'TIGER' JOHNNY CLINE ARRIVES FOR BIG FIGHT

San Francisco Middleweight in Great Shape for Main Event.

A veteran of the squared circle, a fighter who has met the best of his class, including Dave Shinde last summer with whom he fought to a fast draw, arrived in Klamath Falls today in the person of "Tiger" Johnny Cline. San Francisco middleweight, who meets Walter Cleghorn, Eskimo middleweight sensation of Seattle, in the main event of a fight card in the Legion Memorial hall next Wednesday night.

Cline is in great shape. He has been fighting main events regularly in the bay district and in Eureka, Cal., recently and is anxious to "get over" with the fans in order to be a future Klamath drawing card.

Cline has a fighter's face but not a fighter's tongue. He is intelligent and talks easily and naturally.

For ten years he has been in the fight game. He started in Hoboken, N. J., and worked his way on up through the various pugilistic classifications. He has had 350 fights and has met and defeated some of the greatest fighters who have ever drawn on boxing gloves in an American ring.

Last summer Cline met Dave Shinde twice. In their first meeting the San Francisco fighter got a draw with the famous middleweight but was outpointed in the second.

He recently met Jack Malone and Jack Roche in main events. "My natural style of fighting is boring in with both hands swinging," Cline said. "However, I can box an opponent just as effectively as slug with him. I'll let the other fellow pick his style and then try and beat him at his own game."

"I don't mind telling you that I'm anxious to get over big in Klamath Falls. This is a good fight town, and I'd like to show here again. You can depend on it that insofar as I am concerned, I'll give the very best that I'm in."

Cline will work out in the Legion gym at 6 p. m.

Heavy Hand of Judge Landis Hits Baseball

CHICAGO, March 18. (UP)—In one of his characteristic "let the blow fall where it may" decisions, Judge Keneaw Mountain Landis, high commissioner of organized baseball Saturday released ten baseball players, valued at \$100,000 or more, from their contracts and imposed fines of \$5,000 on 11 clubs.

The judge declared that the clubs, including Washington, Philadelphia, Cleveland and St. Louis in the American league, had violated the major and minor league rules by failing to truthfully report actual transactions.

He stated specifically that "Bily" Evans, general manager of Cleveland, and Phil Ball, owner of the St. Louis Browns, had represented their clubs as "maintaining absolute integrity" in certain deals investigated, whereas "subsequent investigation revealed that they had concealed facts."

Player deals were kept "under cover" by the clubs, the commissioner said. "dummy" checks being sent to the commissioner's office for purchases actually not made.

The players released were Harold McKinn, Decatur, Ill.; Roy Spencer, Columbus, S. C.; Kyle Aderson, Indianapolis; Gus Cantrell, Baltimore and Washington; M'Graw, K. Simons, Charles Glanzer, Ralph Judd and J. B. Partridge of Birmingham; Ernest Wingard, Milwaukee and Philadelphia, and Claude Jordan, St. Louis and Milwaukee.

PELICAN CITY MILL RESUMES

The former Wheeler-Olmstead Lumber company sawmill, of Pelican City, leased to the Shaw Bertram Lumber company for the ensuing year, resumed operations this morning on a one-shift basis, after being shut down for the winter.

Logs from the Shaw Bertram logging camp near Chemult will be shipped to the mill over the Southern Pacific main line.

The sawmill is owned by F. Hill Hunter, R. H. Hovey and Willis Walker. Shaw Bertram leased the mill last year also.

Golden Prince Wins Big Race

TIA JUANA, Mexico, March 18. (AP)—Golden Prince, winner of the \$100,000 added Cofroth handicap at the Tia Juana Jockey Club track here yesterday, will be shipped to Chicago and Kentucky tracks to continue his racing campaign, it was announced today.

Golden Prince came by his victory in the Cofroth trial in one of the greatest races ever seen at Tia Juana. The "Kentucky Express" beat Nalshapur a good long neck for the world's richest stake—a prize of \$98,900 to the winner. Scimitar was third, beaten off six lengths, and Quick Return, a surprise, fourth.

