ESKIMO INDIAN IN GOOD SHAPE FOR HARD BOUT

Walter Cleghorn Will Meet "Tiger" Johnny Cline in Main Event.

In perfect shape for his ten-round main event tomorrow evening with "Tiger" Johnny Cline, Walter Cleghorn, Eskimo Indian sensation of Seattle, was scheduled to arrive in Klamath Falls this afternoon. He will work out this evening in the Legion gym, as will Cline.

The stocky, husky, swarthy middleweight has been fighting right along and is in good shape for his clash with Cline. For both boys the fight is of exceeding importance as Cline is a "big shot" in the bay district while Cleghorn has a big ring following in the Puget Sound and Portland section.

Cleghorn has a "leaping" left hand and a great body attack. He prefers to get in close and mix it, crowding his opponent at all times.

In his repertoire he has a varied assortment of short jolting hooks and straight solid rights and lefts. One of his favorite blows is a lightning half hook, half uppercut, to the jaw.

Cline was quietly confident.

"I know this boy's tough, but then, for that matter, practically every boy I've met is tough," he smiled. "I seem to draw all the tough ones to crack and I'd just as soon crack this one as the next one. In fact, I'd rather, because I want to get over in this section."

Cline and Orville Barr put on a show last night. They swapped punches and mixed it to the delight of the boys who gathered around the training ring in the Legion building.

SEMI-WINDUP AND PRELIMS WILL BE FAST

Mike Daley Will Meet Good Boy in Johnny McCoy.

With such two "hot shots" as Walter Cleghorn and "Tiger" Johnny Cline as main eventers, it might be supposed that the commission would ease down a bit on the preliminaries and semi-windup.

On the contrary, however, the preliminary bouts of tomorrow night's card look better than ever, from the curtain raiser to the semi-windup.

Mike Daley, Pelican City puncher, meets Johnny McCoy, Seattle middleweight, in the six-round semi-windup. Daley has been fighting in Klamath for several years. He is noted for grit and determination and devastating punches in either hand, the combination of which has carried him to many victories against clever and faster opponents.

Fights When in Distress. Daley has shown that he fights best when he is in distress. Time and again he has been staggered until his knees wobbled, only to muster up a last offensive in the closing rounds that brought him victory.

McCoy's record book has not arrived, but he is said to be a hard, two-listed scrapper from the Puget Sound country.

Joe Sielaff and Ted Tanner fight a four-round preliminary. Sielaff at one time was a great main eventer.

Tanner is a young Klamath fighter who will give Sielaff something to think about before the bout draws to a close.

"Steamboat" Jackson of Spokane lost his first start in Klamath on a foul to Wilbur Harrington in the fourth round of their special event. Jackson had won all the way up to that point.

Changes Mind.

Jackson was so upset by the referee's ruling that he declared he would never "fight in this place again." But the "Steamboat" has changed his mind and will be matched against a good hard fighter in the person of Johnny Wilson.

Jackson has long arms which lash out like trip hammers; and whenever he is hit hard he displays a grin that splits his face from ear to ear.

Filipino to Fight. The flashy little Filipino, Pete Magallanes of Seattle, who outpointed Harold Wright of Chillicothe in the first preliminary of the last card, opens this card against Frankie Monroe.

Magallanes has a great stabbing left that flashes in and out like a rapier. Frankie Monroe has staged a come-back and is anxious to "get by" the Klamath cash customers.

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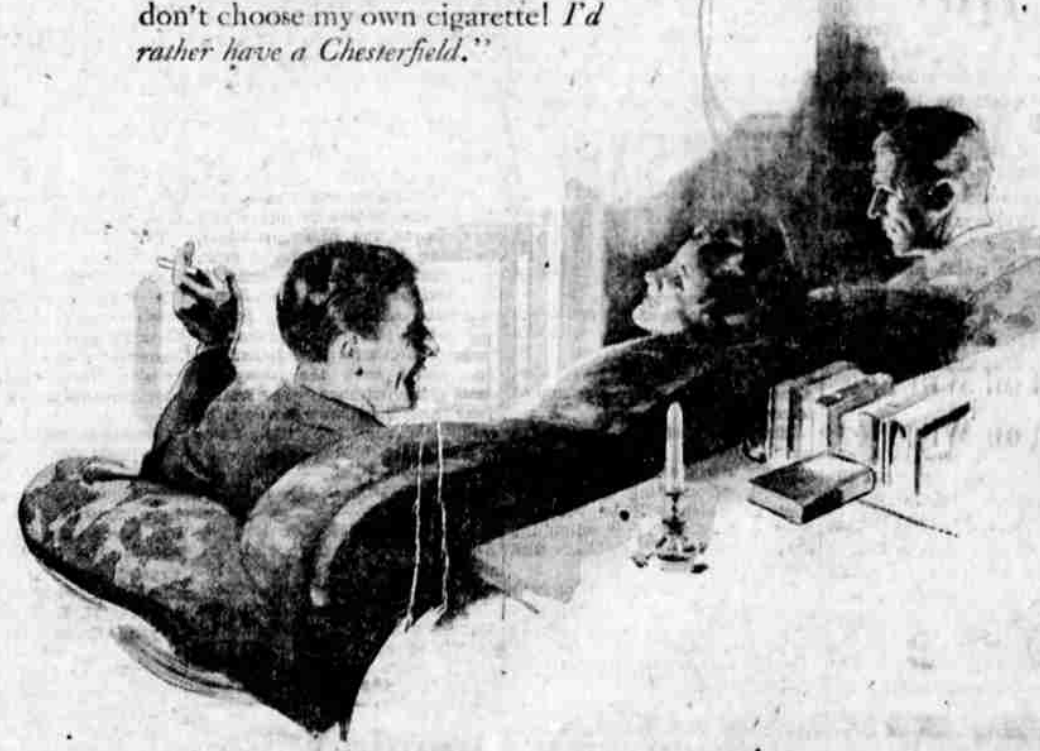
