JIM McLARIN BEATS MILLER IN SLOW FIGHT

Slugging Ability of Both Boys Proves to Be Over Stated

NEW YORK, March 23. (AP)—The boys who pay "the fight" may be expected to view with disinterested amusement any future pugilistic encounter between well advertised sluggers.

Having understood that Jimmy McLarin and Ray Miller could hit with the lethal power of a stick of dynamite, 21,000 of the fistful faithful trustfully paid \$111,000 to see McLarin outpoint this blonde Chicagoan last night in a dull ten round bout at Madison Square Garden.

Miller, possibly best of the lightweight left hook punchers in the business, stopped McLarin in a sensational and bloody scrap at Detroit some months ago despite the fact that McLarin seems definitely to have outgrown the 135-pound division, there was almost unprecedented

interest in their return meeting. The crowd came to cheer a slugging bee; they remained to boo a none-to-good boxing exhibition marked by as many clinches as there were in any of the heavyweight eliminations of a year or so ago.

Jimmy and Ray had developed such a healthy respect for each other's slugging ability that each felt uneasy unless the fighting was at close quarters where a clean punch is next to impossible.

In justice to the Chicagoan it might be pointed out that he conceded too many pounds and tired badly toward the finish. He scaled 133 1-2, McLarin 138 3-4.

There was little, if any, disagreement with the official decision. The Associated Press score card gave McLarin eight rounds and Miller two, the first and the fourth.

G. SONNENBERG RETAINS TITLE

OXFORD LOSES AT CAMBRIDGE

Veteran Oarsmen Bring Victory to College Again

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, England, March 23. (AP)—Cambridge, with a veteran aggregation of oarsmen, scored its sixth consecutive victory over Oxford in the 1st annual boat race between the two famous English Universities today.

The Cambridge crew, taking an early lead, crossed the finish line seven full lengths ahead of their rivals from the Isis.

Cambridge's veterans, pulling a strong and steady stroke, jumped into a half length lead at the end of the first half mile, increased this advantage to three quarters of a length at the mile and then pulled away from their rivals during the rest of the struggle.

The winners covered the four miles and a quarter in 19 minutes and 24 seconds, well behind the record of 18:29 set by Oxford in 1911.

OVER-EXERTION IS FATAL FOR COLLEGE YOUTH

RENO, Nev., March 23 (AP)—Carl Voigt, 21, University of Nevada athlete, who collapsed after a practice sprint on the campus field Tuesday, died last night from hemorrhage of the brain.

His death was the result of over-exertion, physicians said. Voigt, who had been instructed by the university coach to run the 220-yard course, attempted to stretch his sprint to 440 yards, but fell unconscious before he had completed the run.

Tom Loughran Shows He Is Not Too Heavy

CHICAGO, March 23. (AP)—Having convinced the most skeptical he can make the 175-pound limit, Tommy Loughran settled down to his training grind again today for his light heavyweight championship battle with Mickey Walker.

To spike the overweight rumor, Loughran weighed himself before 2,000 fans yesterday. He set the scales at 178 pounds, but did not tip the beam at that figure. With that, he stepped off, leaving many guessing his weight from 173 to 177 pounds.

Promoter Paddy Harmon, meanwhile, proved the fallacy of another rumor—that the \$7,000,000 Chicago stadium would not be ready for the match Thursday night. He held open house, and exhibited letters from architects who said the vast amphitheater could be put in readiness for the fight within 24 hours' notice.

Walker was due from New York today to begin training. He has been working out in New Jersey.

er than originally designed, can display only part of the 35,000 articles listed in the Ward catalogue. To supplement them, the company has operating 18 large department stores in cities of larger population as well as department stores in each of its seven mail-order centers. During 1929 Ward will open at least 18 new department stores, doubling this type of stores, while new eight-story mail order centers with 700,000 square feet of floor space will be opened in Denver, Colorado, and Albany, New York.

These stores are greatly strengthening Ward's position as a nation-wide distributor of merchandise. Intended to supplement the mail-order business, the company says "Our chain and retail stores have so increased in volume that we are now able to supply nearly all customers' needs directly over the counter."

Carefully survey Klamath Falls. Klamath Falls was selected as a location for one of Ward's chain stores after a careful survey and investigation revealed the resources and possibilities of the territory.

It is not expected that all the business of the store will be drawn from Klamath Falls proper, as these stores usually draw from a trade area of from 30 to 100 miles. From the experience in other towns where chain stores have been located, a large percentage of these customers will make their purchase from the local store and this has the effect of stimulating business with other local merchants, it was said.

At store openings it is not uncommon to have as many as 15,000 people attend the opening.

Employ Local Help. It is the policy of the company to employ practically all the store help locally and applications are already being received at the Portland office. There will be referred to the local manager as soon as he is selected.

Ward's stores are now being opened in many cities.

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
