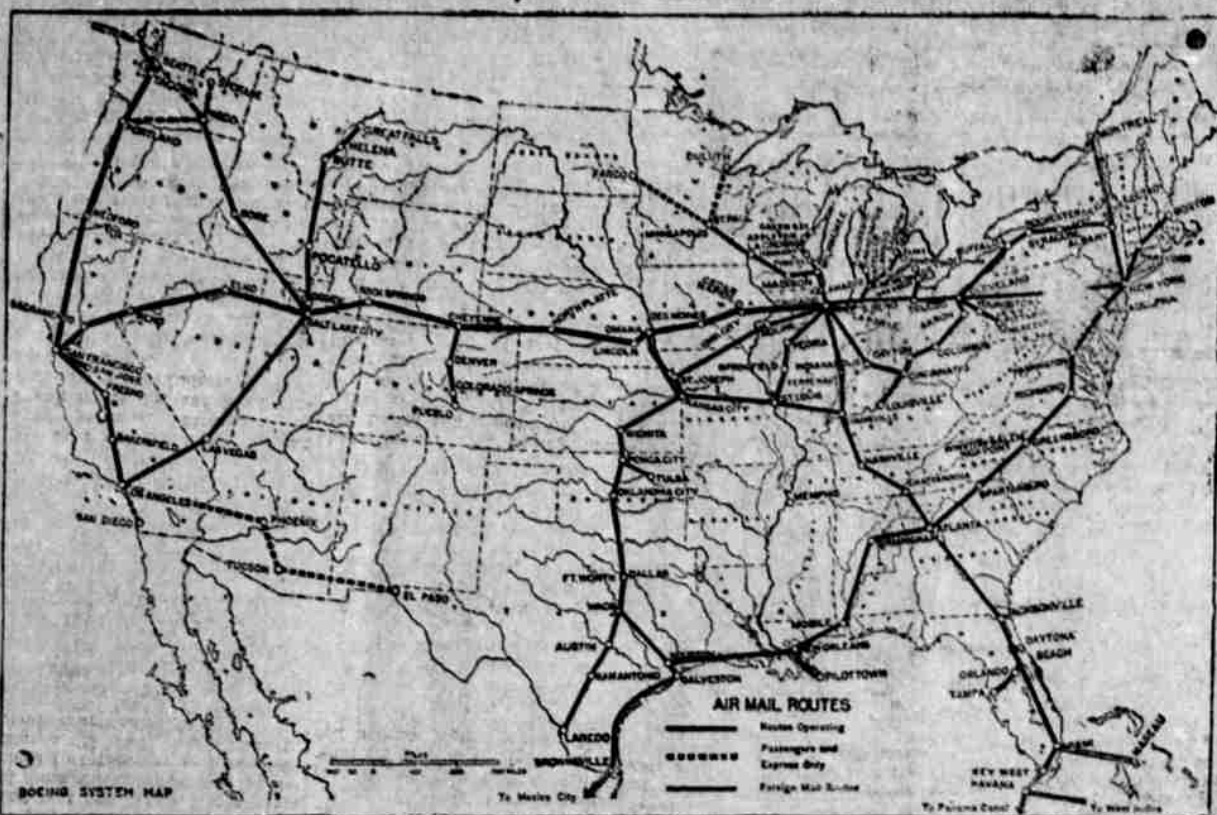

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Mail Planes Will Fly 13, 000,000 Miles This Year



With 21,000 miles of established airways in the United States, and by July 1, 12,500 miles of lighted airways, airmail pilots are expected to fly about 13,000,000 miles during 1929. The mail planes fly approximately 35,000 miles a day, serving 108 cities. Only 10 states are now without daily airmail service. Each day the mail planes carry approximately nine tons of letters, exclusive of ex-

press and passengers. Besides there are about 30 transport and taxi lines which are expected to fly between 20,000,000 and 30,000,000 miles this year. There are now 1600 improved or semi-improved airports, most of them municipal, and their value is estimated at about \$100,000,000. This year about \$80,000,000 will be spent by 1100 airports for land, equipment and supplies. The above map shows the nation's airways.

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tary attaché at the embassy. "Anything that the French government can do shall be done. Ambassador Herreck's family may ask anything they please, and it shall be done."

French newspapers appeared today with flaring headlines. "France has lost one of her greatest friends." Columns were devoted to eulogies.

A long procession of automobiles brought distinguished Frenchmen from all walks of life, together with Americans residing here, to sign the embassy register and express condolence. Madame Foch personally telephoned the ambassador's daughter-in-law, Mrs. Farnley Herrick. General John J. Pershing was another caller.

President Gaston Doumergue immediately after he was informed of the ambassador's death entrusted an expression of condolence on behalf of the nation to Admiral Vedel, General Lasso and Jules Michel, head of his civil cabinet, who called at the embassy to deliver it.

