

PORTLAND MEN ARE KILLED AS PLANE CRASHES

**Airship Drops Suddenly
From Altitude of
400 Feet**

PORTLAND, Ore., April 5. (A. P.)—Lieutenant Ralph A. Floyd, an army reserve flier, and Asa F. Clement, Portland police lieutenant, were killed Thursday afternoon when an army plane they were flying out of control and crashed at Pearson Field, Vancouver, Wash., from an altitude of about 400 feet. Floyd was killed outright. Clement succumbed to his injuries four hours later at the barracks hospital. The bodies were being held until after the government has completed its investigation of the accident. Floyd had lived in Portland for ten years and was employed as an automobile salesman. His war record was distinguished and Portland aviators said he was a competent and active flier. He received his first training at San Diego, later going to France. Floyd leaves a widow, two children and his parents. Lieutenant Clement was an air enthusiast and for the past few months made regular trips to the Vancouver airport where he did considerable flying. He is survived by his widow and one son.

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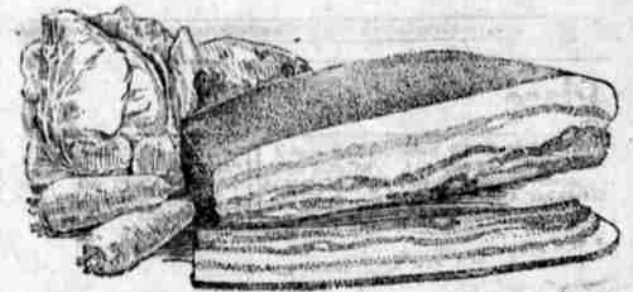
