ery which is located on Spring street. King stated that to date the Gold Metal company has been shipping in 1000 pounds of cheese a week, and the response to this brand was so great that the company decided to install a Klamath plant which will handle from 500 to 600 gallons of skimmed milk daily. F. M. Ashley will be in charge of this branch. While it will operate entirely apart from the City Creamery the new plant will be supplied with steam and power from the creamery.

Naturally, the Babe's greatest ambition both from an artistic and financial point of view, is to make this season the one of his greatest triumph.

The Babe told me personally while we were golfing together one day, that he will bend every effort to, and he sincerely believes that he will, break his own home run record of 60 circuit clouts this year. And if he does, the Yankee management can rest assured that they will be called upon to produce a three-year contract calling for "one hundred grand" next year.

Ruth was entirely satisfied with his record of home runs last year. In fact, it ran higher than he anticipated.

REBELS LEAVE TORREON TODAY

bloodless entry. The rebels who had held Durango were reported as fleeing northward along a spur line leading to Tepic. This would leave them facing a long overland trek on foot and horseback to reach the next railroad point.

The federal army closing in on Torreon is estimated as high as 20,000, while General Escobar, the rebel chieftain, is stated to have only 5,000 men.

The only line of retreat apparently left him is northward to Chihuahua.

The insurgents claimed that the railroad junction of Canitas was occupied by revolutionaries yesterday. However, an Associated Press staff correspondent with the federal army filed a dispatch from the place, giving no indication that the rebels were anywhere near it.

Reports from the west coast conflict sharply. The insurgents reported that Mazatlan was virtually surrounded. The government, on the other hand, stated that the rebels have retreated as far north as San Blas, a railroad junction in northern Sinaloa. Cullacn, occupied by the rebels for almost a week, was again claimed in the federal ranks.

A train bombing took place at the small town of Obregon in Guajalato, but no damage was caused. Among those on the train was Arthur Schoenfeld, former counselor of the American embassy in Mexico City, who is now en route to Bulgaria to take up the post of American minister there.

REFUGEES ARE SAVED TODAY

Alabama, where the Pea and Choctawhatchee rivers and their numerous tributaries were sent out of their banks on one of the worst floods in years by unceasing rains of the last week.

Grave fears were held for residents of Geneva, a city of 3,500 population where the situation was described as "very bad" by a national guard plane that flew over the town.

Col. W. A. Gayle, in charge of relief at Elba, said the known death list there stood at five, but that his men were looking for more bodies. Fifteen hundred persons had been removed to cemetery hill this morning. A hundred or more school children were still marooned in the school building.

The Red Cross today was taking steps to keep down disease in the refugee camps. Measles had broken out in one camp and serum was taken into the area by boats.

In Georgia, where the other known death occurred, rivers which last week went out of their banks, again were rising, although the Chattahoochee, which forms the boundary between Georgia and Alabama, was receding. West Point, Ga., was under water and many residents had moved from their homes. The 400 residents of Newnan who moved to a neighboring village last week, again were leaving their homes.

Northwestern Florida expected general high waters as the crest of the Alabama streams flowed toward the gulf. Caryville, Fla., already was under several feet of water.

Floods and medicines were being dropped from airplanes on all inundated districts.

DOTHAN, Ala., March 16. (A. P.)—Reporters for the Dothan Eagle returned here at 9:30 a. m. with word that the last of 3,500 residents of Geneva had been removed from immediate danger to refugee camps at nearby towns. Dr. Arthur Keyton of Dothan returned from a refugee camp at Samson with word that sanitary conditions were bad there.

DOTHAN, Ala., March 16. (A. P.)—The Dothan Eagle was advised today that flood waters are standing at a depth of twenty feet in the business district of Geneva, a city of 3,500 population located approximately 20 miles southwest of here.

NATIONAL GUARD BASE, Near Elba, Ala., March 16. (A. P.)—Lieut. Col. Ulric N. James of the national guard and Walter Rosser, staff photographer for the Birmingham News and Age Herald, were rescued today after having been in the water since 3 p. m. yesterday when their boat capsized.

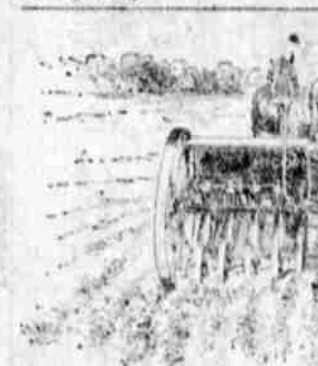
MADISON PARK, Ala., March 16. (AP)—The Alabama river extended over a territory six miles wide here today. The stream was reported at a depth of 54.2 feet, 19.2 feet above flood stage. The water was said to be higher by several inches than in the 1919 flood.

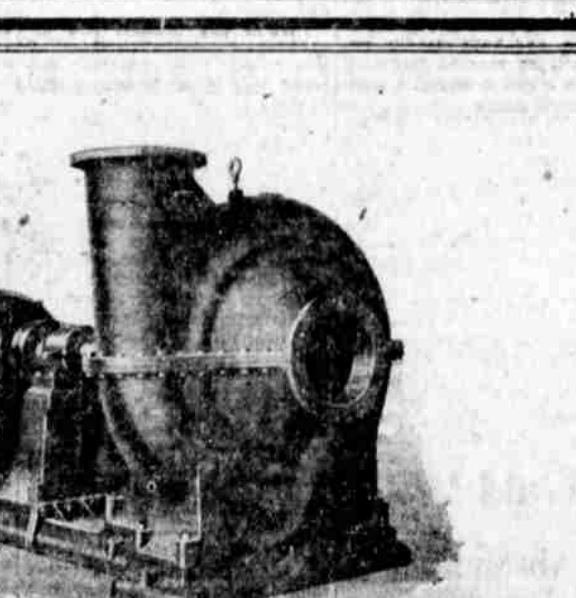
