LOTCHES SHOT BY T. CAPTAIN

over Captain's car, it is said. Wright is a well known Klamath pugilist, fighting preliminaries and special events in the bantamweight class. The two men wrangled back and forth and it soon appeared that the quarrel had reached a dangerous state.

Suddenly Captain—no authorities were told—made a dash for a 30-30 caliber rifle that was hanging in the room near a bed. Mrs. Lotches and Mrs. Captain grasped with the enraged red skin in a desperate attempt to wrest away the dangerous weapon.

Wright made a dash for the outside. As he scurried out the door, Lotches, who had been peaceable all evening, entered the house.

Suddenly one shot rang out, then another. Lotches toppled forward on his face without a sound. Captain had wrenched himself partially free from the two Indian women and, shooting from the hip, fired after Wright.

But Wright was safe outside and the death dealing bullet snuffed out the life of Lotches. The Indian did not suffer. Death was instantaneous.

Whether or not it was the first shot or the second that killed Lotches, witnesses were unable to determine. But one of the two 30-30 caliber bullets sped through the door and lodged in a beam on the porch. It was carefully cut out this morning by Mr. Rogers.

Authorities were inclined to view the affair as a typical Indian "pay-day" spree ending, as such parties often do, in a death. Every member of the Klamath tribe received a check of \$200 last Saturday, as their semi-annual payment from tribal funds in Washington, D. C., hence every Indian at the Captain ranch party last night had a "roll in his jeans."

After the shooting Bennett Weeks wrestled the gun from Captain's grasp and, along with another rifle of smaller caliber laid it against the wall on the porch. But Mrs. Captain apparently was taking no chances. She hurried out to the porch, grasped the weapons, brought them back inside and put them under a bed.

Lotches had fallen on his face. When he was found, lying in a pool of blood, it was apparent that somebody—presumably Captain—had rolled the body over on its back. Mr. Rogers said he found blood on Captain's pants leg, shoes and shirt. He was forced to remove all of his clothing before he was incarcerated.

Captain made no move to escape. He insisted, time and again that the shooting was entirely accidental, that he had no homicidal intent against either Lotches or Wright and that he was merely examining the rifle to see if it was loaded when the rifle exploded.

Smell of liquor on his breath was apparent, according to Mr. Rogers. Captain, however, averred that while he had had a few drinks he was in no sense in-

ebriated at the time of the killing.

Shortly after the shooting, Bennett Weeks hurried to Brown's store at Williamson river and called authorities. Mr. Rogers, who arrived almost simultaneously with three other reservation officers, called Earl Whitlock who, in turn notified the sheriff's office.

Mr. Whitlock, Deputy Sheriff Rosa Brown and Deputy District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters, immediately hurried north to the Indian ranch home.

They conducted a careful and comprehensive investigation of all circumstances surrounding the killing. Witnesses were reluctant to talk and the fabric of the story was woven together by inquiries only after long and tedious questioning and cross questioning.

"As usual," said Mr. Gillenwaters, "it proved very difficult to elicit facts from the eye witnesses. But by dint of careful questioning and cross examining we managed to get what we believe was a true account of the story. From what we can gather at this time it is apparent that the shots were not intended for Lotches, but for Wright."

The case was immediately reported to federal authorities and a representative of the department of justice is expected to arrive in Klamath Falls tomorrow.

The case will be prosecuted by federal authorities as the killing occurred on tribal land and both the victim and the slayer were Indians. However, as is the custom in such cases, county authorities cooperated with the government by careful investigation immediately after the crime.

Lotches had a reputation of being one of the most peaceful Indians of the Klamath tribe, according to Indian officers. He resided on his little allotment on Williamson river, with his wife and children.

Insofar as authorities can find out, he was never in trouble, and was known as a person who was more inclined to quiet a row than participate. Authorities are satisfied that he was in no way involved in any dispute with Captain last night—at least first accounts of the killing so indicate.

No charge has been filed against Captain. He is being held in the county jail awaiting the arrival of federal authorities.

Post mortem examination of the body will be conducted this afternoon by Dr. O. E. Patterson, reservation physician. Inquest will be held tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Whitlock funeral home.
