TIME'S HEALING POWER

Philadelphia Bulletin: Ex-President Coolidge, by signing the bill authorizing the war department to mark the graves of Confederate soldiers with headstones, adds another significant piece of evidence to the changed historical view of the Civil war.

The generations that have been born since Appomattox are the inheritors of almost incalculable benefits that have resulted from the Union victory.

Northern bitterness, naturally engendered by the conflict that ended in crushing the Confederacy, has gradually given place to an appreciation of the heroism with which the happily "lost cause" was sustained. In the South the sentiment of reconciliation was slow to die, as the younger generation continued to resent the memories handed on to them of the mistakes made by administrators of reconstruction policies. But fortunately there is a new South which is more substantial than a rhetorical phrase, and on both sides of the Mason and Dixon line there is a consciousness of national solidarity.

Moreover, there has been developed since the Civil war an imperial domain in the west, where metropolitan cities have been built and agricultural and mineral riches in matchless profusion added to the wealth of the nation by the combined work of men who had no thought of sectionalism in their mighty work, but stood shoulder to shoulder, Americans all.

The measure, passed by a Republican congress and signed by a Republican president, which provides headstones for Confederate graves, to be recorded in the war department, comes almost on the eve of the official participation of the commander-in-chief of the Confederate veterans' organization and staff in the inaugural parade for another Republican president, another proof of time's healing power.

NEW BUILDING IS ANNOUNCED

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studying local conditions for several months, the site next to the Willard was chosen.

In general, the new store will correspond to the Willard hotel in design and style—Spanish stucco—and will be one of the most attractive stores in the state outside of Portland.

The building will have a frontage on Main street of 70 feet and a depth of 105 feet. Its cost will be between \$75,000 and \$80,000.

Montgomery Ward will occupy fifty feet of the first floor, the entire second floor and the entire basement, approximate total area of 22,000 feet. One store with a 20-foot frontage will be available for lease.

The new building will be of concrete and steel construction. Special stress was laid on the elaborateness and taste of the interior which includes mahogany and birch trimmings with maple floors.

Deal for the construction and lease of the building was handled through the office of the Slater Investment company, 115 South Seventh street.

Mr. Miller has been prominently identified with some large projects in southern Oregon. He constructed the Willard hotel at a cost of over \$200,000, invested a large sum of money for the construction of the Pelican theater and erected that massive structure, and has been connected with a diversity of other constructive projects in Klamath.

Montgomery Ward and company have already secured space for a temporary store at 225 South Sixth street which they will occupy until their permanent Klamath home is completed. Mr. Ward of the big house, has arrived to superintend the opening.

The building will be situated on lots 2 and 3, block 19, Original Town, between the hotel and the Imperial garage.

"We plan to carry on construction just as rapidly as efficiency and the desire to erect the best building possible will allow us," said Mr. Miller this afternoon.

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a-half mile to the east, and purchased nine sticks of dynamite, which he placed in a pile, and a sack containing some Easter eggs.

Returning to his home he met the older of the two girls on her way to school. He persuaded her to return home with him, stopping at the home of his brother, Samuel C. Stetter, whose place joins his on the east, where he coaxed his older daughter to come to the house with him. Glen Stetter, 6, a nephew, followed the trio to the driveway but was sent back to his father's home. All this was seen by Bliven, who noticed the pair and sack. Within a few minutes after the family disappeared in the dwelling the community was wrecked by the blast. Stetter appeared normal while making his purchase from Lenon, stating he had some stumps to blast to do. While in the store he also paid some money on his account there.

Thirteen years difference in the ages of Stetter and his wife and a difference of temperament, or blamed for the tragedy by neighbors. Stetter had objected to his own wife going to the skating rink in Salem and to dances. Tuesday night the pair quarreled. She declared flatly she was going to Salem to which he replied that if she did, she could stay away from their home. Mrs. Stetter retaliated by stating she would return if she wanted to and did so. He literally forced her out of the house, and she and the two little girls took refuge at the home of his brother, where they remained.

In reconstructing the affair, Bliven, who is familiar with powder, believes that he placed a chair about three feet inside the door with the bag of Easter eggs, prevailed upon the girls to sit on his knees. This theory is borne out by the position in which the bodies were found and also their condition. The blast tore up the ground beneath the floor. The house had no basement. The room was used jointly as a dining room and kitchen, opening on the west to the living room which was also shattered. A bedroom off the living room also showed the force of the explosion.

Dr. A. E. Schlerbaum, of Mt. Angel and the Mt. Angel fire department were the first to the scene. All the medical men could do was notify the authorities and John Carson, district attorney, Lloyd Higdon, county coroner and Sam Barkhart, deputy sheriff, investigated. Destruction of the dwelling by fire was prevented by the prompt action of Bliven.

S. P. PLANS TO ABANDON LINE; SEEKS PERMIT

WASHINGTON, March 28. (A. P.)—Permission to abandon 13 miles of branch line in Llan county, Oregon, was sought today by the Southern Pacific railroad. The line in question, known as the Llan Branch, was said by the railroad to show operating receipts equal only to one-fifth of the cost of maintenance and taxes.

the army and navy serves the double purpose of prevention and defense.

Mr. Coolidge declares the forces required for adequate national defense should be large enough so that others would see "that there would be a great deal of peril involved in attacking us," and not so large that the United States would feel it "would undergo no peril in attacking others."

No Preventative
"No sure way has ever been found to prevent war," the former president declares. "Opinions may differ as to whether nations with military forces are more likely to enjoy peace than those which neglect their defense. In the last analysis, this is a question of dealing with human nature."

"I very strongly suspect that if there were but one nation in the world supplied with an army and navy and, to make the supposition as strong as possible, if that nation were our own, it would not be long before the other nations had been overrun. It seems to me that it is almost a moral certainty that we should find some excuse for taking that action. But when we know that other countries have a considerable ability to defend themselves, it is human nature for us to regard them with a more wholesome respect and be more careful about violating their rights. If we reverse this picture we can likewise conclude that if others know that we are prepared to defend ourselves they will be less likely to commit offenses against us."

Need Large Navy
"Our navy can be small because we are peaceful at home and far removed from attack by land. Also an army can be assembled quickly. Our navy is more extensive because our shores, our great commerce and our distant possessions must be protected, and it takes years to build a warship."

Mr. Coolidge's second article, "Promoting Peace Through Limitation of Armaments," will appear in the May number of the Ladies' Home Journal, and the third article, "Promoting Peace Through Denunciation of War," in the June issue.

cal Association, who sometimes talks in the homely idiom of the family physician, has remarked that "It is thus for the Indian to be waned."

"It is dangerous for a child to continue nursing too long," the secretary declared recently in talking about the Indian problem. "It is also just as dangerous for the nurse. The thing to do is to hand it a pickle and let it howl."

The first step in the new Indian program as it has been tentatively worked out, would be to establish in certain sections of the country a group of employment agencies which would take the Indian in hand as soon as he has finished school. Secretary Willard believes that a trained and educated Indian should be kept as far away from an Indian reservation and its influences as is possible.

Salvation Army War Cry—
Salvation Army officers have been advised that the April issue of the War Cry, the army's official paper will be a million copy issue and will be the founder's centennial birthday number. The edition is to carry colored photographs of Army leaders and biographical sketches of the founders.
