BLOOD FLOWS AS DARR WINS OVER GORMAN

Ritchie Knocks Swindler Cold in Second Round of Bout

In the language of ring side habitués, the claret flowed in plentiful quantities from the respective "physiognomies" of Orrville Darr and Nails Gorman in a hard fought, two-fisted main event in Chilcoquin last night.

Darr was awarded the decision. Two of the three judges ruled he had a shade while the third called it a draw.

After the fight was all over somebody grabbed the slips of paper on which were written the choices of the judges. The "Darr" on two slips, looked, at first glance, like "Draw". Some Gorman supporter leaped to the center of the ring and proclaimed Nails the winner.

There were many fair sized bets up on the fight and the confusion that ensued following the unofficial and erroneous announcement approached bedlam.

But Darr won by a close shade although he did not put up as good a fight as heretofore. In fact it was the general opinion that Gorman could lick him easily if he were in training.

The Spokane heavyweight got the decision by virtue of his aggressive tactics and because Gorman showed a propensity for holding. But Gorman just about out Darr's face to pieces with a long, jarring left that stopped the game Washingtonian time and again as he charged in.

Earl Ritchie showed beyond a question of doubt that he was a better fighting man than Joe Swindler in their six round "grudge fight" semi-windup last night. A short but hard right to the pit of the stomach, knocked Swindler cold—and he was out; so much so they had to drag him to his corner.

Harold Wright won a close one over Joe Valencia, Algonia Mexican, in a hard fought match. The referee called it a draw but the two judges elected to pick Wright.

"Flash" Davies and Bud Jerry milled around four rounds to a draw. Had Davies been in condition he could have taken the Indian.

Angelo Sangenetti, protégé of Mike Daley, was knocked cold as a shark's eye in the second round of his bout with Tom Edmundson.

Sangenetti was so eager to get into the fray that the "cart led the horse"—or, in other words, the chin came before the fists. Edmundson began whaling away at the "button" and, finally in the second round, the game Pellucite sank to the canvass, kayoed proper.

McGRAW SAYS TEAM BETTER THIS SEASON

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 28. (AP)—The Giants are thru their training grind, and their manager, John McGraw, has finally decided they are a good ball team. McGraw grew quite enthusiastic over the condition of his squad after the final practice game yesterday, although he would not predict it would bring the national league pennant to New York.

"The club is much stronger than last year on paper," he said, "but you don't win pennants on paper. I have strengthened my club onto a bit by trading O'Doul for Leach. My pitching is stronger.

I have at least five pitchers I can figure on working regularly. O'Farrell is in better condition and will hit better. My reserve strength is greater than 1928."

PLAYER BREAKS TRAINING RULE; MAY LOSE JOB

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 28. (AP)—Reports were circulated about the Detroit Tigers camp today that Harry Heilmann, star outfielder, may not finish the season with the team. They were based on declarations that Rocky Harris, manager, will ask for waivers on Heilmann due to his failure to observe training rules and regulations. Harris declared Heilmann during the past exhibition games; and the player also failed to get into the Chicago Cubs or Pittsburgh Pirates exhibition game here.

Several other Tiger players have been called on the carpet for infractions of training rules. As the result Harris was reported as declaring that further infractions will bring heavy fines.

HOW BABE RUTH'S LEGS HOLD UP THIS SEASON DEPENDS THE YANKS CHANCES OF REPEATING

The big question of whether the New York Yankees will batter their way to another pennant and put of world series dough next October is the ever-present question of the ability of Babe Ruth's slender underpins to stand up under another campaign of 154 games.

The Babe's legs were in bad shape the last two months of the 1928 race, and he barely staggered into the world series on them. Whether a winter's rest and lots of golf this spring has restored them sufficiently to last another six months is a question. Many believe that Ruth will not play over 100 games this year. This is all conjecture, however, as the Babe has informed me that his legs are in good shape, and he expects them to support him in the style he has been accustomed to for five more years in the majors. And when he leaves the American league his ambition is to play five years in the National league with the Chicago Cubs to take advantage of the short right field fence.

