STATE DEPARTMENT TO DETAIN SOLDIERS

Affairs in Revolting Mexico Rapidly Nearing Crisis as Federal and Rebel Troops March Toward Each Other for Big Battle.

MEXICO CITY, March 13. (AP) 1:40 P. M.—Federal troops were reported in active pursuit of retreating rebel forces outside of Saltillo in an official government bulletin issued this afternoon which stated that the government troops occupied Saltillo this morning.

KING OF COCA COLA PASSES

ATLANTA, Ga., March 13. (A. P.)—Atlanta today mourned Asa G. Candler, a former drug clerk in a country pharmacy, whose faith in a soft drink formula, brought him millions in the manufacture of Coca Cola. The 78-year-old capitalist, civic leader and philanthropist died late yesterday at Wesley Memorial hospital after an illness of more than two years.

The story of Mr. Candler's rise is a story of the romance of American business. As the proprietor of an Atlanta drug store, more than forty years ago, he purchased the formula for Coca Cola for a reported price of \$500, and in 1919 sold his interest in the immense Coca Cola Manufacturing company for \$25,000,000.

QUIET REIGNS AS 20 CHECKER PLAYERS MEET

CHICAGO, March 13. (AP)—Shrouded in the silence which betokens deep concentration, 20 expert checker players were competing today for the championship of the United States in a tournament sponsored by the American Checker Association. Opening of the tournament brought to light the involved rules of checker etiquette, and revealed checker virtuosi to be as temperamental as champion golfers.

"One player can't smoke if it annoys his rival," explained E. J. Seelbach, secretary of the association. "It is considered criminal for a player to drum on the table with his fingers. It's nothing short of murder for a third person to step up and comment on the play."

Small Bags Basin Spuds Score Hit On S. F. Market

Four carloads of potatoes in 10 and 15 pound bags are leaving Klamath county this week for San Francisco and Oakland. So far as is known, this is the first time that potatoes have ever been shipped in packages of this size anywhere in the world. The little bags are being packed by Grafton-Jackman company and are going to the Mutual Stores, a chain organization with 250 stores in the Bay cities. Instead of ordinary burlap, the sacks are snowy white cotton bags with a two-color brand printed on each one proclaiming to the world that within are U. S. 1 Klamath Gem. They are sowed with soft white twine and every precaution is taken to keep the sacks clean and attractive. The bags are similar to the small white bags used for breakfast cereals. Explains New Custom As explained by Jack H. Grafton, official of the company, the tendency everywhere is to use smaller and smaller packages for foodstuffs. This is because of the modern tendency toward apartment house life with its consequent day-to-day buying. WOMAN ACCUSED OF ALTERING RETURNS

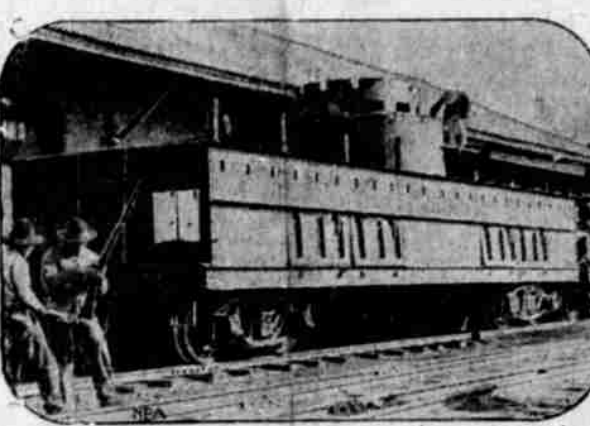
Income Tax Collector Alleges Movie Stars Had Cheated Government Out of More Than Million Dollars in Recent Years With Aid of Mrs. Berger.

LOS ANGELES, March 13. (A. P.)—Gloom pervades the world of stardom in Hollywood today. Screen celebrities, many of them at least, are wondering what the future holds. They are beginning to wonder how much they will owe Uncle Sam when investigations are completed, and whether they will be held responsible for any improper acts attributed by federal income tax officials to J. Marjorie Berger. Miss Berger, an income tax counsellor of Hollywood, was indicted by a federal grand jury here yesterday on 24 counts of alleged criminal aid in preparing fraudulent income tax returns for many prominent film personages. 13 PER CENT OF PRIVATE PINE GONE

Estimate Cut-Over Area Reaches Total of 93,845 Acres

DOES NOT INCLUDE INDIAN RESERVATION

Also Does Not Include National Forest Area; Figure Remaining Standing Timber is in Neighborhood of One Million Acres; Survey Made by K. F. P. A.

