

Cleghorn and Cline Both Predict Decisive Victory in Fight Tonight

**SELL-OUT FOR
LEGION MATCH
IS INDICATED**

**Exceptional Interest in
Main Event Shown;
Other Bouts Fest.**

Two fighters who are ranked as leading middleweights of the west, who have never been knocked out and lost few decisions, and whose records include wins over some of the best fighters in the United States, meet tonight in the main event of what gives every appearance of being the best fight card which has ever been staged in Klamath Falls.

They are Walter Cleghorn, sensational and colorful Eskimo fighter of Seattle and "Tiger" Johnny Cline, San Francisco, veteran of 350 fights and a record as long as one's arm.

Seldom has there been so much interest in a fight and indications today pointed to a complete sell-out. The fight will begin at 8:45 p. m. and fans are advised to come early for tickets if they want good seats. The match will be staged in the Legion Memorial hall.

Salient features of each fighter's record are told on other columns of this page.

Cleghorn weighs between 155 and 160 pounds, height 5 feet 6 inches, is 21 years of age, has 70 fights of which many were won over the knock-out route and has been boxing four years. He has lost four decisions, is the middleweight champion of the northwest and Alaska. The stocky Eskimo was born in Selkirk, Alaska, and is one of the most popular fighters in the northwest.

Cline was born in Hoboken, N. J., started in fighting ten years ago as a bantam and worked on up through the ranks to a middleweight. He weighs 155 pounds, is 28 years of age, height five feet nine. He is recognized as a great fighter and is anxious to see how he can be a steady man event attraction here.

After a close, over Cleghorn's record this morning and remarked enthusiastically that he had never heard of the boys the Eskimo had knocked out.

"Oh sure," he agreed, "he's a tough boy, but I've met lots of boys tougher than he is. I notice when he got drawn with Lefty Cooper, Walcott Langford and George Dickson — they're good, believe me."

"No, I've never been knocked out and I guess I'd better knock out wood. I don't care how good this Eskimo is, he'll never put a kayo over on me, that's certain. When I'm knocked out, I'm through with boxing. Until I do get the sleep punch, I'm going right on."

Cleghorn had little to say. He was resting quietly today for the big mix.

"I expect one of the hardest fights of my career tonight," he said, "and all I have to say is that I'll do my best. Nobody can do more than that."
