face a forgery charge. Charges of forgery and auto theft have been preferred against Graham in Lake county, and he is also wanted on forgery counts in Deschutes, Jackson and Marion counties.

Graham has been one jump ahead of the police since March 8, when, officers say, he started out on his career of crime.

As a representative of George Grizzle, owner of a monumental work in this city, Graham started out March 8 for Bend, presumably to solicit new business, before he departed he is charged with passing a number of bad checks in Klamath Falls.

In Bend, he is said to have passed more bad checks, and in Lakeview he is charged with not only passing \$600 in bad checks but trading in his employer's car for a Hudson coupe, in which he made his escape.

As each bad check was reported by the banks, the hue and cry to apprehend and prosecute the man grew louder and louder. Law enforcement agencies up and down the coast were notified, posters with the man's description were sent out and a description was broadcast from a Portland radio station.

Low learned of the man's former residence, and, with a tip from an unrevealed source, became convinced that Graham was hiding in the vicinity of Drew. His deduction proved correct, and Graham's arrest this morning followed.

In addition to his purported activities in Bend, Klamath Falls and Lakeview, Graham is charged with passing a bad check to the secretary of state for his automobile license, and of issuing bad checks in Medford.

How John E. Graham, accused forger and confidence man de luxe, managed to obtain the confidence of Lakeview business men and then, when the time was "ripe," cashed \$600 in checks, is graphically described in an article appearing in the Lake County Examiner.

As an employee of George Grizzle, of the Grizzle Granite works of Klamath Falls, Graham had made frequent trips to Lakeview. He secured the trust of that city's business men.

Finally he decided on the big chance, the article states, and quickly passed from one business house to another, cashing checks of fairly large denomination.

When he had made the rounds, the newspaper story continues, he drove Grizzle's car to a Lakeview garage, traded it in for a Hudson coupe, and then hustled out of Lakeview for parts unknown.

Despite widespread newspaper publicity and radio broadcasting, the man is still at large.

STRANGE FRAUD IS DISCOVERED

BUDAPEST, Hungary, March 16. (AP)—Five years ago, in order to marry his sweetheart, Josef Bako, a married man, secretly exhumed the body of a brother, carried it home, dressed it in his own clothes, placed his own wedding ring on the dead man's finger and fled after setting the house afire.

The authorities finding the charred body which they believed to be that of Bako, notified to the death and Bako's wife collected \$6,000 in insurance for the destroyed building and \$350 on her husband's life insurance policy. She remarried the following year.

To her surprise, however, she recognized Bako on the street yesterday and had him arrested. On being questioned at police headquarters, Bako was said to have confessed the unusual fraud and today was held for bigamy and vandalism.

NEW YORK, March 16. (AP)—Al Singer, east side featherweight, again has taken Bud Taylor's measure, and, has proved his gameness.

Accused of a lack of courage, especially when hit about the mid-section, Singer withstood a terrific body assault to capture a close decision over Taylor in ten furious rounds in Madison Square Garden last night.

The decision was received with considerable criticism by some of the 20,000 spectators, about half the ringside experts and one of the judges. One judge and the referee voted for Singer and the other judge for Taylor. There were no knockdowns.

PROHIBITION OFFICER IS EXONERATED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 16. (AP)—The final chapter in the life and death of Charles Pearson, 29, trapper and who turned to the operation of a liquor still only to meet death when shot down by prohibition officers, were being written at Bend today where Pearson's body was to be buried this afternoon. The case was closed last night, as far as the state is concerned, when a coroner's jury brought in a report exonerating E. K. Oakes, state prohibition officer who shot Pearson down.

After eight hours of investigation the jury found that Pearson died from a bullet fired from Oakes' revolver, but that the officer had shot in self-defense and in accordance with his duties.

District Attorney Buffington, upon receiving the report, said, "so far as I am concerned, that closes the case."

The wedding it was said will be held 53 days hence in the Beverly Hills home of Buster Keaton, film actor, and his wife, Natalie Talmadge Keaton.
