JOYOUS YOUTHS STORM THEATRE

Happy Army of College Students Create Rumpus Last Night

ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 5. (AP)—Four thousand students celebrated Michigan's basketball victory over Wisconsin last night, 37 to 22, by attempting to storm their way into the Michigan theatre.

Police fear bombs repelled three attacks, but it was the appearance at the theatre of Dr. Clarence Cook Little, University president, that finally dispersed the crowd. Six students were arrested but only one was held by police today.

The students, snake dancing through the streets in a riotous frenzy because the team had just assured Michigan a tie for the big ten championship, rushed the doors of the theatre, demanding free admittance.

The theatre manager called up on stage hands and asked them to repel the rush which followed his refusal of the student demand, and then called police who brought tear bombs. Three times the blinding choking gas pellets routed the mob, which gradually decreased in numbers to about 500.

Six ornamental doors and a large window were broken and a giant electric sign was damaged when it supporting cables were cut. Bottles, eggs, stones and vegetables were thrown by the students.

Dr. Little, summoned from a formal dinner at his home, spoke briefly but energetically to the crowd and within a few minutes the attack was ended.

26 ISLANDERS ARE STARVING

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia, March 5. (AP)—Isolated by ice from the mainland and apparently forgotten by the outside world, 26 inhabitants of the tiny island of Sava, situated between the Pruth and Krug rivers, are in danger of perishing from starvation and inclement weather.

For nearly a month their only food has been roots and herbs. Several of the older inhabitants are already dead from starvation. A woman of 76 went mad from hunger and a young mother with a two-day-old baby perished from cold.

Two men attempted to reach the mainland seeking a priest to give spiritual comfort to the dying, but both perished when their boat was crushed in the ice.

Clerk-Carrier Exams Will Be In Order Soon

The United States Civil Service Commission announces a Post-office Clerk-Carrier examination for the purpose of establishing an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of clerk or carrier, postoffice service of Klamath Falls.

Applications will be received by the Secretary, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service District, Room 207, Post office building, Seattle up to close of business on April 5. The date of examinations will be shown on the admission cards furnished applicants.

Substitute service is paid at the rate of 65 cents per hour for the first year at full time, salary is \$1,700.

All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers, however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Age limits are 18 to 45 years on the date of examination. Age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service.

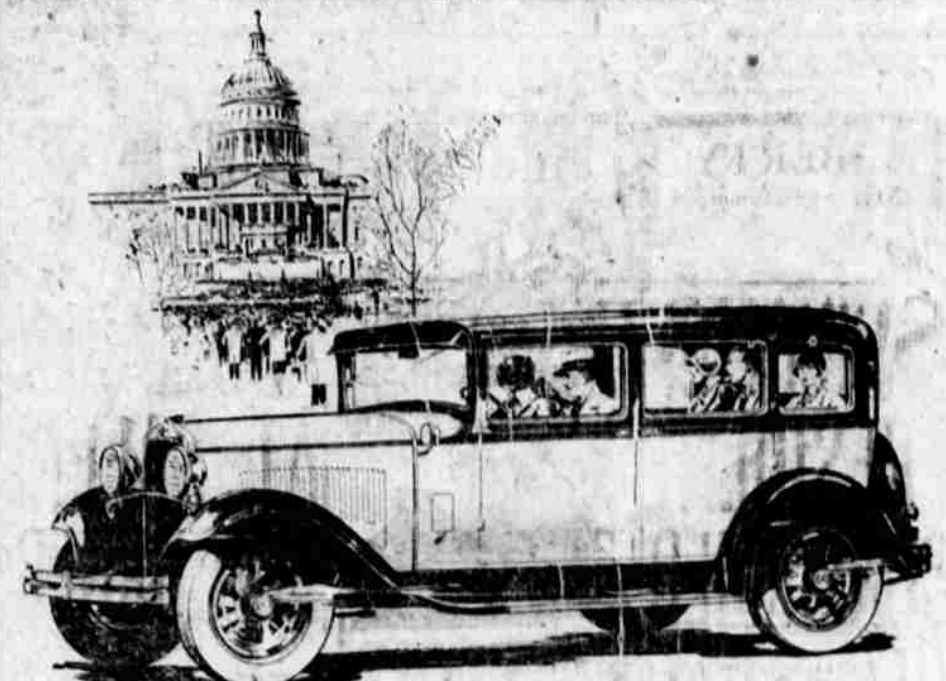
IDAHO FORWARD LEADS PACIFIC COAST CIRCUIT