Throughout the past winter recurrent fits of illness weakened Ambassador Herrick, but it was believed he was well on the road to recovery. Last Tuesday he marched for three hours in the cortege of Marshal Foch, sitting for an hour before that in the draughts of the nave of Notre Dame for the religious funeral service.

He remarked afterward, however, that he had suffered little from the experience, but, on the contrary, felt fine. Wednesday he played golf with Colonel Mott, and beat him 3 and 2 in a game at Saint Cloud. Thursday he decided to forego the golf and told friends, "I feel that Blankety blank cough again."

Mrs. Herrick, Madame Salamblor, who was his secretary, Bradford, his valet, and Dr. Ferry-Rolles were with him when the end came.

Stafford's filling station, which is near the Deking home.

Shortly after Johnson's account was made known last night, state's attorney George D. Carberry of Kane county, under whose cleanup campaign the raid was made, indicated an intention to turn the investigation over to the attorney general of Illinois. Such an action would be an unusual legal procedure.

Inasmuch as Illinois law provides that the attorney general act only when a county prosecutor has been found to be prejudiced.

Carberry reiterated his belief that Deputy Sheriff Roy Smith, who did the shooting, acted in self defense, believing that Mrs. Deking intended to shoot him after he had slugged her husband, Joseph. The deputy was himself shot in the leg by the Deking's young son, Gerald, and is recovering in a hospital.

TWO KILLED BY RUM GANGSTERS

WILSONVILLE, Ill., April 1. (AP)—Rum rivalry was advanced by county authorities today as a motive for the slaying here yesterday afternoon of Frank Hines, 28, and his brother-in-law, Smith Tucker, 27, Wilsonville miners.

The two men were shot to death as they drove into Wilsonville by an automobile load of men, who apparently had followed them from Gillespie, a nearby mining town. After the shooting, the slayers whirled their car around and escaped in the same direction from which they came.

LOGAN, Utah, April 1. (AP)—An offer of \$50,000 has been sent to attorneys for the family of Joseph Deking, Aurora, Ill., to assist in prosecution of raiders who shot Mrs. Deking to death by Orman W. Ewing, Salt Lake broker and mining man. Mr. Ewing announced here.

The proposal, Mr. Ewing said, was made with the consent of other persons in western states interested in the association against the prohibition amendment.

Reply has been received by Mr. Ewing, he said indicating that funds are needed, and Ewing said he had already directed his attorney to solicit the funds.

"While we deplore the need for publicity in this gruesome case," Mr. Ewing said, "nevertheless, Mr. Deking's martyrdom may save others a like fate at the hands of the fanatics who have succeeded in setting aside the inalienable rights and guarantees of the constitution."

FIND TRACE OF CANNIBAL RACE

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of an ancient lake, long since disappeared which is still called by geologists, Lake Lahontan. It is about 22 miles southwest of Lovelock.

The people who inhabited it are vaguely mentioned in Plate Indian legends as cannibalistic savages, devoid of fear, who were annihilated in a three year war with the Plutes about the year 1000 B. C.

Mentioned in the Plate legends as "Saiduka" or tale eaters, this Auburn haired tribe were credited with strange powers. According to legend they were able to leap into the air, seize arrows that were shot at them, and turn them back at their attackers. They were exterminated. It is believed in a final charge against the cave rivaling in dramatic interest the battle of the Alamo.

It is thought that this sudden extermination may account for the preservation of so many possessions of the ancient people, kept by the dry Nevada climate in a state of perfection compared with that of articles found in Egypt and Peru.

Among the objects discovered, some of them buried under 14 feet of bat guano, were profused textile material, including basketry and matting, wooden implements, weapons, sandals and other relics.

Professor A. L. Koeber of the University of California declared the material almost wholly pre-Columbian, having strong relations with the native culture of California in historic times. He termed it immensely valuable.

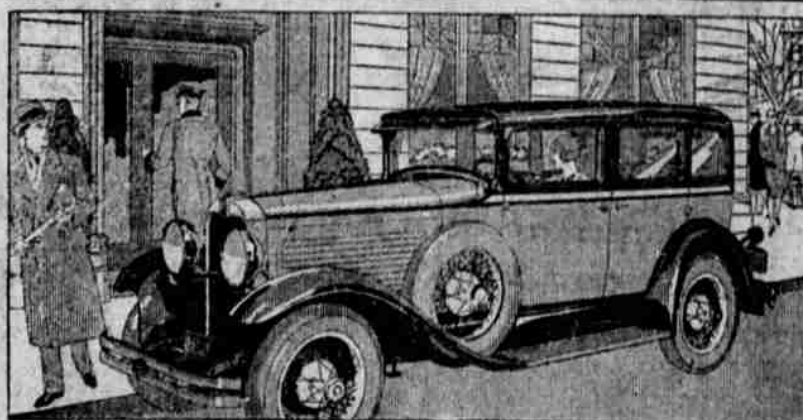
