Pickering, president of the Pickering Lumber company, in a public statement, said adequate housing facilities must be provided for his mill employees, otherwise he would be forced to establish a colony of workmen adjacent to the mill. He added that his company would employ a high type of workman who would insist upon good homes and living conditions.

Miss Anna Mae Johnston will be married at the close of the school term. Miss Johnston has taught in the city schools for several years, and is one of the popular teachers of the city school system.

HOOVER GIVES IDEAS ON LAW

support of the press and every good citizen of the country.

The president is moving with caution in the difficult task of picking those who are to compose his law enforcement commission and the best information available is that he has not yet definitely decided on a single member.

Many Names Presented

Scores of names have been presented for his consideration, but many of these already have been eliminated for one reason or another and he now is described as literally scouring the country in the effort to find suitable men who will be willing to undertake so gigantic a task.

The personnel of this commission probably will be more carefully scrutinized by the country than any that has been named, certainly in many years. This will be largely by reason of the fact that an investigation of the enforcement of the prohibition amendment is to be included in its work.

Liquor Question Paramount

This phase of the whole inquiry will be the one to attract the greatest public attention and probably will require more exhaustive study than any other. Leaders of the organized sets and drys as well as many others will be heard and the testimony of many present and former prohibition enforcement officers will be taken.

In the effort to find the causes of present abuses in the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment the commission will inquire into federal enforcement statutes to determine whether the abuses are inherent in those laws and if so what changes might reasonably be expected to relieve the situation.

Increased Enforcement

Meanwhile, there are to be increased efforts at enforcement of the Volstead and other dry acts. Enforcement officials appointed or retained by Mr. Hoover are regarded as friendly to the prohibition cause and it is expected that they will be given a free hand in an effort to dry up the country.

President Hoover has not yet announced precisely what enforcement activities now carried forward by the treasury will be transferred to the justice department, nor is it clear whether he holds such transfer as made without an act of congress.

Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt is in charge of prohibition enforcement in the justice department and it is understood that when the transfer is made the scope of her duties as assistant attorney general will be considerably enlarged.

will bring victory to the Rebel forces.

Evacuation of the insurgent headquarters at Torreón yesterday was characterized as a strategic movement by General Escobar.

"I can see no significance to the fact that the enemy occupies a town which we intentionally evacuated tactically."

"From our new base we are preparing an offensive against the Calles forces with efficient aid of elements which are cooperating simultaneously in Zacatecas, Aguas Calientes, San Luis Potosi and other places. The spirit of our forces every day grows better and they will be in shape to begin the decisive battle."

"With our troops have been incorporated 1500 volunteers who have united with us recently. All of these operations are preliminary to a general plan which we have adopted and which now we are beginning to execute."

NACO, CONORA, MEXICO, March 19, (AP)—Federal activity in this government stronghold became pronounced this morning after General Augustino Olachea, Federal commander, received reports that Rebel troops in Agua Prieta had left during the night for an unknown destination.

Evacuation of Agua Prieta by General Ramon Yencupio and his 500 Yaqui and Maya Indian soldiers was confirmed shortly afterward by Mexico consul Tamez in Douglas, Ariz. Tamez informed Fernando D. Chacon, Mexican consul at Naco, Ariz., that a Rebel troop movement had begun.

WASHINGTON, March 19, (AP)—The administration will continue to permit Rebels who may come over the border from Mexico to use the United States as a sanctuary.

APPLICATIONS RECEIVED FOR MODOC GRAZING

Officers of the Modoc National Forest are approving grazing applications for the season of 1929 and expect that a total of almost 10,000 head of cattle and horses and 100,000 head of sheep will be grazed on the forest during the coming season by several hundred grazing permittees.

Although there is a shortage of precipitation in some parts, range prospects for the 1929 season, generally speaking are good. It is many years since there was so much snow piled in the canyons, even though in the western section the snowfall was light.

The Modoc Forest is the largest grazing national forest in the State of California, practically all the stockmen running cattle and sheep being local ranchers living in the large valleys within and surrounding the National Forest area.
