Cattlemen's Association

THE move to establish a Southern Oregon Cattlemen's association deserves not only serious consideration, but strong support of every livestockman in Klamath, Lake, Josephine, Jackson, Deschutes and neighboring counties. Preliminary plans leading towards establishment of a permanent organization will be held Saturday and, if the southern Oregon livestock industry tends to support the move, the inter-county association will be a reality in the near future.

The time has come when an individual voice, or the voices of isolated groups here and there, carry no weight with the "powers that be." To attain an objective, an organization must represent a large number. It must, in fact, reflect the majority opinion of the industry it represents.

Livestockmen of southern and central Oregon have common problems, principal among which is the cattle rustling which has brought a \$40,000 annual loss in Klamath county and a \$500,000 annual loss in Oregon. With a large and powerful organization, livestockmen can better cope with this situation and more effectually control this "motorized" cattle stealing.

This organization, we understand, is not to be a marketing combine. Its sole purpose will be to solve mutual problems and to discuss contemporary questions relating to the livestock industry.

This newspaper expresses the sincere hope that the cattlemen's organization is not only formed next Saturday but that it will be a medium through which southern and central Oregon cattlemen can operate to solve mutual problems.

HOOVER STAND ON RUM ISSUE WINS APPROVAL

NEW YORK, March 6, (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of New York's governor, has expressed her approval of President Hoover's stand for observance of the prohibition law. Discussing "women's place in the world today" before an audience at the west side branch of the Y. M. C. A., she said the attitude expressed by the president in his inaugural address was a "very wise thing." She believed women would help him in this work just as they did in the problem of food restriction in the world war.

She said that a woman remarked to her: "I have never lived up to the prohibition law but I think that Mr. Hoover could get me to do it."

SET DATE FOR ANNUAL DINNER

Friday, May third was tentatively set as the date for the annual chamber of commerce banquet by directors of the chamber of commerce yesterday.

This date will be kept, providing Paul Jackson, principal of the Klamath Union High school sees fit to have the annual May Day Fete observed at this time. The students of the high school have asked that they might cooperate with the chamber of commerce and hold the annual fete on the same date as the annual meeting.

Possibility of having the annual affair on May eighth was abandoned when it was found that many of the chamber of commerce members, including the president, H. N. Moe would be absent from the city attending the convention of Rotarians to be held in Vancouver on May 6, 7 and 8.

H. N. Moe, president and Earl C. Reynolds, executive secretary were appointed by the directors to represent the chamber of commerce at the annual Oregon Commercial Secretaries meeting and the annual Oregon State Chamber of Commerce meeting to be held in Portland this month.

The annual meeting of the Oregon State chamber of commerce is scheduled for March 15. The secretaries meeting will follow from March 19 to 23.

Walter West was named to represent Klamath Falls at the Western Oregon Traffic Association meeting in Eugene on March eighth, providing his appointment by the directors is approved by the transportation committee of the chamber of commerce.

Informal discussion as to whether or not the slogan "An Empire Awakening" should be changed or left was held by the directors. Some were of the opinion that the slogan should be changed, while others felt it should remain. Further discussion on the subject will be held later by the directors.

ROGUE RIVER BILL SIGNED

SALEM, Ore., March 6, (AP)—Governor Patterson has signed senate bill 154, by the Jackson county delegation, which withdraws from appropriation the waters of the Rogue river below the junction of the north and south forks and prohibits the construction of dams or other obstructions in the main channel of the stream. It is a fish preservation measure.

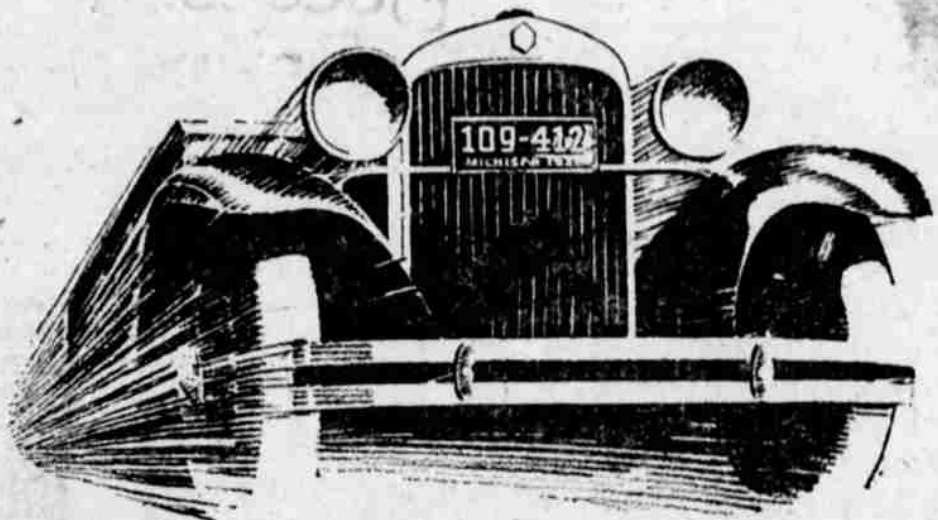
On the screen, a well known axiom "None But the Brave" has been turned into a witty and diverting comic-old comedy drama.



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
