STIRBLING AND SHARKEY MEET THIS EVENING

Expect Attendance of 35,000 at Big Ring Classic; Dope Favors Bostonian

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 27. (AP)—Fighting, rich in the traditions of daring promotion and unusual drama, promises a new and spectacular outburst today, if the weather be fair.

Amid scenes and surroundings that are a strange contrast to the old days when prize fighting was a fugitive game in the south, the wealthy and fashionable, the great and the near great of business and politics, of the pleasure grounds and the sports world, have gathered here for the ten-round heavyweight match tonight between Young Stribling and Jack Sharkey.

Big Plastic Show.

In one of the greatest plastic shows and the most spectacular sports event the Old South has ever known, Stribling, pride of Georgia and the pugilistic hope of Dixie, will box Sharkey, the hard hitting Boston sailor, for the right to battle for the crown that Gene Tunney has laid aside—to the winner may go the chance to meet the promoter of this remarkable affair, Jack Dempsey, for recognition as the heavyweight champion of the world.

Sharkey is the favorite to win. The betting odds early today favored around six to five and seven to five in his favor. The expert consensus likewise favors the chances of the rugged sailor but the lean son of Georgia is the sentimental favorite in the biggest test he has ever faced before the "home folks."

Expect 35,000 Attendance.

Close to 35,000 spectators, the capacity of the miniature edition of Boy's Thirty Acres in Flamingo Park, will see the youthful ring craft and wallop of Stribling pitted against the rugged defense and counter attack of the Bostonian.

Millions more will hear the details of the fray over a nationwide hookup of nearly sixty broadcasting stations, the greatest ever arranged for a fight and a remarkable evidence of widespread interest in a match that has itself no championship significance.

The promoters estimate that the "gate," at prices of \$5 to \$25, will be close to \$400,000. When the box office opened for its last day's business today, there was nearly \$350,000 in actual cash in hand, sufficient not only to pay Sharkey \$100,000 and Stribling a 20 per cent "cut" of about \$60,000, but also enough to assure the Madison Square Garden Corporation a profit of about \$100,000.

Stribling's Stock Slumps.
Stribling's stock slumped a trifle when it became known he had injured a rib and possibly his right hand, in a training session just a week before the fight. But his father-manager, "Pa" Stribling, his physician and his concluding workouts testify to the Georgian's readiness to put forth his best, without handicap.

Those who scan the "inside stuff" for indications attach some significance to the word that Mike Capone, brother of Scarface Al Capone, former Chicago gang leader, will be in Sharkey's corner. The Capone live sumptuously.

J. J. Corbett Still Amazed at Big Purses

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 27. (AP)—An elderly gentleman in horn-rimmed glasses, his thinning hair parted in the middle, will peer intently at the Sharkey-Stribling fight proceedings tonight from a seat in the press row. Between turns at a typewriter he may be pardoned a bit for dreaming of the past.

He is James J. Corbett, "Gentleman Jim," one-time champion of the world, and now at 42, appearing in some amazement this extravaganza and comparing it with the night some 35 years ago when he fought and knocked out Charley Mitchell, the champion of England, in a title match at Jacksonville. That bout, incidentally, was the last big heavyweight match in Florida.

The contrast of the growth of boxing is all the more astonishing to me when I recall that Mitchell and I fought for a purse of \$20,000, winner take all, whereas one of the principals in this fight gets \$100,000, win, lose or draw," said Corbett.

PROWLER WHO SHOT AT JACK IS AT LARGE

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 27. (UP)—On the eve of the Sharkey-Stribling fight, the police of Miami Beach still were searching superficially for a prowler who fired a shot in the dark in the home of Harry Moir, at the time when Jack Dempsey was sleeping there early Monday morning.

The police now believe that the intruder was a sneak thief, who, upon being discovered by Dempsey in the ex-champion's bedroom, dashed downstairs, firing a shot to halt pursuit.

The kidnapping which was subscribed to in apparent good faith by Dempsey, now is considered most improbable.