San Francisco Comes Back to Beat Portland

SAN FRANCISCO, March 28. (AP)—Aces of swat turned the tide of battle yesterday, as the Pacific coast league functioned on all eight in the second day's play of the 1929 season.

The Seals avenged their defeat by Portland in the first game by winning yesterday's game, 3 to 1, scoring on hits by Crosetti, Jolley, and Wingo. The Beavers had one alibi at least. At Sacramento the Solons won their second straight victory over Hollywood, 5 to 4. The Senators took the lead by scoring twice on singles by Harris and Kohler in the fourth, and Kohler's double. The losers outlived the winners, 13 to 12, despite all that Otis "Doc" Crandall could do for the Solons.

HORTON SMITH WINS ANOTHER GOLFING TITLE

PINEHURST, N. C., March 28. (AP)—Horton Smith, from Joplin, went on his golfing way today with another title tucked away in his bag and seven hundred more first money dollars in his pocket.

LOUGHRAN AND WALKER CLASH THIS EVENING

Middleweight Champ Seeks Title; Tom in Great Shape

CHICAGO, March 28. (AP)—Tommy Loughran, who defends his light heavyweight title to night against Mickey Walker at the opening of the Chicago Stadium, easily made the weight today. The champion tipped the scales at 173 1/4 pounds, one and three quarter pounds under the light-heavyweight limit. He probably will enter the ring a few pounds heavier, however.

CHICAGO, March 28. (AP)—Mickey Walker, the middleweight champion, looking for more worlds to conquer, tonight will attempt to match the triple record of a great Bob Fitzsimmons by toppling Tommy Loughran from his light-heavyweight throne.

The battle, billed to go 10 rounds to a decision at the light heavyweight limit of 175 pounds, will open the largest and most luxurious sports amphitheatre in the world, Paddy Harmon's \$7,000,000 Chicago stadium.

It is Chicago's biggest ring attraction since the Tunney-Dempsey spectacle at Soldier Field two years ago and 20,000 spectators were expected to pay \$250,000 to watch it.

With both fighters superbly trained and confident and with thousands of their admirers from all sections of the country on the scene, odds vacillated between Walker and then to Loughran. When the gladiators pull on the leather at approximately 10 p. m., central standard time, however, odds were expected to be even.

Gold and Glory

For Walker, the match carries not only gold but the glory of equalling Fitzsimmons' record. Mickey once held the welterweight championship and the middleweight crown now rests jauntily on his head. Tonight, he seeks a new corner for his Irish brow.

For Loughran, the fight means vastly more than the light heavyweight title. The Philadelphia Adonis is out to succeed Gene Tunney, on the heavyweight throne and defeat tonight would drop him several notches from his rank as a leading contender.

Loughran Like Tunney

From the standpoint of fighting, the match was simply a vast pocket edition of the Tunney-Dempsey battle. Loughran, like Tunney, is a brilliant boxer. He is not a heavy hitter, but a cutting jabber. If Loughran pursues his usual tactics, he will stab and dance out, stopping the New Jersey bulldog's rushes with his straight left. Walker, like Dempsey, is a hard puncher and invariably launches a telling body attack. Tonight, he plans to carry the battle to the champion, get inside the careful leads and land a knockout punch, if possible.

Walker has fought eight ring battles in Chicago and won them all.

Judges Will Cast Vote

Although the name of the referee will not be announced until Walker and Loughran part the ropes, the task seemed certain to rest between Ed Pardy, Phil Collins or Johnny Barr, all of Chicago. Two judges also will cast a vote, but their identity is unknown save to the Illinois State Athletic commission.

To fans who like a slugging match a la John L. Sullivan, the 10 round semi-windup tonight between Tuffy Griffith and Leo Lomski, the Aberdeen assassin, has created considerable interest. With the winner promised a shot at tonight's victor for the light heavyweight rown, a stirring, two-fisted battle is anticipated.

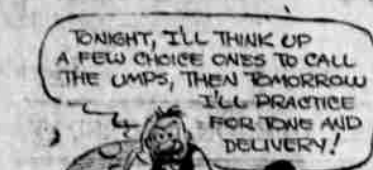
The main event will be broadcast over the National Broadcasting Company's chain.

