Governor Patterson will send the list of his nine appointees to the new board of education to the senate Saturday morning for ratification, which will require a two-thirds vote of the members of the upper house. The appointments will be for terms of from one to nine years and the successors of each bill will be named for nine-year terms.

Interim appointments to the board must be approved by the votes of four members of a special senate committee of six members to be named by the president of the senate.

The new board takes over control of the institutions on July 1 of this year.

HIT-RUN AUTO KILLS WOMAN

Four Young Men Arrested and Held on Charges of Manslaughter

ALAMEDA, Cal., March 1, (AP)—Mrs. Ora Murphy, 77 of Crescent City, widow of the late Judge James Murphy, of the Del Norte county superior court, was killed by a hit-run automobile containing four young men here last night.

Witnesses said Mrs. Murphy was carried for a block on the bumper of the machine. The motorists turned into a side street later, and disappeared.

Police later arrested R. H. Kearney, 28, automobile sales manager; F. E. Steel, 25, railroad clerk; Malcolm Rogers, 23, and S. M. Graham, 24, all of Alameda. They found Kearney at the steering wheel of an automobile which showed marks of a collision, and had bits of clothing on the license plate. They said Kearney admitted their machine struck Mrs. Murphy, but alleged Steel was driving at the time. Police filed tentative manslaughter charges against the four prisoners.

LONDON, Mar. 1, (AP)—The secretary of Sir Henry Deterding, managing director of the Royal Dutch Shell companies, stated yesterday that a report from Moscow that Sir Henry had signed a contract with the Soviet oil syndicate was "absolutely untrue." This announcement was made after consultation with various directors of the Shell Oil company, Sir Henry being absent from London.

SALEM, Ore., March 1, (AP)—Voting by acclamation on the committee report that the measure "do not pass" the senate this morning killed house bill 580, authorizing the state tax commission to levy a direct property tax of not to exceed one mill to provide revenue with which to wipe out the state deficit during the next two years.

The measure was drafted at the direction of the state property tax relief commission and was intended as a safeguard against failure of the excise and intangibles taxes, already approved by both houses, to raise sufficient revenue to meet the deficit during the current biennium.

The debate in favor of the bill was led by Senator Upton who pointed out that under the bill the city could do much more than regulate rates, including that the right to fix franchise terms. Upton defended his consistency which has been challenged because of the defeated bill fostered by him which proposed a general 25 per cent reduction in telephone rates throughout the

state. Also he disclaimed political motives in supporting the Burdick bill.

"All of the criticism of the of the public service commission," said Upton, "results from the telephone situation. It is because of the problem that has been created that I have entered into the contest that should be carried on by the Multnomah delegation instead of by me. Unless this bill passes the telephone company will go along as it is now, neither paying anything for the privilege of doing business nor reducing rates. Yet someone comes along here and introduces another bill to abolish the public service commission instead of standing up under the gun and doing what ought to be done." This reference was obviously to Senator J. O. Bailey.

Upton read from the Clark Commission report that flayed the telephone company for its political activity, and charged that it had attempted to influence the country press by increasing the size of its advertisements immediately after the Burdick bill was introduced.
