Congress Bereft of New Ideas
on Solution of Farm Problem;
Dreary Hearings Under Way

WASHINGTON, March 29. (U. P.)—House and senate agriculture committees have settled down, resignedly, to the dreary business of compiling another set of records on the farm relief problem. They are despairing of any fresh new ideas, after the trial thus far this week, and members lean back, weary, smoking, with but rare interruptions to a repetition of things they have heard before, and from the same lips.

Already the congressional archives contain volume after volume of data concerning the plight of agriculture since the world war and suggestions for its rehabilitation but every new congress considers it necessary to hold more hearings.

Most of the witnesses before the committees preparing for the extra session of congress started next month are leaders of farm organizations whose ideas have been incorporated in the records many times before.

So far, no new plan of farm relief has been presented which appears to have a chance of winning favorable attention from the farm relief legislators.

The senate committee attempted to relieve the monotony of its task by inviting several leading industrialists and financiers to

present their farm relief formulas but none has accepted.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Chas. M. Schwab and Owen D. Young informed the committee today that they would not be able to accept. Rockefeller explained that he had made no study of the problem and was not equipped to be of service. Schwab said that previous engagements made his appearance impossible; and Young that his duties at the reparations conference detain him in Europe.

Previously J. P. Morgan and Paul M. Warburg had sent regrets. Henry Ford and Secretary of Treasury Mellon have not yet replied to the committee's invitation.

Public Appeal
Submitted by
Governor Long

BATON ROUGE, La., March 29. (U. P.)—Governor Huey P. Long of Louisiana today struck back at his opponents who are seeking to drive him from office, and issued another of his famous "appeals to the people," which was made public shortly before the state legislature adjourned until 8 p. m. Monday, when impeachment charges against the executive will be taken up.

His open letter addressed to "the people of the state," charges the impeachment proceedings were engineered by oil interests, and was taken by his friends to mean that, instead of planning to resign as rumored, he meant to fight against impeachment to the end.

The house and senate, which received copies of the letter just before noon, passed a concurrent resolution denouncing the governor, and called upon him to prove the charge that oil companies were back of the impeachment proceedings.

WOOL MARKET
SLOWS DOWN

Nothing Being Done in West for the Moment; Foreign Trade Stagnant

BOSTON, March 29. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The week in the American wool market has been well-nigh featureless, manufacturers, while fairly busy on old contracts, are not in pressing need of wool at the moment apparently.

"In the west, there is nothing being done of moment, a few options taken in western Idaho late last week have been allowed to lapse.

"Foreign markets are generally steady. Bradford and Continental markets are rather quiet.

"Mohair is slow and prices are difficult to quote with certainty."

How Rum Ship
Was Sunk Told
by Uncle Sam

WASHINGTON, March 29. (U. P.)—The official American version of the sinking of the Canadian schooner I'm Alone by a United States patrol boat in the Gulf of Mexico was submitted by the state department to the Canadian legation today.

The pursuit and destruction of the foreign vessel is defended. It is understood, on the ground that the I'm Alone refused to submit to search in water in which the right of search is given this government by the rum-running treaty of 1921. The right applies to any vessel suspected of carrying liquor within one hour's steaming distance of the American coast.

To Search for Narcotics

The state department's note was forwarded to Ottawa tonight by the Canadian minister, who declined to comment on the matter while awaiting further instructions from his government. If, however, the contents of the note correspond with the views of the coast guard headquarters, they conflict in several important respects with the contention of the Canadian government.

A search for narcotics in the shot-riddled bulk of the I'm Alone is proposed by Chairman Porter of the house foreign affairs committee.

Carried 2,400 Cases

Suspicion that the schooner's cargo was not confined to the 2,400 cases of liquor the master admitted having on board was expressed today by Porter, who said he had asked the department of justice to make an investigation with the aid of deep-sea divers.

An assistant United States attorney is already working on the case, in which three departments of this government as well as two foreign embassies and one legation are involved.

Seen Within 12-Mile Limit

The latest statement by the coast guard, issued today, declared government officials not connected with the coast guard had obtained irrefutable evidence that the rum-runner was first sighted within the 12-mile limit inside which the United States tariff law says foreign vessels may be stopped and searched.

The coast guard statement does not answer the Canadian contention that the provisions of the tariff law have never been accepted by the Canadian government, or other points of international law on which it is expected the Canadian legation eventually will base a protest to be lodged with the state department.

SALEM, Ore., March 29. (AP)—Today is the 60th anniversary of the opening of the Ladd & Bush bank of Salem, one of the most widely known banks in the state, and, next to the First National of Portland, the oldest going bank in the state.

P.)—With an assistant attorney general on his way here from Springfield to investigate the case, Kane county officialdom clamped the lid down tight last night on all angles of the "dry raid killing" of Mrs. Lillian De King and the clubbing of her husband in the De King home Monday night.

On two important points in the controversy between officials and partisans of the De King family, State's Attorney George D. Carbery enforced his decree against publicity.

HABITUAL LAW
BREAKER BILL
FAILS TO PASS

LANSING, Mich., March 29. (U. P.)—Michigan's famous "life for a pint" law was doomed today by the unanimous action of the state senate in passing a series of amendments to the criminal code.

The amendments now go to Governor Green, who will sign them, as they were promulgated in the legislature at his request.

No longer will the brewer of home beer or the seller of a pint of moonshine be subject to a life term in prison for his fourth conviction.

As amended by the legislature the criminal code now provides that the mandatory life sentence will operate only against those convicted for a fourth time of any crime which itself carries the maximum penalty of five years in prison.
