WOMAN MAKES SACRIFICE FOR AMATEUR SPORT

Breasts of Fair Athlete Removed to Allow Freer Movement

PARIS, March 5. (U.P.)—Madame Violette Morris, French Olympic dress thrower and all-around athlete, startled Paris today by the announcement that she had had her breasts removed to give her greater freedom in athletic activities.

Madame Morris, who recently attracted public attention by a dispute with the French federation of feminine sports, which objected to her wearing pants and sweaters, said the operation meant no more to her than the removal of a sixth finger.

"Sport is all my life," she said, emphasizing the subject. Sports writers commented that other French women athletes had undergone the same operation.

The French federation turned down Madame Morris' application for an amateur racing license on the grounds that it did not approve her style of dress, her activities to obtain favors from newspaper reporters or her language. She sued the federation for 100,000 francs.

Madame Morris did not deny that she used strong language. She said that she could not help it if the reporters find her to be good copy.

EDDIE GRIMES LOOKS GOOD AS THIRD SACKER

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., March 8. (AP)—Eddie Grimes, who was with Tulsa last night, will be the St. Louis Browns' regular third sacker this year if pre-season predictions of Manager Dan Howley bear fruit. Grimes is being coached carefully for the pennant chase.

Another rookie getting special attention from Howley is Dick Ferrell, highly touted backstop, to whom the Browns paid a \$25,000 bonus to sign. Ferrell attempted to get into infield practice yesterday and Howley immediately warned him away.

OTTO ANDERSON IS APPOINTED IDAHO MENTOR

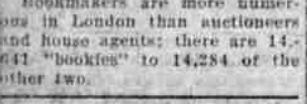
MOSCOW, Idaho, March 5. (A.P.)—Otto Anderson, one of the Pacific coast's most outstanding athletes and twice a member of track teams which competed in Olympic games, has been named track coach at the University of Idaho, effective September 1. Dr. F. J. Kelly, president of the university has announced. Anderson, now coach at Fremont high school Los Angeles, is a graduate of the University of Southern California, the alma mater of Lee B. Calland, director of athletics at Idaho and his chief.

I have seen players keep up their spirit and cheerfulness while in a terrific fielding or batting slump, but seldom while under the ordeal of a sore arm.

So much more credit to the "Goose" who refused to let his lame flipper interfere with his hitting.

Goslin showed that there is always something new in baseball.
