THINK WAVES ARE DANGEROUS

"The day will come—although I think it is still far distant—when we shall learn to convey power by wireless," he predicted. This, he said, meant the power to transmit the stimulation of objects through space by wireless as differentiated from the successful attempts of men like John Hays Hammond to control the movements of objects at a distance.
"The discovery of wireless power transmission, should enable us to send through space and at immense heights, specially designed airplanes flying by inductive power supplied by stations many miles away from them. This not only would they be 'controlled' by wireless as were Hammond's experimental wireless ships, but they will also be 'moved' by radio," the professor said.
"I think also that the day will come when we shall be able to move vehicles along the highways by means of underground cables connected by induction with some simple mechanism under the car to be propelled. Thus would we have fearless automobiles, motorless, tramways and steamless steam engines.
Professor Low is famed for his predictions on the subject of the future development of science. His book "The Future," written over seven years ago, prophesied many scientific discoveries which have since come true and are in common use despite the fact that at the time he predicted them, many people smiled incredulously. He forecast the invention of wireless television and the return into favor of four wheel brakes on automobiles. Among other things which were laughed at when he predicted them were a number of agricultural discoveries which are now in use in every great surgical center.

REBEL GENERAL FLAYS MORROW

Inexplicable solidarity is Mr. Morrow and the Liberty killing regime of Calles.
"We do not oppose the expansion of the interests of Mr. Morrow in Mexico; but we would prefer that they did not upset his equanimity, inducing him to perform unattractive information tasks, injurious to the cause of liberty," the message ended. It was directed to Gerzavino Ugarte, head of the diplomatic mission, and signed by the Rebel commander in chief.
WASHINGTON, March 30, (AP)—Charges of General Escobar, leader of the Mexican Revolutionists, that American Ambassador Morrow at Mexico City is "invading the exclusive jurisdiction of the Mexican people" and acting as a "propaganda agent" for the Mexican government were characterized as "outrageous" today by American government officials.
The charges were made in a message to the Revolutionists' diplomatic mission which is in Washington. General Escobar had instructed Gerzavino Ugarte, head of the mission, to communicate the declaration to the American department and to the American people through the press.
Officials of the state department said today the United States government, carrying out the declared policy, would not receive Mr. Escobar nor any representative of the Revolutionists. The message might be sent by mail to Secretary Hays and to the White House.
