BELGIAN CONGO HIT BY FAMINE
LONDON, April 1. (AP)—The Daily Express in a dispatch from Nairobi Kenya, today described "terrible famine conditions" in the Ruanda district of the Belgian Congo. The account was credited to Dr. J. E. Church, British missionary working there. Owing to the successive failure of crops during two or three rainy seasons, the backward state of agriculture, and independent state of communications, thousands are dead and dying of starvation, according to the minister.

REBEL PLANES SCORE VICTORY

lose rebel airplane, which twice flew over Naco on Sunday inflicted a federal loss of two dead and two wounded federal soldiers.

Direct Hit—One bomb, scoring an almost direct hit in the defensive trenches, appeared to have landed in the midst of a group of federal soldiers. Two men were killed, and two others injured. A second bomb plunged through the tin roof of an empty building near the Mexican customs house, rattling fragments against the latter as it exploded. The concussion of the bomb shook plaster from the ceiling of Naco cafes and rattled windows in the adjoining American town of Naco, Arizona.

The first of the three bombs dropped in the afternoon caused a stampede of American sightseers through the international gate. These had been in the safe section of town which was not visited by the aerial attack. Scores of Americans perched on box cars on the American side of the border, witnessed the explosion of the fatal bomb.

LUMBER TARIFF HELD FAIR; NOT DISCRIMINATORY

TOKYO, April 1. (AP)—The Japanese foreign office today forwarded the American embassy here a reply to its memorandum of March 23 protesting the new tariffs on lumber imports as discriminatory. Contents of the reply were not disclosed but it was understood it disclaimed any discriminatory intent. A foreign office spokesman asserted the new tariff was non-discriminatory and in any event not of sufficient importance to call for American retaliation.

PREPARE FOR HOT ELECTION

CHICAGO, April 1. (AP)—Extraordinary precautions to prevent stealing of ballot boxes, slugging of watchers and casting of illegal ballots were ordered by Police Commissioner William Russell today for the run-off elections in eleven wards tomorrow. Control of the city council will be decided. The present administration, headed by Mayor William Hale Thompson, now holds a majority of the aldermanic posts, but opponents of the mayor and his "America First" platform could wrest control from him by winning a large proportion of the positions to be decided tomorrow.
