THIS CITY has a distinguished visitor today in the person of Harry Adams, president of the Western Pacific railroad. The Evening Herald extends to President Adams a greeting and welcome.

We are glad to have such men come to Klamath so they may see the last pioneer country on its onward march of progress.

Harry Adams is no stranger in Oregon. Quite a while ago he was head of the S. P. & S. railroad with headquarters in Portland. Next we saw him join the Union Pacific organization and as head of the freight traffic department he was located in Omaha, Nebraska.

One day the writer had a little business with the Union Pacific in Omaha relative to freight rates. We entered Mr. Adams' office on a hot day in June. The weather was smoky and sticky—so much so that to walk a few blocks was a dreaded task. As we shook hands with Harry Adams in his corner office several extremely sharp flashes of lightning chased each other over the leaden Nebraska skies, thunder roared comparable to a battle of heavy artillery, and the rain fell in torrents.

When each had recovered from the flashes of lightning and the roar of thunder, Mr. Adams discoursed at some length about the joy of living on the Pacific coast, to which he subscribed our hearty approval.

He is back on the coast and we congratulate him for making the change. His work on this coast is important and he will be a great factor in the development of the western country.

Getting Set

INSTITUTIONS that have long looked with favorable feeling on locating in Klamath Falls but hesitated because the managers thought the time was not yet ripe, are now coming in.

Some of them were far sighted and secured locations and others are taking their chances on conditions as they now exist.

The business section of this city is now as large as most towns of 25,000 people. This is due entirely to the fact that Klamath Falls with its present population is as large in a commercial way as most of the western towns with 25,000 people. It is the large area that is served—the long distance to any other center—that makes this town big commercially.

And this brings to mind the need of encouraging jobbing and wholesale establishments here. It is the natural supply point for all of this growing country. Jobbing houses do not prosper without proper freight rates and to adjust freight rates is a scientific matter.

The Evening Herald once more desires to mention that now is the time to have a review of the freight rates into Klamath Falls so that encouragement may be given to the jobbing and wholesale houses that wish to enter this field.

From Over the Nation

IN HIS SPARE TIME.

Albert Payson Terhune in the American Magazine: Most of the world's great men have achieved their true life work, not in the course of their needful daily occupations, but—in their spare time. Think it over, and you will see how true it is.

A tired-out rail splitter crouched over his tattered books, by candle light or by firelight, at the day's end; preparing for his future, instead of snoring or sky-larking like his co-laborers. These laborers are forgotten. Lincoln is not. He cut out his path to later immortality—in his spare time.

A down-at-heel instructor in an obscure college varied his drudgery he hated by spending his evenings and his holidays in tinkering on a queer device of his, at which his fellow teachers laughed. I don't recall the names of any of those teachers. Neither do you. But we have not forgotten who invented the telephone—in his spare time.

Then there was a case which came under my own close observation and which is not mere history nor hearsay: the case of a woman—a clergyman's wife—who tackled the following none too easy job:

She had six children; and not only brought them up, but took sole charge of their education until they were 9 or 10 years old. Also she was an inspired housekeeper, conducting the management of her large home and doing much entertaining. In addition to this, she was supremely active in church work and in missions; and was in fact the ideal helpmate for her over-busy

clergyman husband.

She had the further handicap of years of ill health. But she performed her million duties. That is a fairly large daily job, brilliantly, shirking none of them. I think. Yet, "in her spare time" she was able to win fame as a novelist and household writer, under the pen name of "Marion Harland." (She was incidentally, my mother.)

The list could be stretched out to infinity. It could be made to include nearly every successful writer; for instance, for almost all these writers mastered their chosen profession while they were slaving all day and every day at other forms of livelihood. They qualified for success and for fame—in their spare time.

LAVA BED ROAD NOT COMPLETED

wine. Beneath it I feel almost sacred. Here, I know no evil can come; there I will rest in quiet and peace, beyond the reach of calumny's, poison shaft, the influence of envy and jealous enemies, for treason and traitors of state, backsliders and hypocrites of the church, can have no place; where the great fact will be realized that God is Truth, and gratitude is the greatest attribute of man."

Such a statement is well worth reading and re-reading and it is also well worth remembering that the man who made that statement to the public was Andrew Johnson, the impeached president of the United States, but who returned to the United States senate to meet his accusers in a most manly way.

AND now 1929 food stores in the west are to be merged. According to the late dispatches a \$25,000,000 merger of chain food stores is under way and should be consummated on May 1st. The company will be known as the MacMurr Mutual Stores, Inc. The initial volume of business will be \$50,000,000.

Who was it said that this was not the day of the merger?

THOSE who heard Secretary Andrew Mellon speak in Washington, D. C., a few evenings ago on the tax question and the condition of the public treasury will be more and more convinced that the charges against Mr. Mellon are wholly unfounded and that President Hoover did the right thing when he re-appointed him to his cabinet. We have heard nothing in years that went to the heart of the administration of this country as did Mr. Mellon's talk from the national capital.

He showed plainly that the returning of federal taxes on some incomes was just and right, and that the amount returned may seem large in public print but is only a small portion of the large tax paid by the ones receiving the reimbursement. Andrew Mellon is a great asset to the United States regardless of what his enemies may say. It is to be hoped that he will be spared to serve as secretary of the treasury for a number of years, or until the war debt will have been paid, for he is seeing that it is paid as rapidly as possible and he will rid this country of debt thus permitting the lowering of taxes when the proper time comes.

KLAMATH FIRE SEASON TO BE MUCH EARLIER

Fire season will begin a month earlier this year if calculations of Duncan McLean, head of the fire protection division of the Klamath Forest Protective association, are correct.

"Yes," commented McLean today, "fire season will begin about May 1, unless, of course, we have heavy rains and snow during April. Usually the season begins June 1."

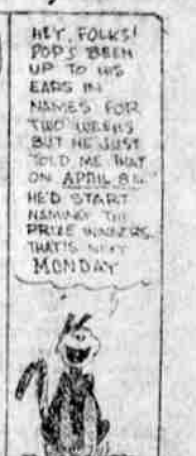

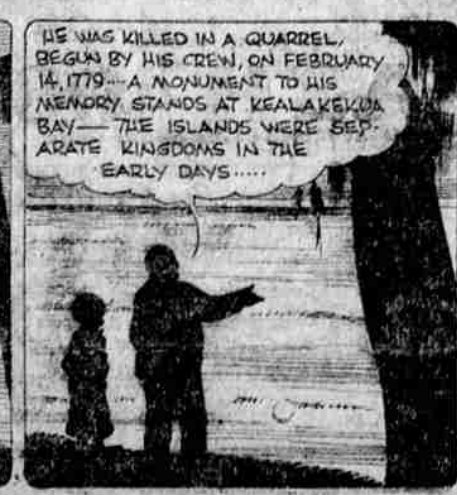

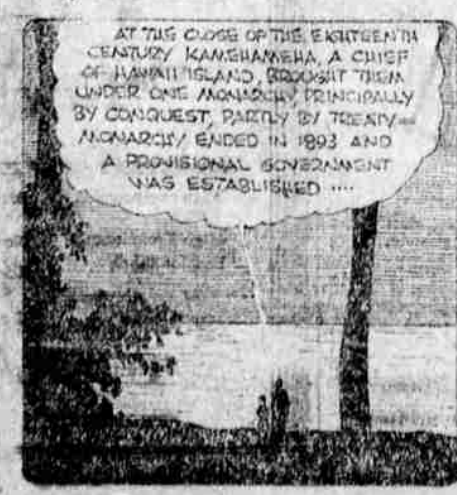
