

LINE WILL BE FINISHED SOON

Line is of secondary main line construction—there would hardly be any purpose served in a main line construction because the road will be used primarily for freight purposes.

Mr. Roschke pointed out that it was too early to commence major grading work as yet on the Klamath end.

"The frost is eight or ten inches in the ground," he said, "and we must wait the thaw. After we get under way this spring, it will be comparatively clear sailing for the reason that most of the heavy rock work in Modoc county is finished."

The Utah Construction company holds the general construction contract on the new line and is assembling men for the purpose of rushing the project to early completion.

Ground for the Modoc Northern was broken last year and a large part of the project completed before winter snows necessitated a winter shut-down. From Klamath Falls, the road has been graded to Merrill; in fact some grading has been started south of Merrill.

As soon as weather permits the work will proceed and the grade will be thrown up along the west side of Tule lake and on south to Cornell, where the line swings eastward towards Alturas.

It must be admitted that without the dam, there would certainly be a lack of water on the Klamath project during the extremely dry years."
