RESE KNOCKS HOME RUN OVER WRONG POSTER

Former pitcher New York Giants Young Stribling is probably the modern world's busiest athlete.

"Ma" Stribling is the modern counterpart of the Spartan mothers of ancient days who sent their sons into battle with a smile. She has seconded her boy in over 400 fights her son has engaged in during the short space of eight years.

"Ma" and "Pa" Stribling, who are really "Grandpa" and "Grandma" Stribling, are now busily engaged in making Young Stribling Jr., aged 2 years, into a future champion.

"Pa" Stribling daily trains the youngster in acrobatic stunts that are the envy of many an adult athlete.

This Stribling family is in many respects the strangest combination in the history of boxing.

I asked "Ma" Stribling one day whether her athletic son had ever engaged in any other sports.

"He always liked football when he was in high school," she answered, "but I would not let him play. It was too dangerous."

And this from the mother of the lad who has traded punches with some of the toughest fighters in the world on an average of every ten days.

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PHILADELPHIA REGULAR TEAM IS UNCHANGED

Connie Mack Lays Trust in Same Players as Last Year.

PORT MYERS, Fla., March 15, (AP)—Connie Mack will attempt to win an American league pennant for Philadelphia with practically the same players who fared by a narrow margin last year.

No new faces will appear in the regular line up. Every indication, however, points to one new pitcher and if the young man about to be struck by the major league lightning has a curve ball athletic fans will see a great deal of him.

This promising recruit is Bill Breckenridge, late of Dartmouth. "Breck" has not yet been called on to show specifications for a curve ball but there is little doubt that he has everything else a pitcher needs.

Assignment of the versatile Jimmy Faux, one of the extra "X" Foxes, to first base will cause a revision of the infield plans. Max Bishop, would have been re-nominated at second base without opposition but he showed a disinclination to sign. Jimmy Dykes who plays anywhere he finds himself may play second with Joe Boley at short and Sammy Hall at third. If Bishop gets in at second, Dykes still may get a chance at a regular job by forcing Hale from third base to a utility status. Joe Hassler and Eddie Collins again will stand by for infield emergencies. Nick Borelli, the Muhlenberg athlete, needs more experience.

The outfield of last season's close has been brought over intact, with Albert Simmons, Geo. Haas, and Bing Miller in undisputed possession of the field. Homer Summa, former Cleveland outfielder, will be a reserve assisted by Ossie Orvill, who was a pitcher last year and first baseman this spring. Rodman Hume, Southern Methodist university football player and John Scott, Mercer University product and protégé of the Fort Myers Kiwanis club are not yet ready.

Mickey Cochrane, the most valuable player in the American league by official verdict, will do the bulk of the catching but Cy Perkins is available as first aid.

Bob Grove, George Walberg, Howard Ehmke, John Quinn, Eddie Rommel and George Earnshaw will be the chief dependence in the pitching department with Breckenridge, Stewart Bole, Carroll Yerkes and Bill Shores available for relief roles. If Breckenridge's curve passes all the tests, he may become a starter.

John Pincus Quinn who will be 44 years of age the day after the Fourth of July, is one of baseball's most interesting stars. The senior pitcher of the two major leagues of 1928 compiled a pitching percentage of more than .700 and had an earned run average of less than three runs to the game, so with speed this year he should do no worse.

Earnshaw prepared carefully for the new campaign, preceding the training camp work with baths and exercises at Hot Springs, Ark., and Manager Mack expects consistent work from the former oriole. The other pitchers have rounded into shape without suffering injuries. The only casualty in the athletic camp has been Joe Boley, who has been slowed in his work by a sore arm. Eddie Collins, who keeps a paternal eye on the infielders, has restricted his practice to a minimum while waiting for the arm to respond to treatment.

