STAGE JUBILEE
INSIDE JOINTSeven Chinese Gambling
Hosts are Arrested in
Portland Raid

PORTLAND, March 22. (AP)—Trap doors, concealed getaway and an elaborately guarded entrance failed to save seven Chinese hosts and 69 or 70 longshoremen guests from arrest today in a raid by the sheriff's office.

The place, ostensibly a Chinese store, had chuck-luck, blackjack and crap games in operation, the raiders said. When the work of conveying the arrested men to the county jail began, more than 500 longshoremen gathered in the street to cheer the work along.

Turk Chin, said by deputy sheriffs to be the proprietor of the place, was arrested, as were Lee Ke, Charles Fong, James Lee, Joe Lee, Henry Lee, Wo For and Foo Chin, alleged operators.

For three days the sheriff's office had had men inside the place under guise of longshoremen. They played the games and they prevented escape of the proprietors and customers through a circuitous raid-escape which opened in a jewelry store next door.

When officers had battered way into the establishment the longshoremen inside staged a jubilee. They laid into the lunch counter supplies, making themselves generous sandwiches and pouring tea and coffee.

The sheriff said longshoremen, out of work, had been spending all their time and money in the resort. This explained the celebration.

IRISH CONFETTI

CHICAGO, March 22.—Bricks taken from walls of the ancient city of Ur of the Chaldees, made 5500 years ago showing the fingerprints of the makers, were displayed at the American Ceramic Exposition here recently.

In contrast, more than \$250,000 worth of the finest American chinaware, glass, pottery, stoneware, tile, terra cotta, brick and other ceramic wares were shown.

One of the exhibits was a new "mystery material," as yet unnamed, which it is claimed, is so light and yet so strong that it may be possible to build structures which will tower 125 stories high. It will not break down at a temperature of 3250 degrees and is an excellent insulator against cold and heat.
