## Smith Silent on Leadership Tammany Hall

**NEW YORK, March 21.** (UP)—The attitude of former Governor Alfred E. Smith tonight had become the most interesting of numerous puzzles surrounding the efforts of Tammany Hall to select a successor to George O'Ryan, who has resigned as leader of the Wigwag.

The former governor arrived in New York today from Albany and newspapermen found him at the Biltmore hotel, where he maintains his headquarters while in town, contentedly eating a chop and reading a newspaper.

"Not a word," said the former Governor with much emphasis. "Not a line do you get out of me about anything."

"I am a private citizen and I have nothing to do with anything in politics—right now."

He wouldn't even listen to questions about the Tammany leadership. Even the former governor's warmest supporters were puzzled by his seeming lack of interest. There was a feeling, however, that he deliberately was keeping out of the situation and in doing so was not forgetting that there is another presidential election four years from now. If he takes no part in the naming of Tammany's leader now, in four years he will reap the benefit of the good Tammany may accomplish under new leadership and will not have the blame for any of the bad.

The negotiations surrounding the selection of a new leader seemed to have forced Martin McCue, John F. Curry and Edwin Ahearne into leading positions. Curry was credited with having the largest number of votes pledged to him, he being conceded eight votes out of the 23 on the executive committee which names the leader.
