BOSTON, Mar. 1. (AP)—Demand for fine territory wools have improved somewhat at a slightly lower level of prices than was quoted last week. The bulk of current sales is of French combing sample. Sizeable quantities of original big Montana and Wyoming wools containing some strictly combing staple are bringing 1.05 scored basis, while available French combing lots of territory wool are bringing 1.02 to 1.03 scored basis. Graded French combing sell at 1.02 to 1.05 scored basis.
