Warneke and Church Winners in Double Main Event; Billie Breedlove Trounces Monroe

With one exception, the legion fight card last night composed well balanced, well matched battles. The exception was the so-called bridge fight between Earl Ritchie, clever and hard hitting heavyweight of the city and a short, stocky person who came into the ring under the name of "Duffing" Duncker, Dorris.

Duncker was no match for the bigger and heavier Ritchie. He was sent to canvass in the first round for the count of ten with a punch in from a hard punch to the midriff. It was several minutes before he could leave the ring. It was a mis-match and fans expressed a desire to see Ritchie matched with a better opponent.

Warneke Wins

There is something thrilling about a fighter who refuses to admit he's licked, who charges in with the same fury and determination in the tenth round as he did the first.

That was the thrill of the second main event between Mike Daley, Pelican City, and Frank Warneke.

Warneke won decisively but his hardest punches could not stop the determined Irishman.

The crowd was on edge until the last because of the possibility of an unexpected Kayo punch to Warneke's jaw that never came.

German Clever

Whatever the condition, Daley would not have won from Warneke; the German was too clever.

But it is a fact that the local boy was suffering from a severe cold, a stiff neck and was not in the "pink" for his most crucial fight.

Mike Wins Fourth

One round was about like another—except the fourth when Warneke was jarred to his heels by a couple of terrific punches to the heart. The Irish looking German boy, aged 18, would faint, stab with his left, sidestep and then cross with a hard right to the head or jaw. How Daley stood up under some of those punches is a mystery, but he did; his knees didn't even buckle. As the fight progressed, Daley's face began to show signs of the battle, lumps, cuts and black and blue spots.

There was not a murmur of dissent over the decision.

Church Wins

Billy Church, Portland battler, slashed, cut and slugged his way to a decisive victory over Jack Breedlove in the other side of the main event.

Breedlove was one of the best conditioned fighters ever to appear in a Klamath ring. He took punches that almost lifted him off the ground, and still kept boring in. He was fresher than Church at the end.

But Church was too good, too experienced, with more snap and kick to his punches, and with a terrific right and left uppercut to the body that caught Breedlove time and again as the Bend boy came in.

The semi-windup was a great match in which Billie Breedlove, Bantamweight, after taking a count of nine in the fourth, came back to win the decision from Frankie Monroe.

It was a case of a very clever boy, "outfoxing" a hardy and game slugger. Monroe tried to box Breedlove—the first few rounds, but was so far outclassed that in the third round, he changed his tactics to bull rushes.

Billie Breedlove evaded his slugs in the third but in the fourth, he was just a split second late in dodging a sizzling right hook.

Billie Drops

Billie dropped, started to get up again, changed his mind and went down on one knee to take a nine count and rest up. He came back like a whirlwind, jarred Monroe with a right smash to the chin just before the bell rang and won the last two rounds by a wide margin.

"Steamboat" Jackson won a decision over Johnny McCoy in the four round opener.

Jackson was fouled in the second, but took a rest to come back. He nearly had McCoy out in the fourth. McCoy gave away 11 pounds.

A large crowd witnessed the card.

HUSKY COACH OFFERED CASH TO QUIT POST

Enoch Bagshaw Can Pocket \$24,000 If He Resigns

SEATTLE, April 5. (AP)—Enoch Bagshaw, storm center of prolonged disension between athletes and student leaders at the University of Washington, was today considering an invitation to resign as head football coach and receive in return the \$24,000 due him under the remaining three years of his contract.

He was urged to leave his post by the student board of control last night after his second attempt to remove him had been declared illegal by a special committee of deans acting in behalf of President Lyle Spencer. Three months ago when the first attempt was made, Bagshaw declined a similar offer, although it was not officially made.

Last night with Bagshaw present, the student leaders passed a resolution and presented it to him urging him to resign as "a loyal alumnus of the university."

His continuance, the resolution said, "will cause disension among the students and alumni, will create a feeling of instability which cannot but be a weakening influence upon the spirit of those who turn out for football, will tend to cause controversies which will embarrass the administration of the university, will cause unfavorable comment upon the part of the general public and will invite criticism of himself for insisting in remaining in a position where his services are no longer desired."

Bagshaw, who was once a star halfback under Gil Dobie, has coached husky teams for eight years.

NATIONALISTA LOSES BOUT TO B. RODRIGUEZ

LOS ANGELES, April 5.—After taking a severe pasting in the earlier rounds Blas Rodriguez won the 10 round main event from young Nationalista last night by making a rushing finish.

In the seventh round Rodriguez' knees buckled from a smashing right to the head but from then on the Filipino was outfought at every stage.

RISKO DEFEATS O. VON PORAT

BOSTON, April 5. (AP)—Johnny Risko, the trial-horse of the heavyweight division, has tonight Otto Von Porat, late of Norway, and found him wanting as a serious contender for championship honors.

Johnny broke his losing streak here last night by administering a 10-round beating to Otto. Risko carried the honors in every round and his rugged in-fighting prevented Von Porat from doing much with his right hand, reputed to be a terrific weapon.

Both battlers weighed 157 pounds.

Von Porat was only able to jab Risko weakly with his right and his only telling punch was launched in the sixth round, when he landed hard on the side of Johnny's head.

The blow staggered Risko but the Norwegian refused to become aggressive.

TED THYE WINS FROM TOM ALLEY

EUGENE, Ore., April 5. (AP)—Ted Thye, former light heavy-weight wrestling champion, defeated Tom Alley, Outlook, Monday night, two out of three falls in a rough and tumble match here last night. Alley was knocked unconscious during the last period when he made a dive at Thye and went through the ropes. Thye took the first fall in 39 minutes with a wrist lock. Alley evened it up with a headlock in seven minutes after butting Thye around the ring.

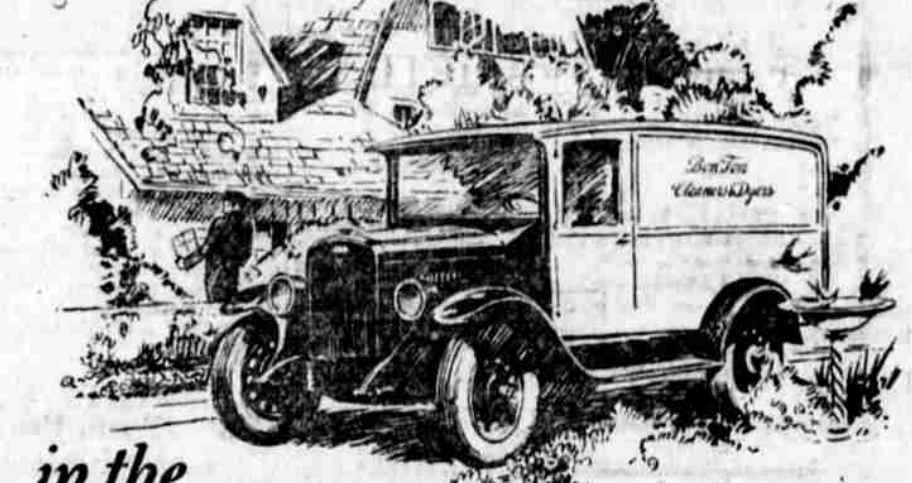