Thirteen and nine-tenths of the standing private timber of Klamath county has been cut and manufactured. This does not include Klamath Indian reservation or national forest timber. This was the finding of an investigation conducted by the Klamath Forest Protective association office, in which the actual acreage of cut-over land was estimated. The investigation revealed that 93,845 acres of Klamath privately owned timber had been cut. These cut-over areas were spread over 35 townships in all sections of Klamath county, outside the national forest and the reservation. Edgar and Cullison, firm of Portland in making a new county cruise, have cruised 694,954 acres, according to figures released at the county assessor's office today. According to this firm's estimate there is yet to be cruised 67,560 acres, or a total of 672,514 acres of privately owned standing timber left to be cut in the Klamath basin. (The county cruise is applicable only on privately owned timber land.) It is found that 13.9 per cent or slightly over one-eighth of the Klamath basin owned timber has been cut, to date.

STORAGE PLANT WILL BE BUILT

Establishment of a large cold storage plant in the quarters formerly occupied by the Allen and Lewis store on Spring street, was announced this noon by A. M. Collier, head of the Klamath Ice and Storage company, who added that the necessary remodeling would be completed within 40 days. When completed the storage plant will provide facilities for 2,000 cases of eggs, Mr. Collier said.

HEALTH BOARD APPROVES TWO SEWER UNITS

The plans and specifications for units number 3 and 4 of the new sewer system and sewage disposal plant of Klamath Falls have been examined and found satisfactory by the Oregon State Board of Health. Mayor T. B. Watters today received word from Frederick D. Stricker of Portland stating the plans had been approved. Plans and specifications for units number 1 and 2 were examined last December. Tentative approval of the entire project has been given, but final approval is reserved until satisfactory operation of the works is demonstrated.

Legislative Session Described By Collier

POSTPONE TRIAL OF B. BAKER

PORTLAND, March 13. (AP)—A sick juror stopped all progress in the murder trial of Blanton Baker, Klamath Indian, today. Efforts to obtain a physician's report on the condition of the juror, Jackson C. Willis, proved fruitless, and Dr. Brooks, government doctor, was delegated to make such report to the court.

Willis was reported to be running a high fever. Court officials said in event the illness is protracted a new jury will be secured and trial started again. The court room today was filled with Klamath Indians, some of them witnesses, and others relatives or friends of Baker or Bidwell Riddle, the man Baker is alleged to have killed. The fathers of both men were present.

In the marshal's office during the recess a reunion of the Bakers was held. The Indians, squaws, papooses, braves, wrinkled old chieftains, quietly took possession of the place and proceeded with their morning toilet—a procedure that consisted mostly of combing each other's hair.


SIGN UP 400 FOR CLUB WORK

With approximately 400 boys and girls signed up for various divisions in county club work, Frank Sexton, county club leader, announced today that a new record club membership would be attained this year. CAR TURNS TURTLE AT 202 MILES

Lee Bible Meets Instant Death as Machine Rolls Over and Over.

CAMERA MAN ALSO DIES IN ACCIDENT

Pathe News Man Struck Down by Hurling Machine, as He Attempted to Get Close-up of Lee Bible's Attempt to Set New Speed Record on Beach.

OCEAN SPEEDWAY, Daytona Beach, Fla., March 13. (AP)—Lee Bible crashed into the sand dunes and was killed here today while traveling at a speed of 202 miles an hour in an attempt to set a new world's record in J. M. White's Triplex racing machine. The accident occurred some three miles down the beach on the north end of the measured mile course, the machine spinning around on the course and plunging into the sand dunes. Bible, a mechanic, was killed instantly when the 36-cylinder triplex racer in which he was attempting to break the world's speed record of 231 miles an hour, got beyond control and crashed into the sand dunes. Charles Traub, Pathe News cameraman, who was hit by the machine, also was killed. The accident happened at the far north end of the course. The accident occurred after Bible had negotiated the mile run at 202 miles an hour. The machine was demolished. The photographer's name was Travers. A panic reigned among the spectators in the grandstand as the cars and an ambulance rushed to the scene of the tragedy. First reports reaching the timing pits were to the effect that Bible ran too far out toward the water, and in attempting to correct his steering swung the wheel of the car and was unable to (Continued on Page Three)
