP)—A defender has risen to espouse Paavo Nurmi's cause against the massed attack he brought down upon his head when he failed to appear for the championships last Saturday night.

Hugo Julst, the Finnish runner's one and only counselor, declares that Nurmi has been ill since the early part of this month and that it was only because he was in poor condition that he withdrew from the two mile steeplechase at the national championships. A. A. U. officials did not learn of the withdrawal until an hour before the race and promptly met and indefinitely suspended the famous Finn.

Julst scoffed at reports that Nurmi had withdrawn because he feared to try conclusions with his younger Finnish rival, Eino Purje who won the steeplechase and broke the world's record in doing it.

Purje knew that Nurmi was not going to run in the steeplechase on Friday afternoon, Julst said, and it was because of that knowledge, he maintains, that Purje himself decided to run in the two-mile flat event against Edwin Wild, of Sweden. Purje, according to Julst, was in Nurmi's room when the older runner penned a note to A. A. U. officials saying that he would not run.
