BEAVERS TAKE SEALS, 3 TO 2 IN FIRST GAME

Eight Pacific Coast League Clubs Open Season Before 55,000

SAN FRANCISCO, March 27. (AP)—Eight Pacific Coast league baseball clubs opened the 1929 season with a bang yesterday in four California cities, to the edification of approximately 55,000 fans.

Before a record coming out crowd of 14,000, the Portland Beavers, with Jack Knight in the box, defeated the Seals on their home lot here, 3 to 2. The highly touted heavy artillery of last year's champions remained solid under the pitching generalship of Knight, who rose one glove the stern opposition of Elmer Jacobs.

Wade Killifer's speedy Missus made an auspicious debut against the Oakland clan at Emeryville, claiming the victory 7 to 4. After the Oaks had staged a glorious rally that least bolstered the hopes of their adherents. More than 12,000 persons witnessed the battle.

L. A. Wins
The north and south met at Los Angeles, and the south triumphed with an invincible battery. The Angels' sluggers rolled up a score of 14 runs, while the Angel twirlers held the Seals to 3. The third inning proved a disastrous debacle for the Indians, when the south-landers dusted off 10 runs in a row. Approximately 15,000 fans saw the game.

Governor C. C. Young at Sacramento rapped out a single as the opening gun in the battle between the Hollywood Stars and the Senators, which the latter won by the score of 8 to 6. It was a game devoid of brilliant plays, with few hits, and rather wild pitching. A "bomber," un-derk by Hank Severid, husky catcher of the Solons, was a big feature of the tussle.

Mac Smith Best Stylist Among All the Pros

MacDonald Smith has always been to me one of the strangest characters in golf. Out of competition for many years on account of ill health, and after having been almost a semi-invalid, he suddenly flashed back into competition. He is probably the greatest stylist among the pros. "You're the only one of us who 'sweep' the balls off the tees," Mac," said Gene Sarazen one day, "the rest of us just 'punch' 'em off."

Since his many years of illness MacDonald Smith has never been in good health, and his physique cannot stand the rigors of constant tournament competition. He enters in very few tournaments, but recently won the Los Angeles Open after trailing Tommy Armour by ten strokes after the first 36 holes.

"Whenever I see Mac Smith playing, it reminds me of a dead man shooting golf," said Al Espinosa, "after I remember his years of illness and what he went through with before he got back on his feet and started playing again."

There are several others, but I'm confident on the first six when I say we'll get better pitching this year than any year since we joined the Yanks."

It was a slugging match, with Landies displaying a vicious left, but not sufficient to stop the local boy. Fred Kelly, Portland, knocked out Spud Murphy, Hubbard, in the second round of a scheduled four-round bout. Eddie Graham, Portland, won a decision over Dove Knight, Vernonia, in the curtain raiser.

BOXING TITLE PRESENTATION MEETS PROTEST

CHICAGO, March 27. (AP)—Ray Alvis, manager of Young Jack Thompson, who was defeated by Jackie Fields Monday night for the N. B. welterweight boxing title, said today he would protest the decision awarding Fields the bout and championship. Alvis said the bout was stopped for more than five minutes and the ring was invaded by others than the fighters and referee. Under the rules of the Illinois boxing commission no one except the principals and referee are permitted to enter the ring during the contest except between rounds.

Frankie Monroe, classy little bantam, will meet Austin Rosander of Ashland in another six round bout. Harold Wright of Chilouquin, bantamweight, and Joe Valencia will meet in a six round clash. Bud Jerry and Flash Bailey clash in one four round preliminary, while Angelo Sangennetti will cross fists with a worthy opponent in the curtain raiser.

state's attorney's campaign to dry up Kane county, Carbury said. He was elected on a campaign promise to clean up the county, and in the short time he has been in office has initiated more than 400 raids.

Legality Questioned
The legality of the raid on the Deking home is the crux of the entire affair, Deking's counsel said.

Deputy Roy Smith, suffering from a bullet wound inflicted when Gerald Deking, 12 year old, fired a shot from one of his father's pistols, made a statement yesterday to the state's attorney. He said he fired in self defense believing that Mrs. Deking, rushing to her husband's side, intended to shoot him. The deputy sheriff said he aimed his sawed-off shotgun at her hand, but that he was walking backwards and stumbled, thus accounting for the fact that the charge from the weapon entered the 35 year old woman's body.

"Did Not See Boy"
Smith's statement said, "He stepped from behind the door and shot me in the right leg when I was down." Smith said he fired only one shot. Peter Deking, brother of Joseph, and an eye witness, said two shots were fired. There were two shells on the floor after the shooting was over, he said. Deking's account differed from the deputy's in that the deputy stated Mrs. Deking already had picked up the pistol and aimed it at him, whereas Deking declared Mrs. Deking had just started toward her husband when the shooting started.

Mortally Wounded
Someone threw a tear bomb into the room, Peter Deking said, and Mrs. Deking, choking and mortally wounded, crawled toward the door.

The boy Gerald gave a similar account. "I grabbed one of the guns my daddy dropped, and I shot with it," he said. "It was the first time I ever shot a gun."

Prescribed By Doctor
The boy said that the gallon of wine confiscated by the deputies had been obtained for him, "because the doctor said I should drink a glass every night because I have anaemia."

Peter Deking testified yesterday before a coroner's jury. The inquest was continued until the wounded deputy sheriff is able to appear.

State's Attorney Carbury said he would present the facts to the grand jury, but expressed the opinion that the shooting was self-defense.

WASHINGTON, March 27. (AP)—Prohibition officials today severely criticized methods used by Illinois state prohibition agents in their raid on the home of Joseph Deking at Aurora, Ill., today. At the same time, dry organization heads defended the dry agents' actions.

Prohibition Commissioner Dorgan who has refused to furnish federal agents with gas bombs, said he could not condone use of them by raiding squads.

"Anyone in my organization who adopted such methods would hear from me," he said.