The race was run in two minutes and two and three fifth seconds. This equals the record held by Carlisle. The pace was killing, with the quarter in :23-1-5, half in :47 and mile in 1:37-1-5. Golden Prince packed 112 pounds. Carlisle toted 100. Racing precedent really gives the track record in case of equal times to the horse carrying the most weight, thus entitling Golden Prince to the mile and a quarter record.

LOGGING CAMP IS SHUT DOWN

Unable to extend its logging line until the snow melts, the Big Lakes Box company logging camp which has been operating throughout the winter, shut down today for several weeks. It was announced today by A. J. Vore, vice president of the concern.

The logging crew has cut away all the timber adjacent to the logging line and to continue it would be necessary to extend the logging line. Unable to do this because of deep snow, the camp was forced to suspend operations.

RANDALL HELD ON CHARGE OF CHECK FORGERY

MEDFORD HIGH STATE CHAMPS

Pear Pickers Defeat Astoria for Title Saturday Night

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, March 18. (UP)—Medford high school won the Oregon state high school basketball championship here Saturday night by defeating Astoria high, 35 to 14.

Medford led the end of the first quarter, 4 to 3. At half time it was 8 to 5 in favor of the pear pickers, Astoria playing better in this period. Medford went far out in front in the third quarter, running the score to 22-8.

The Astoria team appeared weak in comparison with its offensive against Washington last night, and the whole game was much slower than many of the preliminary games of the tournament. SLAUGHTER OF Trout Stopped by Commission

BEND, Ore., March 18.—The passing of "ice fishing" in Central Oregon was forecast here today when the recent ruling of the state game commission advancing the opening of the angling season at East, Elk and Paulina lakes from April 15 to May 15 was studied. This move, it is believed here, is directly aimed at anglers who visit the high mountain lakes each year on or after April 15 and get their limit in a brief time from holes cut in the thick ice.

According to reports, information has been reaching the commission in recent years that early angling in the Paulina crater has taken on all earmarks of a "slaughter" of hungry trout—fish that have been imprisoned under sheets of ice for many months. Advancing the opening date on the high lakes to May 15 means, it is explained, that the ice will have disappeared, or at least will be badly disintegrated, when the season opens. The new ruling will be in effect this year.

Fish Slaughter to End.
In past years, East lake has been a mecca for anglers who have no fear of deep snow and a long hike over many miles of drifts. The migration to East lake for the opening of the fishing season usually starts on April 14, or at about 1 o'clock on the morning of April 15. A half hour before sunrise, holes have been carved through the ice and fishing tackle is in place. From this point on, the angler merely has to "reload" his tackle and drop his hooks into the blue water, hauling out fish after fish, say those who are opposed to the so-called ice fishing.

PLANE CARRIES 36

LOS ANGELES, March 18.—The giant Keystone airplane "Patrician" broke the world's pay load record here late today by taking off from Rogers airport with thirty-six people aboard and attaining an altitude of 10,200 feet within 21 minutes after leaving the ground, officials of the airport announced.

BILL THOMASON BACK IN CITY

Bill Thomason, picturesque defendant in one of the most sensational murder trials ever conducted in Klamath, has returned to Klamath, and planned today to leave immediately for the Ball ranch in northern Klamath.

Thomason was acquitted of the charge of murdering Veloy Pearson on the Main street of Clifton. The case attracted considerable attention.

"Well, I'm back," he announced with a smile, "but whether I'll stay here remains to be seen. I've got those cattle up on the Ball ranch to take care of—some of them are my own, you know—and I couldn't stay away longer. I've been visiting my brother in Douglas county, enjoying the first vacation in years. By golly, I deserved one after that trial."

Thomason said he did not anticipate any trouble on the reservation.

"I am considering," he added, "moving over to the Burns country, but have made no definite decision."
