BEAVERS TAKE SEALS IN HARD HITTING GAME

Missions Lose to Oaks, Hollywood Wins Its First Game

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 29. (AP)—The Portland Beavers swept the Oaks under a barrage of hits yesterday, taking the game 6 to 3 while Roy Mahaffey held the Seal batsmen to only five hits. It was a bitter pill for the San Franciscans who had been heralded as the premier sluggers of the coast league. For a time during the first inning, Mahaffey was in hot water, when the Oaks were holding down all bases, but he finally straightened matters out and hit after that were few and far between.

At Emeryville, the Missions had a bad day of it, yielding to the Oaks, 6 to 1 and with only a single hit to their credit. The lone run was the result of a walk to Slade starting off the inning. Borah on the mound for the Oaks allowed only a single to Johnny Sherlock in the sixth. On the other hand the Oaks pounded Killefer's bats like an anvil, and hung up three circuit clouts.

Hollywood won its first game of the season after finally stopping the Senators in their fourth inning. Oscar Vitt's boys celebrated their first victory by romping around the circuit for a score of 13 to 4. The Stars carried through a batting offensive for 20 hits off no less than four Sacramento twirlers, and in addition Bill Rumbley and Mickey Heath walloped the ball for a couple of homers.

The Seattle Indians were thumped again on the Angels' home lot 10 to 7 in a slugfest in which both teams took their hits. The Braves had the Kurumon so badly scared with their onslaught in the latter part of the fray that "Deacon" Phil was yanked from the box and a relief man was sent in to stem the tide.

Kearns Fails to Overthrow Fight Verdict

CHICAGO, March 29. (UP)—Jack Kearns this afternoon was unsuccessful in an attempt to protest the result of the Mickey Walker-Tommy Loughran light heavyweight championship fight here last night.

Kearns, manager of Walker, objected to the 2-1 decision which allowed Loughran to retain his title. The two judges voted for Loughran, and Davey Miller, the referee, cast his vote for Walker. Kearns particularly objected to the scoring of Judge Klein, who gave Loughran eight rounds and called two even. Phil Collins, the other judge, scored six rounds for Loughran, two for Walker and two even. Miller gave Loughran only one round. Walker fought and termed the even.

The Illinois athletic commission called a special meeting to consider the protest and overruled it.

TITLE MATCH IS SET AHEAD

LOS ANGELES, March 30. (UP)—When Ted Morgan was forced out of action temporarily today because of a blow on the calf of his left leg, the bout in which he will defend his world junior lightweight title against Santiago Zorilla here was postponed from Tuesday to Thursday. Zorilla received news of the delay with satisfaction, as it will lengthen the 15-day training period he entered after a visit to his home in Panama. The little Indian has had difficulty in making the required 130 pounds.

With the exception of the ball Morgan is in fine shape. He was held to a draw by Zorilla in San Francisco last December.

Coach McEwan Calls Players for Practice

EUGENE, Ore., March 30. (AP)—Forty-five football players will report Monday to John J. McEwan, Oregon grid coach for spring practice at the University of Oregon. A number of players not in school last term have returned and will report. The list includes George Christianson and Austin Colbert, first-string tackle and the backbone of Oregon's line. George Chappel, reserve center, will report Monday.

The work will be a continuation of practice started several weeks ago and interrupted by a ten-day spring vacation. Only members of the 1928 Freshman team took an active part in the early workouts.

Merrill Hazan, three-year letterman and line star is aiding Coach McEwan in the practice and will take charge of the forwards while McEwan spends his time working on the backfield and ends.

CALLISON MAY GO TO OREGON

EUGENE, Ore., March 29. (AP)—Coach Callison, proprietor of championship football and basketball teams at Medford high schools for several years, may come to the University of Oregon next fall as chief coach of the Oregon freshman squads.

Negotiations have been under way for several weeks. Virgil D. Earl, director of athletics at the University of Oregon said today. Callison has not been elected to the position, but the position has been tendered. Earl said he will be formally elected on his acceptance.

Efforts to reach Callison at Medford today were unsuccessful. Friends of Callison said he had left town for a couple of days and it was reported that he was on his way to Eugene to conclude final arrangements with the university.

"Nothing final has been done or can be done until we hear from Callison," Earl said. "He is a very fine coach and a very fine young man and we will be glad to have him if he decides to accept, although we have understood there was another offer which he had to consider before giving us his answer."

a machine. When Stables was made governor he carefully selected Stables men for offices and for a time he was the Mussolini of Kansas.

But he did not need the work, the worry, nor the salary, hence he ceased to think about the down-trodden masses and gradually relaxed.

THIS country has witnessed but one great crusader and reformer in the last fifty years and that was Bryan. The stories that have been running on Bryan in Liberty Magazine give many sidelights on the Commoner which his strong admirers may not cherish, but nevertheless they prove that he was not different from other men; that he had the same desires to have machines in political life; that he advanced by arraying the nation against Wall street, the country against the towns.

His oratory, which many of us thought to be a natural gift, was cultivated, according to his biographer. He wanted the nomination at Baltimore but he saw it was impossible. Then he turned to Woodrow Wilson because he thought Wilson was an enemy of Bryan one is impressed with the fact that much of his "hurray" was bombast, but there is also the feeling that he was

needful in this country at the time he appeared. We were always glad that he could not succeed in his ambition to be president, but we always admired the man for his undoubted courage and his constancy in following a lost cause.

HARD times bring crusaders. One of the reasons for none appearing on the national stage for several years is the fact that the nation has been exceedingly prosperous, as a whole, since the war. Spending the cheap money caused by the war has been abnormal and such a condition has not encouraged a Bryan or a Stables in public life.
