FIGHTERS WORK OUT FOR FIGHT CARD MARCH 6

Crville Darr Feels That He Is Meeting Toughest Battler in Career

Faced with the most important fight of his career, Orville Darr, heavy-hitting, hard working, light heavyweight of Spokane, was working out conscientiously in the Legion gym each day for his ten-round main event bout with "Spark Plug" Boyd of Seattle, March 6, in the Legion Memorial ring.

Boyd is main event material in the northwest and noted for his slashing offense.

Darr is precisely the same type of fighter, a "head-on-er," which, in itself should guarantee a good fight.

Jack Breedlove undergoes the acid test in his fight with Bob Jones, a tough boy from Aberdeen. Two four-round bouts will be exceptionally good. They are Steamboat Jackson versus Ray Hoffman, and Eddie Morse vs. Joe Relfatt.

The names of all four of these fighters are familiar to fight fans. Relfatt has been in the fight game for some time and has tangled gloves with some of the best boys in the west. His adversary, Eddie Morris, has met such boys as Jack Thompson, sensational negro welter.

Jackson and Hoffman are two experienced fighters who are anxious to work up a reputation in the Klamath country.

ROYAL HEAD OF BULL ELK SEEN AT BLUE BIRD

Recognized as a perfect royal head, a seven-point elk brought down on the South Fork of the Flathead in Montana last fall by Ernest Nitschelm, now adorns the north wall of the Blue Bird.

The elk weighed more than 700 pounds, and was brought down by Nitschelm with one shot, perfectly placed.

E. H. Rohel, taxidermist of Missoula, Mont., mounted the head.

MURDERERS OF YANKEES SLAIN

MEXICO CITY, March 1. (AP)—Sixteen Mexicans have paid with their lives for the alleged murder of W. M. Underwood and G. C. Alsthorpe, American mining officials, in the state of Guanajuato.

Two others, held as prisoners, today faced summary action by court martial and probable execution for their part in the slayings. Troops were in pursuit of the remainder of the band.

The military commander of the state of Guanajuato reported to the chief of the presidential staff here that Federal troops yesterday encountered the bandit group which kidnapped and killed the two Americans and in a two-hour battle killed ten of them, capturing two others. Six others were killed in a previous battle.

One federal soldier was killed in yesterday's encounter.

Alsthorpe and Underwood were kidnapped from their banks at the Guanajuato mines and reduction in northeastern Guanajuato Wednesday of last week. A ransom of \$7,500 was demanded for their release. This was paid to an intermediary and was being carried to the bandits when federal troops attacked them, killing six.

Precisely in retaliation for the attack, the two Americans were killed, their bodies being found near the scene of the battle by pursuing troops.

EXTENSION OF PAVING SOUGHT

PAY INCREASE MEASURE LAW

SALEM, Ore., March 1. (AP)—Circuit judges of Oregon have something to thank the legislature for.

Under the provisions of a bill signed by Governor Patterson, a flat salary of \$5,000 will be paid circuit judges of districts of 15,000 population or under, with other jurisdictions being paid on an upward scale.

The schedule follows:

Up to 15,000, salary \$5,000;
15,000 to 20,000, salary \$5,500;
20,000 to 100,000, salary \$6,000;
Multnomah salary \$6,500.

CRUISE BIDS TO BE OPENED

Bids for the last unit of the new county cruise—approximately 50,000 acres—will be opened tomorrow afternoon by the county court.

With this contract completed, all private timber in the county will have been cruised. The Cullison Cruising company of Portland has held all preceding contracts.

DEATH TOLL OF CRASH RISING

UKLAH, Calif., March 1. (AP)—Discovery of fragments of flesh in wreckage of the North-western Pacific railroad train that crashed in a head-on collision south of here yesterday, led to the belief that the death toll is not yet fully revealed.

The evidence of other lives lost, it is believed, that two or more persons, probably itinerants, who were riding on the brake rods on the forward freight cars, were killed.

All passengers have been accounted for.

Plans were made for four investigations of the accident which claimed two lives and caused injuries, varying from bruises to broken bones, to 25 passengers.

Representatives of the interstate commerce commission, state railroad commission, state industrial accident commission and the railroad took steps to make inquiries into the cause of the wreck.

Officials headed by President Edward H. Magard, refused to make a statement, pending official investigation. A train order, found in the pocket of the dead passenger engineer, G. F. Bradley, showed he had run over an ordered stop. It was asserted.

Only a few of the 25 injured still are in a serious condition. The most critically injured was the engineer of the freight train.

GEORGIA FACES SERIOUS FLOOD

ATLANTA, Ga., Mar. 1. (AP)—While middle Georgia faced the prospect of its worst flood in several years, continued heavy rains in the area and in eastern Alabama and northwest Florida rounded an ominous note for residents of lowlands drained by streams that in some cases have gone above flood stage.

At Macon, Ga., city employees worked throughout the night placing sand bags on the levees of the Ocmulgee river which early today had risen to 24.6 feet, 8.6 feet above flood stage. Spreading over a wide area, the high waters threatened lowland homes. Police released one woman who was trapped in her flooded home.

At Troy, Ala., Emmett Slaughter, 19, a plantation worker, was killed by lightning during a thunderstorm that demolished five houses.

MARCH USHERED IN LIKE LAMB

PENDLETON, Ore., March 1. (AP)—Word was received here today of the death of Willie Richardson, football and basketball star of McLaughlin high school. Richardson died Wednesday from spinal meningitis. He had been ill but one day.

Students in the school suffering from slight colds have been dismissed from classes and the situation is being watched by health authorities.

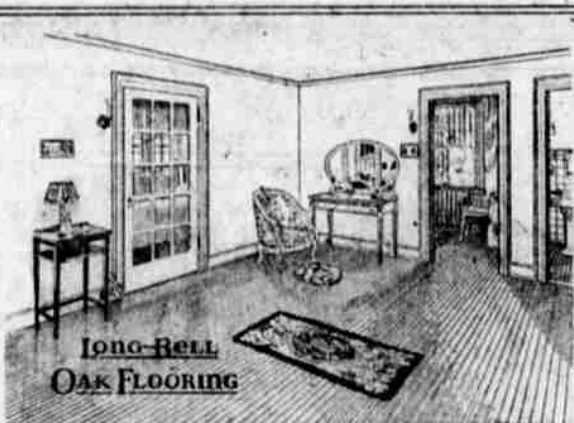