The police deny vehemently, however, that they do not now believe that the shooting took place as described by Jack.

RENOVATION OF MOTOR COMPANY IS UNDER WAY

Work of renovating the Balisier Motor company, at a cost of more than \$5000 will be completed within the coming two weeks.

"ACE IN HOLE" PROPERTY TAX PLAN POPS UP

Direct Tax Not to Exceed One Mill Provided for in Bill 584

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 27. (AP)—The "Ace in the Hole" which members of the property tax-relief commission and the champions of its program on the legislature have kept carefully concealed now makes its public appearance in house bill 584, introduced by the house committee on taxation and revenue, a measure authorizing the state tax commission to levy a direct tax upon property in an amount not to exceed one mill for the next two years for the purpose of meeting the deficit and current running expenses of the state.

Representative Carlin, chairman of the property tax relief commission, explains that the bill is intended to guarantee that sufficient revenues shall be available to the state to carry it "out of the red" during the next two years. Levying of the tax would be optional with the tax commission, he points out, and it would be brought into play only in the event the other tax measures enacted by the legislature are referred, or if they fail to raise sufficient money to meet all of the state's obligations.

If the excise tax and the tax on intangibles should stand, but not bring in sufficient revenue to meet the deficit, then the tax commission would levy a property tax in an amount sufficient to make up the balance required.

The excise tax has already passed the house and senate and is in the hands of the governor. It is estimated to produce about \$750,000 annually. The tax on intangibles, expected to bring in another \$500,000 a year, has been approved by the house and is held certain of senate approval.

LAY PLANS FOR SCHOOL WORK

One of the first projects in the \$150,000 county school building program which will be undertaken, will be the construction of a modern rural school adjacent to the Weyerhaeuser mill site, at a cost of \$20,000.

Although the county school board has not decided on any definite program work, it is understood that it will first open bids on the entire bond issue of \$150,000, and then issue bonds for the financing of each project as it develops.

As many of the construction units are school additions and installations, it is said from competent authority that spring construction activities will be confined to new buildings.

The board will meet the first Thursday of next month, March 7, in the office of County School Superintendent Fred Peterson.

OVERRIDE VETO OF PATTERSON

Two Additional Judges Are Provided by Measure to Become Law

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 27. (AP)—Withstanding an assault by Senators Bennett and Staples, the senate Tuesday passed override veto of Governor Patterson's bill 520, which provides for two additional circuit judges in Multnomah county. The house passed the bill over the veto Monday.

The senate gave 21 of its 39 votes in favor of the measure, one more than the required two-thirds. Those voting against it were Bennett, Brown, Carner, Elliot, Jones, Marks, Schumacher and Staples. Senator Reynolds was absent.

Bennett attacked the bills on economic grounds and Staples declared that one of the outside judges called to Multnomah county to help clear the docket told him that court work in Multnomah county could be speeded up greatly under present conditions. He scored the Multnomah judges for taking too long summer vacations. Incidentally he declared that the legislature has already increased Multnomah county expenses \$138,000 annually by salary increases and rapped county clerk Hittley, who, he said, was elected on a fluke and then came in and got a salary increase from \$4800 to \$6000.

Senate bill 214, the party platform bill sponsored by the state republican central committee, was taken from table Tuesday with its favorable minority report and unfavorable majority report and referred back to the committee on elections and privileges. It is to be amended by striking out the section that would require primary candidates to state on the ballot that they do or do not subscribe to the party platform.

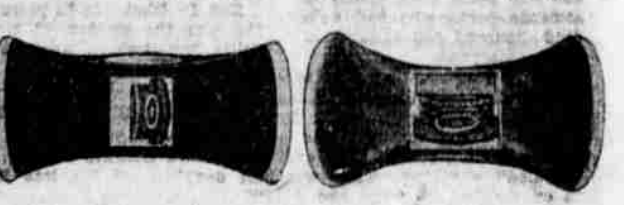
