Redmen's Lodge of Klamath Formed Saturday Evening at Big Meeting in Moose Hall

With a charter list of 51 well known residents of Klamath Falls, Chief Twineck Tribe, No. 73 of the Red Men's Lodge was formed at Moose hall on Saturday evening.

The Grand Chiefs of the Great Council of Oregon, Great Sachem, H. Swint; Great Prophet, Dr. D. F. Feltows and Great Chief of Records, E. M. Wells of Portland; Past Grand Sachem, E. D. Gibson of Bend, acting Great Senior Sachem and Great Junior Sachem, Oregon, assisted by the degree team of Westonka Tribe, No. 1, of Medford, kindled the council fire of the Great Council of Oregon, elected the charter list to membership, conferred the three degrees in full form on those present, elected the officers of the new lodge, installed them in their stations and instructed them as to their various duties.

At the conclusion of the installation of officers, the Tomahawk of authority was vested to the keeping of the Sachem, W. C. Maclela. The Great Sachem declared the Great Council fire quenched and the council fire of the new tribe was kindled, after which the Chiefs disposed of the necessary business of the lodge.

During the ceremonies Captain O. C. Applegate was made an honorary life member of the new tribe by unanimous standing vote. At the close of the ceremonies E. I. Hallah of St. Helens, Oregon, congratulated the order on its splendid membership.

Elective officers include: Prophet, Captain O. C. Applegate; Sachem, W. C. Maclela; Senior Sachem, F. M. Cory; Junior Sachem, N. H. Carter.

Ex-President Pennsylvania Road Passes

PHILADELPHIA, March 25. (AP)—Samuel Rea, who rose from chairman in a Pennsylvania railroad engineer corps to the presidency of the great railway system, is dead.

With his wife and daughter at his bedside, he died yesterday at his home near Ardmore, a suburb of heart disease. He was 73 years old. Funeral services will be held tomorrow.

Mr. Rea retired from the presidency of the Pennsylvania in 1925, after 24 years of almost continuous service and nine days after he had celebrated his 70th birthday.

One of his outstanding achievements was the construction of the Pennsylvania tunnels under the Hudson and East rivers at New York. For this work the University of Pennsylvania, Princeton and Lafayette college gave him honorary degrees.

FEAR LEVEES MAY GIVE WAY

The Lima Lake district is holding out with a report that the water has reached its peak there. The village of Meyer behind the levee would be wiped out; should there be a break. A part of Canton, Missouri, opposite Meyer, is under water, among its submerged buildings being the high school.

Further down on the Missouri shore La Grange is isolated, with water nearly up to the main business street. The Marion county, Missouri, levees are still holding, but like those on the Illinois side are in great danger. An army of men is working desperately building up the low and weak places and attempting to stop seepage.

CHICAGO, March 25. (AP)—

The Mississippi and Missouri rivers still threaten to batter down levees and overrun their banks today as patrolmen and apprehensive residents watched eagerly for signs of relief.

Reports from Keokuk, Iowa, that the river had fallen six inches were gratefully received by levee patrolmen especially in the Gregory, Missouri district, where the fight had been almost given up as hopeless yesterday.

Canton, Mo., was also threatened by the exceedingly high stage of the river. Members of the national guard and naval militia patrolled the flooded Indian Grove district near Quincy to prevent looting when the water recedes and to assist the families driven from their homes. The first fatality from that section occurred at Bearstons when a youth fell from a dike and was drowned.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 25. (AP)—

Floods rushing down from the Cumberland mountain watershed took a toll of 37 lives in southeastern Kentucky and northern Tennessee over the week end while tornadoes and storms spread death over four other southern states bringing the south's death toll to 49 and possibly more.

Tennessee was the hardest hit with 21 known deaths. Kentucky had six. Alabama had five negro children killed in a tornado. Two negroes were killed in Georgia by a tornado and a white man by lightning. Three negroes were killed in Mississippi in a storm. A boy was killed in North Carolina by a storm.

Mountain streams in eastern Kentucky and Tennessee receded as rapidly as they rose and trapped their victims. Twenty persons, mostly women and children were lost when the Emory river at Harrison, Tennessee left its banks at 3 o'clock yesterday morning. Seven boy scouts and their scoutmaster were swept into White Creek and drowned as they slept. They occupied a cottage on the creek bank during a week end hike. Three members of one family were drowned at Webster, Tenn., bodies of six boy scouts, their scoutmaster and two others have been recovered.

Kentucky's death toll was heaviest in Know and Bell counties where five lives were taken by the sudden freshet. Three were drowned near Barboursville, and two near Pineville. One was drowned in Perry county.