CUNARD LINER GOES AGROUND

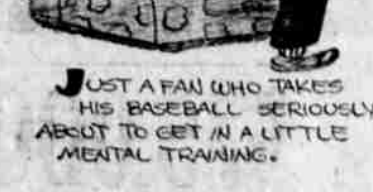

The Transylvania pulled herself off with her own power.

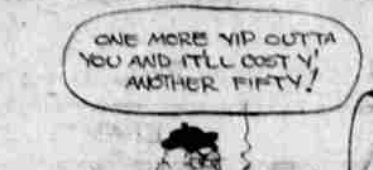

REBELS BEATEN NEAR ESCALON



MEXICO CITY, March 28. (AP)—1:15 p. m.—The occupation of Escalon after a brief engagement with rebel forces was reported to the government by General Calles, commander in chief of the federal forces in the field.

TUCSON, Ariz., March 28. (AP)—In a brief fight early today Mexican federal troops captured a small rebel post across the international line from San Antonio, Arizona, the United States information office announced here.

The federals were believed to have come from San Luis, Sonora swooping down upon the rebel forces at Mesquite, which is 30 miles west of Nogales, Sonora.

JUAREZ, Chihuahua, March 28. (AP)—Vehement denial that rebel forces were evacuating Jimenez as reported in government circles, was made by rebel officials here today.

"Our forces at this time still hold Jimenez and as far as we know do not intend to evacuate that city," an official rebel bulletin said. "General Escobar is prepared to fight near Jimenez."

Other sources indicated a possibility that the rebel commander in chief might move a few miles north of Jimenez so a battle would not be fought in the town. It also was said that the major battle of the revolution bringing a "turning point" in the contest, would be fought within the next 24 hours.

MEXICO CITY, March 28. (AP)—Alberto Terrones Benites, provincial governor of Durango, in a message to the government, said:

"We are taking drastic measures against the Knights of Columbus of Durango City who are acting as spies for the Rebels and Cristeros."

He also said he was mobilizing Durango Agrarians to combat the "Cristeros."

"Cristeros" is a name applied in some parts of Mexico to those so-called religious insurgents who use the battle cry, "Viva Cristo Rey" or "Long Live Christ, King."

WASHINGTON, March 28. (AP)—In the opinion of Secretary Lamont, stock market variations are likely to have less effect on business activity now than they have in the past.

Date for the vote of the chamber of commerce membership on whether or not the chamber should adopt a resolution committing that body in favor of the Great Northern and Western Pacific railroad extensions, was set ahead to May 1 late yesterday afternoon at a special meeting of the chamber board of directors. The balloting was to have taken place next Tuesday.

The board agreed to postpone the balloting at the request of representatives of the Southern Pacific who said they desired an opportunity to present to the chamber forum their reasons for opposing the extensions of the Great Northern and Western Pacific.

It is understood that during April both the Great Northern and Southern Pacific views on the extension will be aired at forum luncheons.

SPRINGFIELD YOUTH DROWNS

EUGENE, Ore., March 28. (AP)—A canoe partly filled with water, found today in the Mill Race here was taken as mute evidence of the drowning last night of Loyal Briggs, 16, of Springfield. The youth left his home at 6 p. m. yesterday and was last seen by Floyd Kull as the boy was paddling down the river in his canoe. At 6:20 p. m. Deputy sheriffs believe the youth fell out of the canoe while trying to anchor the craft along the Mill Race. The paddle was resting on the bottom of the canoe. It is presumed that Briggs reacted out to grasp a branch in order to pull himself ashore, and lost his balance.

Plans were being made today to drag the river tomorrow. The boy's father works in Coquille. Loyal was making his home here with his aunt and uncle.

APPLICATIONS ARE RECEIVED FOR TULE LAND

From the 94 applicants who have applied to date for homesteads on Tule lake, will be picked the 28 men who are best qualified financially and by experience for agricultural pursuits, said Herbert D. Newell, superintendent of Klamath reclamation projects to date.

There are 28 sites available at this time and there are bound to be 66 out of the 94 who will be disappointed," the reclamation officials said.
