Lake County Youth Accidentally Killed By Brother S. EHRlich

ALBERTSON BOY KILLED INSTANTLY

Bullet Pierces Heart of Nine-Year Old Son of Henry Albertson

NARROWLY MISSES ANOTHER BROTHER

Terrible Blizzard Faced Coroner As He Forged Through to Yocum Valley Home to Take Charge of Body; Ten-Mile Trip on Horses Necessary.

LAKEVIEW, Ore., April 8, (AP)—Leo Albertson, 4 years old, shot and instantly killed his brother, Charles, 9 years old, Saturday night when he lifted a 30 calibre carbine from its place in a corner and pulled the trigger. The bullet entered Charles' left breast, piercing the heart.

The boys are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Albertson of Yocum Valley. With another brother, Leo and Charles had gone to the house to build a fire. While the two older boys were busy at the stove Leo took the rifle from its place and pointed around the room. As Charles came within range of the sights the child pressed the trigger. The bullet passed through Charles' body and over the other boy's head, narrowly missing him. The worst blizzard in history faced Coroner Ousley and Deputy Sheriff George Boone when they went to bring the body to Lakeview. A ten-mile trip on horses through the mountains was made under these conditions.

OPEN BIDS ON COUNTY ROAD

Ground Broken On First Highway Paving Project

Ground was broken today for the construction of the first state highway paving project ever undertaken in Klamath county—a four mile stretch of The Dalles-California highway from the south city limits to the junction of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway. W. D. Miller Construction company, which has the contract for the re-grading and straightening of this section of highway, was at work this morning installing culverts, digging ditches, constructing drainage structures and other preliminaries incident to actual grading operations.

Dry Denies Wet Charge

CHARGE THEFT SADDLE HORSE

Another alleged "haws stealer" case has come to the fore with the arrest yesterday south of Malin of George Millard, who is accused of stealing a saddle horse owned by Ray Telford of this city. Sheriff L. L. Low and Deputy Sheriff Ross H. Brown apprehended Millard on his ranch in the lower Klamath basin country. Halted before justice court, his bond was set at \$2000 by W. B. Barnes, magistrate.

Unable to raise the bond, Millard was committed to jail. Date for his hearing has not been set but it will be held in the near future. The prisoner indicated he authorities that he would fight the charge.

THIEF JAILED FOR 90 DAYS

Sentence of 90 days in the county jail was imposed today on Eugene Burns, following his plea of guilty to the charge of stealing a suit case and personal effects therefrom, from Thomas Martin, Baldwin hotel of this city.

Burns admitted the crime readily following his arrest Saturday night by Deputy Sheriff Brown. The robbery occurred April 1. Burns slipped up to Martin's car and filched the suit case.

BASIN HIT BY STORM; DEEP SNOW

Fifteen Inches Reported At Crest of Sand Creek Mountain

MOTORISTS WARNED TO DRIVE SLOWLY

Steep Sections of State Highway are Reported to Be Slippery and Hazardous; Many Sections in Klamath Report Snow.

Snow, varying in depth from three to 15 inches, was left in the wake of a sudden winter storm that hit Klamath yesterday and continued with sporadic intensity today.

While sun's rays and warmer winds melted much of the snow in this city by noon today, the new blanket of white remained untouched on the mountain slopes surrounding the Klamath basin.

Reports from various sections throughout the Klamath country revealed that the storm was general in southern Oregon. The snowfall in Klamath Falls was three inches; at Crescent Lake, seven inches; Chemult, five inches; summit of the Sand Creek mountain, 15 inches; Haystack mountain, five inches; Green Spring's mountain, seven inches; S. da Gulch on the Green Springs highway, five inches; and Ashland, two inches.

MINNEAPOLIS, April 8, (AP)—Rehabilitation activities were started today in communities in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa, struck by Friday night's tornado, which took 20 lives and did damage estimated at \$1,500,000.

ONLY "SCARE BOMB"

NEW YORK, April 8, (AP)—A bomb found in a parcel post package addressed to Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, contained only black powder instead of dynamite and was merely of the variety known as a "scare bomb," bomb squad detectives announced today.

DECIMAL KILLS THREE

LONDON, April 8, (AP)—An inquest held today into the deaths of three boys who came up to London for subway recently to be treated for ringworm, brought out that a misplaced decimal point in a prescription caused the fatalities.

SUICIDE ATTEMPT FAILURE

Dependent over a love affair, Forrest Hess, young man of this city, attempted to end his life Sunday morning by taking two strychnine tablets purchased at a local drug store, according to a report made to police.

Shortly before taking the tablets, Hess entered a local business house and warned the young lady, with whom he had been keeping company, that he intended to end his life.

He was traced to the Link river bridge and rushed to a local hospital. Immediate medical attention saved his life and today he was able to leave the hospital.

Einstein Theory Brings Up "Ghastly Apparition of Atheism"

HOLDS FAMOUS MAN JUST PASSING FAD

Points Out That Students and General Public are Often Led Into Channels of Misinformation by Some Person Who Can Strike a Novel Note of Intellect.

BOSTON, April 8, (AP)—William Cardinal O'Connell, dean of the Roman Catholic hierarchy in the United States, believes that behind the Einstein theory of space and time there lurks the "ghastly apparition of Atheism."

The Cardinal expressed himself yesterday in a communion breakfast address before the New England province of Catholic clubs of America in which he stressed the necessity of religious faith and assailed the "pseudo-intellectuals."

After condemning "petty, begotten professors" who have set up some new standard "to attract attention to themselves" the Cardinal turned directly to the subject of the Einstein theory.

RANDALL WILL PLEAD GUILTY

William Miles Randall, alleged forger, is ready to enter a plea of guilty.

The young man, who has already served time in the Walla Walla penitentiary, has confessed to bad check activities in Klamath and is ready to go before Circuit Judge W. M. Duncan and take his sentence. It was announced today by Harry Polvin, deputy district attorney.

Randall's wife, Rose Randall, has not signified any intention of entering a guilty plea.

According to Randall's confession, he stole a check protectograph from the Klamath Pine Lumber mill, and used that as an artifice to lend his forgeries more authenticity. Recently Randall was reported to have attempted to take his own life in the county jail by consuming about a half pint of "fly-die" a fly-killing concoction.

IN CUSTODY OF POLICE

Mysterious Disappearance of Wife Is Cause of Inquiry

MUTILATED REMAINS MAY BE IDENTIFIED

Police Quiet But Indicate That Investigation Surrounds the Discovery of Young Woman's Torso in Flooded River.

LOS ANGELES, April 8, (AP)—Sydney Ehrlich, 26, whose wife disappeared under strange circumstances several weeks ago, was arrested at his home today for questioning in connection with the slaying of a girl whose torso was found on the banks of the Los Angeles river last Thursday.

Police refused to say what circumstances had caused the arrest. Ehrlich had been released from an insanity ward of the city hospital this morning and was taken into custody on arrival at his home. Previously he had been arrested on suspicion of grand theft. The only indication given by police to their action was the discovery of "letters on Ehrlich" the contents of which were not disclosed.
