

RIVER FERRIES ARE OPERATING

Motor Association Receives Word That Service is Resumed.

The Oregon State Motor Association announces that all ferries on upper Columbia river are again in operation, but only during daylight hours.

In the Redding district, the ferry bridge at Redding is closed for this week, starting Monday, March 11 in order that flooring may be completed. Traffic on the Redding-Altoona route will be maintained by detouring departing eastward from Pacific highway two miles north of Redding.

On the Redwood highway, the bridge is being repaired at Willow Brook and detour provided during working hours, but opened to traffic from 5:30 in the evening to 7 a. m. The bridge will be completed within the next two days it is believed.

The motor association draws attention to the fact that motorists wishing to see the blossoms of the southern district will find them in full bloom practically all over the valley of the San Jose district. The date set for the Sacramento Blossom Festival is March 23 and 24. The prize trees are expected to be in bloom for that event.

On the river road toward Courtland and Walnut Grove in the Sacramento district and also on the roads through Fair Oaks and Orangevale, apricots, plums and peaches are now blossoming.

THE MAN WHO "DISCOVERED" HOOVER Lay First Steel for Modoc Northern Railroad; 2 Tracks Connect With N. C. O. Line

"He Is Ambitious, and He Will Succeed," Guardian Informed the Court in 1894, When Youngster Faced College with \$12.74

WEST BRANCH, Ia., March 11.—Although the "original Hoover man" is dead, his hand-written comments on the country's next president still exist that away back in the thirties there was at least one man willing to predict that Herbert Hoover would go a long way in this world.

The following records of the District court of Cedar county, under the file number 1599, show that the first man to pick Hoover for future greatness was Lawrie Tatum of West Branch. He "discovered" the next president long before Wilson or Harding ever heard of him.

Mr. Tatum has been dead for nearly a quarter of a century. From 1884 to 1894 Mr. Tatum was Herbert Hoover's guardian. The court documents above referred to are his regular reports on his care of the lad's estate, accompanied with comments on Hoover's personality and ability.

"He Will Succeed"
On Oct. 17, 1894, Mr. Tatum assured the court, in his strict Quaker fashion, that "He will succeed, as he is frugal, industrious and energetic. He had, at that time, watched the boy thru a decade of struggle and he was confident."

When Mr. Tatum took over the guardianship in 1884, Herbert Hoover's share of his father's estate was approximately \$550. Although still a boy, Hoover agreed that this should be saved to get him an education; and not a cent of it did he ever ask for any other purpose. In 1885 he moved to Oregon and lived with an uncle there, so that until he was 15 he had no expenses. In 1889, however, he was thrown on his own resources and compelled to face the world on his own.

His first year in Leland Stanford took \$427.50 from the fund his guardian had for him. This included everything—tuition, books, clothing and everything else that he did not earn for himself. In his second year, he called on his guardian for only \$270, and his third year he needed but \$50, having spent the summer working in Arkansas for \$65 a month.

Supported Report.
In 1891 Mr. Tatum reported to the court, "During the past year H. C. Hoover has supported himself by work in a real estate office in Salem, Ore." In 1892 the record says that "during the summer, Herbert Hoover has been assisting in the state geological survey of Arkansas, under Professor Branner." In the following year Mr. Tatum's report remarked: "During vacation, he was employed by one of the professors to assist in the state geological survey of Arkansas. For this he was credited with six months university work. He also received, during the time so employed, \$65 a month."

Then, in 1894, the guardianship was about to end. Hoover's small estate was about exhausted. But he was highly optimistic, and something of his optimism seems to have touched old Mr. Tatum. Here is what the old gentleman wrote in his report: "Frugal, Industrious, Energetic."

Herbert C. Hoover is making excellent progress at Leland Stanford University in California. Although his funds in my care are about exhausted, yet he is ambitious to complete his course in the university, and I think that he will succeed as he is frugal, industrious and energetic."

At that time Hoover had exactly \$12.74 left in his estate.

Maybe Mr. Tatum's eulogy does not sound very enthusiastic. But the picture must be borne in mind: the severe, spare old Quaker, with his white whiskers, fringing a clean-shaven face, frugal with his praise as with all else, watching the energetic youngster on the west coast in his fight to get an education, slowly nodding precisely and remarking "I think that he will succeed, as he is frugal, industrious and energetic."

Yellowed court records of Cedar county, Iowa, one of which is reproduced above, prove that Herbert Hoover was frugal in his college days at Stanford University and discloses that the orphan's guardian, Lawrie Tatum, "discovered" the next president long before either Wilson or Harding ever heard of him. Pictured here are Tatum and young Hoover as the latter appeared when he faced his senior year with a balance of only \$12.74, as the above court record shows. Evidently this college student carried no raccoon coat.

Counsel for defense had photographs of the snow-plotted country where the fight between the two men occurred and also of the spot where twelve days later the body was discovered buried in the snow.

Seedlings to Be Planted on Denuded Area

RENO, Ore., March 12.—Yellow pine seedlings numbering approximately 150,000 will be planted in the Waco lake burn of the Deschutes national forest as early this year as snow conditions permit, according to an announcement this morning from the local forest office. This, so far as can be learned, will be the first tree planting project of its kind ever undertaken in the Deschutes forest.

The young trees, to be shipped here from the Northwest experiment station of the forest service at Windriver, Wash., will be planted in a part of the 2300-acre burn where no reproduction trees are standing and where soil and shade conditions are favorable, explains H. L. Fromme, Deschutes forest supervisor. The seedlings will be planted about seven feet apart and, it is estimated, about 1000 trees will be required to the acre.

Both the north and south legs of the connection with the N. C. O. line have been laid, and two tracks are being put down. Seventy-five pound steel is being used on the work at present.

A connection is being made with the city water system to supply water to the Southern Pacific along the right-of-way south of Altoona until such time as the company allows wells for this supply. This work is being done under an agreement with the city whereby the company is to lay the pipe and is permitted to purchase water from the city system for a limited period of time. The mains are to be left in the ground when another source of supply is obtained and are to be used for the first unit. A sand and gravel pit was opened this week, and it was expected that the work of laying foundations for construction buildings would be under way within a few days.

The track laying is in charge of Martin Dillon who constructed the broad gauge line for the N. C. O. railroad here last year. Approximately a hundred men are now employed on the work of laying the tracks alone. Most of these came into Altoona Sunday.
