

QUIZ CAPTAIN ABOUT KILLING

This afternoon the federal investigator was closeted with Captain Quizing the prisoner about the killing.

An inquest over the death of Lotches will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home, Pine Avenue and Sixth. Mr. Gilles, waters and County Coroner Whitlock will preside at the inquest.

No definite decision had been

reached on what charge will be preferred against Captain but authorities this afternoon stated that a charge of second degree murder would be filed with United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas either late this afternoon or Monday morning.

Captain has maintained from the start that the killing of Lotches was accidental, that he had no homicidal intent when he picked up the 30-30 caliber rifle at the Captain's ranch early yesterday morning, and that he was not trying to shoot Harold Wright, Indian pugilist as some eye witnesses to the tragedy told authorities.

The case has been taken out of the hands of state authorities and will be handled strictly as a federal case.

NOGALES, Ariz., April 6, (AP)—All United States soldiers stationed at Camp Little here have been ordered to remain in camp to await further orders, according to Colonel Klipp, commanding officer of the 25th U. S. Infantry.

TEMPLE, Tex., April 6, (AP)—A passenger coach of a south-bound Santa Fe train was wrecked about 15 miles north of here early today by a mysterious explosion. None of the 15 passengers in the car at the time of the blast was seriously injured.

Officers, after questioning passengers, advanced the theory the explosion was caused by a bomb, but were at loss as to a reason for the bombing.

All windows and one end of the coach were blown out. Other coaches of the train were not damaged. Passengers were terrified by smoke that filled the train following the blast.

call rose above the clamor, the soldiers in trenches fingered their noses at the approaching rebels. Some threw kisses. Another bugle call, for what we did not know, and the troops in trenches seemed to care less.

The rebel air raid accompanying the infantry advance attracted no attention in the trenches. The dug-in federals kept plunging away, firing over the plain in any direction that caught the individual's fancy.

Then came a rebel tank. The federal troops went into wild spasms of yelling. All rifles and carbines pointed toward it, sputtering steel-jacketed bullets. The tank backed up, then came forward again, like a dog in attack. Again the bugle call and another battle of musketry at the tank.

With red flag flitting the attacking rebels approached within 200 yards of the trenches. There were no dead in the trenches, but several rebel cavalrymen fell off their horses.

The entrenched federals laughed and hooted at us as we shot pictures. With my pictures I walked back to Naco, Arizona, bullets whizzing by. At the border, behind a building were a group of Americans, soldiers, border officials, residents. One back private shouted:

"You'd better get outta here or you'll be shooting pictures of angels." They showed me a steel-jacketed bullet which pierced a wall near them. All around the American town people stood behind walls, peering around corners to glimpse the battle.
