GRAF ZEPPELIN RETURNS FROM LONGEST TRIP

Cruise Friedrichshafen to Holy Land and Return Successful

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Ger., March 28. (AP)—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin returned to her base here this morning, completing a voyage of 3 1/2 days and 5,040 miles over the eastern Mediterranean to the Holy Land and return.

The Zeppelin was pulled down to land near its hangar at 10:17 a. m. (4:17 p. m. L. T.) just 51 hours and 31 minutes after its departure last Monday morning, shortly after midnight.

CHICAGO BOMB DOES DAMAGE

CHICAGO, March 28. (AP)—Two more bombs exploded in Chicago Tuesday night and yesterday. One was the most powerful of the year, causing damage estimated at \$20,000 and injury to several persons.

The first bomb explosion wrecked a grocery on the near north side, jarred part of the Gold coast and could be heard as far away as the loop. Several persons were thrown from their beds and injured, one man was cut by flying glass and a woman who was curling her hair when the blast occurred was burned.

The brick front of the grocery, owned by Dominic Desalvo, stood firm but the upper two frames stories were jolted six inches out of line. One family was covered with soot when a chimney spilt was knocked open. Every window in the block was broken, including about 900 in a furniture manufacturing plant.

Neighbors told police that a large car with side curtains and containing four or five men stopped in front of the building shortly before the explosion. Desalvo said he did not know why anyone would attack his store.

The Doris Social and Athletic club on the west side was the target of the second bombing, early this morning. The doorway to the clubrooms, in an old building, was wrecked and windows in nearby buildings were broken. No one was in the building at the time.

FEDERAL PILOT VICTORIOUS IN PLANE BATTLE

MEXICO CITY, March 28. (AP)—In the first air battle to death ever fought in any Mexican revolution a Federal pilot was victor and sent his Rebel adversary crashing from a height of 4,000 feet, government advisers today said.

The battle occurred Sunday during the seizure of Marazan by Rebel forces under Generals Roberto Cruz and Francisco Manzo. A Federal plane piloted by Lieutenant Jorge Alderana met a Rebel plane aloft over Venadilla, suburb of Marazan and after brief maneuvering and fighting put his ship out of commission.

It was believed the pilot was killed.

TOMBOY Breathing Tube Can't Spoil Her Fun

PITTSBURGH, Pa., March 15.—A small silver tube connecting her windpipe with an opening in the front of her neck enables Sarah Spelker, 7, pupil in the Holmes School here, to breathe easily, to make good grades in her studies, to run and play with other children and to be just as happy and full of fun as many of her classmates.

Teachers in the Holmes School know Sarah only as "mischievous at times." But Sarah is known in her neighborhood as a real tomboy. Her mother vouches that Sarah can hold her own with any youngster in the vicinity.

An operation to be performed this summer is expected to give Sarah the normal use of her breathing facilities again.

A foreign growth in Sarah's throat three years ago plagued her air passage. An operation was performed to clear the way for her to breathe through her nose. The growth kept developing. Dr. Ellen J. Patterson of this city, who made it possible for Sarah to breathe easily with the present arrangement, clipped the growth from time to time, but found it necessary to make certain Sarah had a clear air passage before allowing her to breathe through her nose again.
