## On the Right Track

"THE INDIAN must be weaned; it is dangerous to keep him nursing too long, both for him and the mother."

With this pithy observation Secretary of the Interior Wilbur sounded a new note in Indian policy, a note which, it seems to us, hits at the core of all that is wrong in administration of Indian affairs.

In other words, Secretary Wilbur says the time has come for the American Indian to be the "captain of his own fate and the master of his own soul"; to step forth and take a position in commerce, agriculture and industry; and to leave the reservation where conditions often are not conducive to habits of thrift and enterprise.

Secretary Wilbur is against the reservation system and would gradually dispense with it entirely. There is much wisdom in his ideas, for why should the Indian be set apart from the rest of mankind condemned to go through life with the realization that he is merely a ward of the federal government and lacking the independence and freedom of his white brother?

We suspect that clear thinking members of the Klamath tribe are heartily in accord with Secretary Wilbur's ideas. They are against the present patriarchal system; they are weary of being investigated, examined, and treated like small children; they are anxious to throw off the fetters of overlordship and strike out in the current of life by themselves.

In the person of Secretary Wilbur the American Indian has a man who will be their greatest friend while being their most severe task master. According to Mr. Wilbur's idea the American Indian should be tossed into deep water to "sink or swim."

## A Builder

IT IS such men as W. D. Miller that build a city; men who have a sincere and persistent faith in their own community and who back their belief with constructive enterprises.

Mr. Miller's career exemplifies that homely old maxim; "actions speak louder than words." He is not one given to patting himself upon the back, but prefers to go about his business quietly and effectively asking for only that support his projects and activities deserve.

### NO PLACE FOR MEN

Boston Transcript: Today is the day of days for the ladies of the senate. THE Telephone company's census of Klamath Falls and vicinity has attracted wide attention all over the northwest. That it was correct in the main, no one doubts. That Klamath Falls and immediate vicinity now has 17,500 people cannot be doubted. But we doubt the prognostications of the company's statistician on the future of the city. According to the company's man the growth of Klamath will be slow, more on the basis of an old settled community. This cannot be true. Klamath Falls' growth will be rapid or not at all, and all agree that the latter cannot be true. When the statistician carries along to the year 1942 to acquire the top growth he is failing to consider the things that make this city, and the things that in the future will make the growth.

Pine manufacturing is the backbone. It will get into full stride in three years. Railroads are the next important asset. The Southern Pacific will have the Modoc Northern completed this year, the Great Northern will have its line south completed in at least two years, and a line across to Medford and probably down to Crescent City within five years. That will bring the big Great Northern shops here, just as the completion of the Modoc Northern will bring the Southern Pacific shops and operating department to this city.

These things will all be operating in full blast within five years and Klamath Falls will then have her 30,000 people that we have always claimed she would have. This is said with due respect to the judgment of the Telephone company's statistician.
