

DEATH TOLL OF POISON LIQUOR IS SEVENTEEN

Dispensers of Contraband Liquor Arrested on Murder Charge.

PEORIA, Ill., March 7. (AP)—More names appeared on the poison liquor death list today, and the total stood at 17.

Two men and their wives are held for murder. It is charged they furnished the poison drink. Another man is charged with manslaughter.

There were three deaths in Galesburg with officials were certain were due to poison liquor but because the bodies had been embalmed before an examination could be made, the coroner was unwilling to include them among the victims.

The federal prohibition department has entered the investigation in an effort to trace the poison to its source. Morris Mansfield, one of those held under a murder charge, said he obtained his liquor supply from a Chicago dealer, whom he refused to name.

The beverage that resulted in the 17 deaths, the blinding of several persons, and the serious illness of dozens more, contained 15 per cent wood alcohol, according to a chemist's report. The industrial alcohol which was used appeared to have been poorly redistilled, the report said.

The murder charges against Mansfield, his wife, and G. O. Griffin and his wife were based on only one death, that of Clara

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CONVICTS ARE INTERROGATED BY PROSECUTOR

SAN QUENTIN STATE PRISON, Calif., March 7. (UP)—Convicts of this penitentiary were questioned today by Byron Pitts, district attorney of Los Angeles county, in a renewed endeavor to determine the full scope of bribery during the regime of his predecessor, Asa Hayes, who is under

Pitts talked at length with Jacob Goldstein, serving a term from Los Angeles for manslaughter, following a report that Goldstein had paid money to have a charge of murder reduced to manslaughter.

"We have broken the ring in Los Angeles," the district attorney said, "but there still is a lot of stuff to clean up. The conditions we have uncovered there constitute the worst blight in American justice ever brought to light."

Both of the Malin basketball teams defeated Chiloquin Friday at the Henley gymnasium.

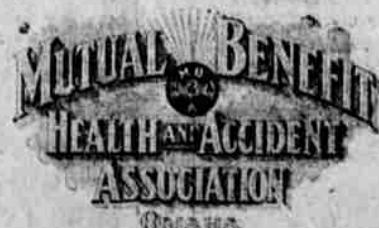
Business interests in France are conducting an active campaign for a general tax reform, claiming that the present tax situation is seriously hindering normal economic development.

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