TWO CITIES IN NEED OF FOOD

50 KILLED AND 150 CAPTURED

MEXICO CITY, March 15, (AP)—Colonel Tapia, chief of the presidential staff, announced at noon today that cavalry constituting the advance guard of General Calles army occupied Durango this morning.

General Calles himself was expected to reach the city by midday to establish headquarters in preparation for a march on Torreón, the Rebel stronghold, upon which five Federal columns are now converging.

The forces of the Rebel General Juan Gualberto Amaya were stated to have fled from Durango on the approach of the Federals, presumably going north.

Dispatches from Vera Cruz said that five ranking officers of the army of General Jesus Maria Aguirre were executed last Tuesday at the same time General Simon Aguirre was killed by a firing squad.

The five were General Jose Trinidad Rojas, General Francisco Acosta who was chief of the Yaquile forces; and Colonels Jorge Crall, Francisco Aviles Mancilla, and Ignacio Acosta. Eighty four others were taken prisoners and at present are being held at Vera Cruz for military trial. These are eleven chiefs and 72 officers.

It was said the Rebel troops became demoralized at Santa Lucracia.

WASHINGTON, March 15, (AP)—Large amounts of war materials, including tear gas, arms and ammunition have been ordered from American manufacturers by the Mexican government.

CONSERVATION IS BANNED ON SCHOOL CAMPUS

DETROIT, March 15, (AP)—The campus of the University of Detroit was stirred today by an announcement by the President, the Rev. John P. McNichols, that the 50 coeds enrolled in the school would be expelled if they were detected conversing with any of the 2,000 male students on the university grounds.

The ban on conversation was defended vigorously by John S. Malley, associate editor of the Varsity News, student paper.

Malley's statement said: "The president's dictum is the greatest thing to come to U. of D. in years. The coeds waylay and harass the male students. They destroy the studies and scholarly atmosphere of the college with their blandishments. It is the greatest single step forward in the history of education."

A coed reply was: "One reason, Malley hates girls is because he can't dance. He's asked me to teach him how. He can't dance and the girls can't be annoyed with him."

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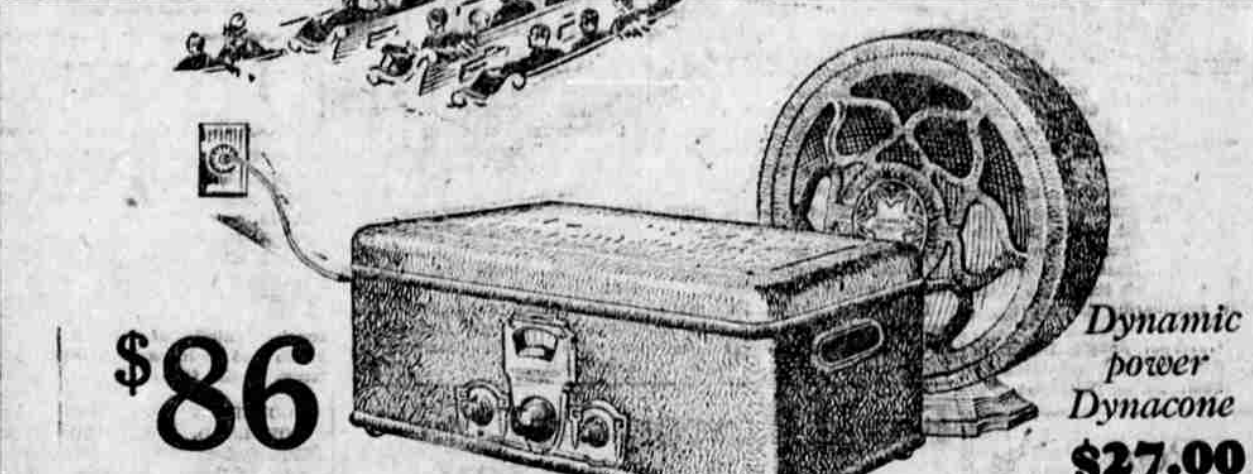
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
