DALEY WORKING TOWARDS MAIN EVENTER CLASS

Fans Aroused Over Clegg-Horn Main Event March 20th.

Shady but surely Mike Daley, Portland City middleweight, is working towards the main event class. At first regarded as a good tough preliminary boy, and no more, Mike has battered and slugged his way into the semi-main event class by sheer grit and courage.

Possessed of an iron chin, good wallop and fighting heart, but lacking a certain finesse and speed, Mike has moved steadily forward and is today the only "home" boy who has attained much distinction.

Daley clashes with Johnny McCoy of Seattle, a fast and clever boxer with a stiff jolting punch in either hand, in the semi-main event of the night fight card, March 20, which features as its main event, Walter Clegg-Horn Ekimo middleweight vs. "Tiger" Johnny Clegg, San Francisco. If Mike wins decisively, either by decision or by knockout, he has been promised a "hot shot" as a double main event card next April 3.

Tougher and Tougher

In his last seven fights, the Portland City boy has met a tougher opponent each time—McCoy, it is said, will be toughest of all.

Signing up of Clegg-Horn and Clegg for a main event has set the fight fans to not only enthusing over the prospects of the best main event in months, but also to speculating on the courage of the boxing commission in securing such expensive fighters for a Klamath ring.

To tell the truth, the commission and the legion are gambling on the next card—if the house is packed to the rafters, all will be well; the legion won't make much, but the fans will have seen some great fights. On the other hand, if it is a mediocre house, the commission must "fork up" an "anti" of a couple of hundred dollars. Increasing support from fight fans has given the commission more confidence and they are willing to do their part by bringing in some really good boys.

Great Fighters

Nelson Clegg-Horn nor Clegg are "hans beens." They are at the zenith of their careers.

Clegg-Horn has appeared in many Portland and Seattle main events during the past few months while Clegg has been going so good that his manager plans to take him on an eastern tour shortly after the Klamath bout. Clegg-Horn has one of the greatest lefts seen in the northwest while Clegg is a hooker and slinger.

Preliminary Looks Good

Incidentally, the preliminaries look exceptionally good. Joe Steloff, at one time a great main eventer, and still possessing ring craft and a punch, meets Ted Turner of Chillicothe in a "prelim." Steloff and Eddie Morris drew in the last card.

"Steam Boat" Jackson who soundly whipped Wilbur Harrington for three rounds the last card then lost in the fourth on a foul, will be seen in action against Johnny Wilson. Jackson was so upset by the decision which lost his fight to Harrington that he shouted to the fans he would never fight in Klamath again. work that has already been done and stressed the necessity for completing the dam and water tunnel which comprise the project.

Sufficient money, possibly \$1,000,000 will be set aside from the appropriation this year to push the work to completion within the next 12 months, it was decided.

SALEM, Ore., March 14, (AP)

The decision reached at Denver today at a conference between Dr. Elwood Mead, irrigation commissioner, and a group of reclamation engineers indicates, in the opinion of C. E. Stricklin, deputy state engineer, that the government is going to rush the Vale project to completion. Stricklin recalls that engineers have estimated that it can be completed in a year, and he agrees that this is possible.

"The project will put into intensive production some of the best land in the Snake River valley," Stricklin said. "The growing season is long and the land will produce most of the agricultural crops."

Much of the land is already in private ownership, Stricklin said. However, the Reclamation Service limits an owner to not more than 160 acres, and those owning more are required to contract to sell all in excess of 160 acres before they are allowed to have water. It is said that most of them have signed this agreement.

The Reclamation Service has purchased for development of the project half the storage capacity, or about \$5,000 acre foot, of the Warm Springs reservoir which stores water from Malheur river. The canal intake is near Namor station on the Malheur.

From the intake the water will first be carried through a series of three tunnels to avoid slide hazards in the hills. The first tunnel, which will be 2150 feet long, has been completed, and work has started on the third which is to be 1214 feet long. Next comes six miles of open canal, already finished. The

REBELS BEATEN AT ENCANTADA

WITH THE REVOLUTIONARY ARMY IN TORREON, Coahuila, Mexico, March 14, (AP)—Prepared for the approach of the government forces, advancing from the south toward Torreon, General Escobar, military dictator of the rebellion, was prepared to move at a moment's notice late last night. The maneuvers contemplated by the Rebel forces were not disclosed.

While the Rebel command made ready for the movement to be decided upon by their leaders, more than 3000 citizens attended a gigantic rally in Torreon's public square, the scene of many revolutionary gatherings in the past. A great chorus of "Vivas" greeted General Escobar when he appeared before the crowd. All saloons of the city were ordered closed.

"I feel the necessity of an explanation of my conduct in leading this movement," General Escobar declared. "It would have been far easier for me to have stayed at home than to obey the imperial command of duty. It is very easy for those who have no convictions and those who lived lives of ease to turn deaf ears to the actual situation in the country that at present is in the hands of men without principles of right."

"Everyone knows that not only myself but a large group of well known generals and civilians have done honor to their antecedents by protesting against the tyrants."

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Following the conference General Rodriguez left to confer with General Augustino Olachea at Naco, Sonora, and these facts gave rise in some belief that a peaceable end to the revolt was not to be unexpected shortly.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., March 14, (AP)—The Douglas dispatch will say today that it has been reliably informed that General Augustino Olachea, in command of the Federal troops at Naco, Sonora, is expecting reinforcements to be started to him today from Abelardo Rodriguez, governor of northern district of Baja California, by way of southern Arizona. The same authority quotes General Olachea as saying that he was told by Governor Rodriguez that the troops would enter American territory at Calexico, Calif.

WASHINGTON, March 14, (AP)—The state department has not received a request to permit the passage through the United States of the Mexican Federal troops of Gov. Rodriguez of the Northern District of Lower California, to reinforce the loyal garrison holding Naco, Sonora against the Rebels. The department pointed out that permission first would have to be obtained from the governors of California and Arizona, the states through which the troops would have to pass in going from Calexico to Naco.
