It was one of the most notorious liquor dispensaries which has ever operated in the Klamath basin.

Federal Prohibition Officers Mueller, Telen and Warden were amazed at the "wide open" methods used.

Telen strode into the road house at 3 a. m. today.

"I walked up to the mahogany bar, with polished brass rails, and before I could even ask for a drink, the bartender, Wilson, said, 'What'll you have, whiskey?'"

"I said yes, and we all bought a drink. Then we knuckled over the place. We took a 45 caliber revolver from Hogan and, behind the bar, found a German Luger revolver.

"Then we began to look around and found about every variety of liquor you can imagine—at least every variety that is common to such a place. We located 20 gallons of moonshine, several quarts of gin, a couple of cases of beer and a quantity of wine. Believe me, those fellows catered to various tastes."

Then the officers "laid to" the saloon fixtures and in a short time the long mahogany bar was reduced to splinters and the bright shiny rails broken and twisted.

DEFEAT "BAD BOOK" BILL.
BOSTON, April 2. (UP)—The "bad book" bill, which would have made it necessary to consider the text of a book in its entirety before condemning it as obscene, was defeated in the state senate today by a vote of 15 to 13.

GOVERNOR OUSTERS FIGHT ON.
BATON ROUGE, La., April 2. (UP)—The Louisiana house of representatives, sitting as a committee of the whole, continued tonight to consider the impeachment of Governor Huey P. Long. The governor moved to combat the proceedings with a gigantic mass meeting of his friends next Tuesday.

TIKK ARMY CONCENTRATES.
JERUSALEM, April 2. (UP)—Thirty thousand Turkish troops in three divisions were reported today to be concentrated on the border of Iraq. Turkish sources said the concentration was not against Iraq (Mesopotamia) but against the Kurds in that region, who were threatening rebellion.

MARSHAL JOFFRE ILL.
PARIS, April 2. (UP)—Anxiety over the health of Marshal Joseph Joffre, who commanded the French armies from 1915 to 1917, was expressed in official circles today. He was 70 in January.

CHINESE TROOPS BATTLE.
LONDON, April 2. (UP)—Serious fighting is going on between nationalists and Hankow troops 60 miles northeast of Hankow, a dispatch to the Daily Telegraph reported last night. The National government expects Gen. Fong Yu-Hsiang to occupy Hankow within a fortnight, believing the Hankowites demoralized.

CAPTURE BOOZE RUNNERS.
NORWALK, Conn., April 2. (UP)—Police captured two alleged rum runners and a truck load of liquor valued at \$50,000 in East Norwalk today after a gun battle. A high powered speedboat, which was believed to have just landed the liquor, escaped in the fog.

DAMAGE LARGE AS WIND HITS CANADIAN CITY

Million Dollar Loss Incurred in Toronto and Adjacent Towns

TORONTO, April 2. (AP)—With restoration today of crippled lines of communication indications were that property damage from yesterday's terrific wind storm would reach \$1,000,000.

Scarcely a town or city in the storm area escaped damage either through flood waters or the wind which approached hurricane force.

Rain, snow and sleet accompanied the storm, and temperatures fell rapidly to freezing point. Small structures were moved from their foundations. Trees were blown off buildings, steeples crashed to the ground and miles of telegraph poles were down.

The greatest damage in Toronto occurred in the eastern lake front section. The wind whipped Lake Ontario and drove the water inland, flooding cellars, destroying the foundations under some homes and tearing up roadways.

At Stratford the Avon river was rising rapidly last night. Gardens and garages in the river front section were flooded.

Although many persons received minor injuries, no deaths have been reported.

Scores of motor cars were abandoned on highways north of Barrie, Ontario. Broken trees and telegraph poles completely blocked the road from Bradford north today and it was reported that many motorists spent the night in their cars. Barrie itself, was almost completely isolated.

Port Dover Hit Hard.
Port Dover harbor reported an estimated damage of \$75,000. Damage at Niagara Falls, Ont., was estimated at \$100,000 with the check incomplete. St. Catharines had counted an estimated damage of \$50,000.

At Port Colborne the gale piled the lake water over the water front, flooding the basements of elevators and other structures. Two railway cars on the pier were swept into the lake. An explosion resulted when water reached the boilers at the government elevators and fire threatened the huge bins for a time. The grain carrier Riverton was torn loose from the dock and in the attempt to bring the ship back three longshoremen were swept overboard. They were rescued with difficulty and the vessel re-moored.

NEW YORK, April 2. (AP)—The death toll from a furious wind storm that swept across 13 states and part of Canada yesterday mounted to eight today. Several score persons were hurt. There was much property damage.

70-Mile Wind.
The storm, which reached a velocity of seventy miles an hour at some places, originated in the southwest, tearing across parts of Arkansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin and upper Michigan, and then across Ohio into Pennsylvania, West Virginia, New York and New Jersey.

Buildings were unroofed, wires were blown down and trees uprooted.

Both Lake Michigan and Lake Erie were swept by the storm and much property was damaged along the lake fronts. Waves as high as thirty-five feet dashed along the Illinois-Wisconsin shore on Lake Michigan.

At Buffalo three ships were torn from their moorings and the Lake Erie water level was six feet above normal.

One man was killed in Buffalo by a falling tree. The wind blew down a hothouse at the Buffalo airport, damaging planes.

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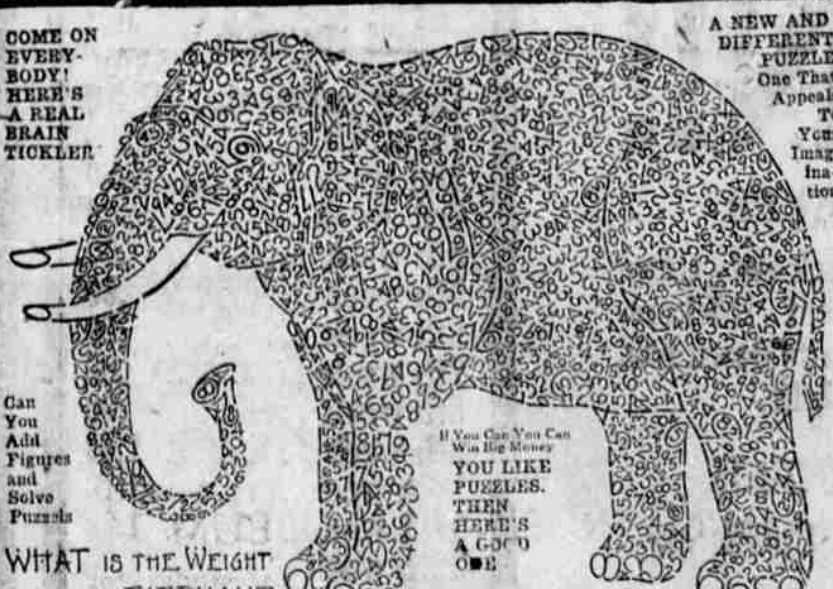
