Sacramento Will Be Hard Nut for Portland to Crack

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2. (A. P.)—Thoroughly shuffled and interchanged amid new scenery, the eight clubs of the Pacific coast league were prepared today for a renewed onslaught to gain top positions in the standings.

While the Seals were scheduled to meet their local rivals, the Missions at Recreation Park, the Seattle Indians were slated to oppose the Oaks today across the bay, the Portland Beavers were battling at Sacramento, and the Angels were bucking Hollywood.

Killefer was expected to open the attack this afternoon with "Dutch" Reuther on the mound to oppose Hollis Thurston, who is credited with having brought one of the Seals' two victories last week against the Portland outfit.

The playing of the Angels and the Hollywood Stars in the first weeks of the season, the former against the Indians and the latter at Sacramento, gave evidence that baseball interest in the southern metropolis will be at its height this week when the two teams meet on home ground.

Many of Babe Ruth's home runs during the regular season and in the world series are dramatic, but some of the ones he hits during exhibition games in

"There was a big tree just outside the centerfield fence," said Walter, and it was so loaded down with young negro fans that it had the appearance of a tree that a flock of blackbirds had chosen for a roost.

"Dazzy" Vance was pitching for Brooklyn, and was bearing down on every ball he pitched, as he was anxious to beat us. He made Ruth look bad the first two times the big fellow faced him, but on his third appearance at the plate, the Babe caught hold of a fast one that went on a line straight at the tree full of blackbirds.

"All you could see for the next few minutes were blackbirds falling out of their perches in the branches. The tree had been full of them a minute before, but by the time the big fellow had circled the bases there wasn't one left. They probably decided it was too dangerous a perch."

DROP BOMBS IN U. S. TERRITORY

his forces reformed in the night, hoped to accomplish today what he failed to do in fourteen hours desperate fighting yesterday—defeat of the principal rebel army at Jimenez, southern Chihuahua.

Vastly outnumbered, outflanked, and with retreat cut off, the forces of the rebel general, Jose Gonzalo Escobar, at least held their ground in furious battling from 1 a. m. to 5 p. m. yesterday. At the latter hour federal attack was halted to await resumption today.

The exact situation was not clear. Federal reports continued optimistic. From them it seemed probable there had been some success in the fighting against the rebel right wing and that a section of Jimenez was in their hands. But in the outlook for calling off the federal attack and in the acknowledged failure to take the city, after such a determined effort, some say reason to believe there may have been federal reserves.

There was a different story from the west coast however, where in the state of Sinaloa, where the only other fighting of consequence is taking place, federal troops dislodged the rebel army from fortifications at Limon and forced full retreat northward toward Quila and Culiacan. More than 100 rebels were killed.

Lieutenant Colonel Gustavo Leon, who flew across the rebel lines late yesterday afternoon, reported he had seen bridges burning on railway outlets from Jimenez to Chihuahua City and to Parral. This, probably the work of federal raiders, was believed to have cut the rebels off from their base.

The aviator also reported that federal airmen were seeking to locate General Benigno Serratos, who with a small detachment of men had been cut off by the rebels.

The rebel troops were found strongly entrenched outside Jimenez.

Desultory firing began as early as 1 a. m., according to the report of General Calles, who remained at his headquarters at Bernalillo, 100 miles southeast of Jimenez, leaving field operations to General Juan Andres Almanza.

Street fighting. Federal artillery was soon brought into action followed by infantry and cavalry assaults, which, with one exception failed. The exception was on the rebel right flank, which the federals drove into the city where there was desperate street fighting.

Last night the federals, according to their own reports, held half of the little town.

The city suffered heavily from shell fire, and it was said a windmill which had sheltered a rebel machine gun unit, was destroyed.

Both sides employed bombing planes. Federal reports said those of the rebels were forced back behind their own lines without doing a great deal of damage.

Calles said the rebel general, Escalante, had been killed while leading his division in a flank attack on General Quevedo, who was mentioned in dispatches for his successes during the day. Capture of 83 rebels and a captain was reported, but little mention made of dead and wounded.

It was said General Escobar's army did not number over 5000. General Almanza has 10,000 troops, supposedly better equipped, with him, General Francisco Urbalejo, who lost Durango to General Calles, is assisting General Escobar in the command of the rebels.
