tend to be intellectual forget the very rudiments of life," he asked. "What does all this work mean? It evidently is worked up, fictitious enthusiasm because I have never met a man who understood in the least what Einstein is driving at, and I have seen so much impressed by this fact that I very seriously doubt that Einstein himself knows really what he is driving at."

"Truth is always very clear when seen with a clear eye. The fact that any theory cannot be formulated and only succeeds in befogging the mind is patent that it is not really truth."

"Now, I have my own ideas about the so-called theories of Einstein, with his relativity and his utterly befogged notions about space and time. It seems nothing short of an attempt at muddling the waters without perceiving the drift. Innocent students are led away into a realm of speculative thought, the basis of which, so far as I can see, is to produce a universal doubt about God and his creation."

"I mean that while I do not wish to accuse Einstein at present of deliberately wishing to destroy the Christian faith and the Christian basis of life, I half suspect that if he waits a little longer he unquestionably will reveal himself in this attitude. In a word, the outcome of this doubt and befogged speculation about time and space is a clock beneath which lies the ghastly apparition of atheism."

"Fantastic Philosophers. Europe has an old civilization and is used to the sudden appearance of fantastic philosophers. They gain very little credit among European minds unless they have something really solid and provable to reveal, but we all know that one of the weaknesses of the American public is to run after novelties which have nothing in them but their newness."

"The American student body is very often misled into false channels of knowledge by the sudden appearance of these glittering masters who from time to time shoot across the horizon. And then it seems that there is some sort of an unorganized clique that boosts these sudden apparitions and as quickly disallows them and forgets them."

"Einstein for Moment. Now for the moment it is Einstein. Nobody knows what he is trying to reveal, but in a certain sense that adds mystery to his name; and the intellectual world, while puzzled, is almost ready to applaud, but in a short time it will be perfectly clear that Einstein's day has come and gone and then no doubt, there will be some one else who for

Wood control—sugar beets. These were the subjects discussed in many or less detail at meeting of the Tule lake community club held at the new west side school house. Approximately 100 attended.

A Henderson, county agent of Klamath, discussed wood control plans for Klamath, pointed out the need of cooperation in stockpiling and moose country, and asked homesteaders of the district to lend their help in this respect.

H. D. Newell, superintendent of reclamation for the Klamath district, explained to homesteaders the need of another bridge across Lost river, near the dikes. The government official went on to tell how such a structure would not only be a help to homesteaders but also would facilitate government operations in that section, avoiding round about routes from one side of the river to the other. He said the project would not be endorsed unless the Tule lake homesteaders were in favor of it.

The Tule lake farmers had been in favor of a bridge higher up the river.

B. H. Mead, connected with the Holly Sugar Beet company, discussed at length with the homesteaders the prospects for sugar beet crops in Klamath. He discussed both growing and marketing features.

Following the three talks, a dance was held.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8. (UP)—Roy Moore, "king of Pacific northwest bootleggers," owes the federal government \$111,936.91 in taxes for liquor operations, he was informed today prior to receiving a jail sentence and fine along with six of his henchmen.

Of the amount due, the government, the sum of \$106,496 was listed as a tax on 16,610 gallons of liquor at \$6.40 a gallon. Moore, who operates stills in Skamania county, Washington and in Tillamook and Clackamas counties, Oregon must serve two years at McNeil Island and pay a fine of \$1,000.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., April 8. (AP)—A country school principal's search for wild flowers resulted in discovery of the body of Edith Mae Dierdorf, 10-year-old West Terre Haute news girl who disappeared January 27.

Lodged against a log in Muscatine creek near Paston, Ind., hands and feet wired together and a wound in the top of her head, the body was found by Nimrod Warren, Pleasantville, Indiana, school principal who with his wife and four children was picking wild flowers in the woods.

Officers said the girl had been tossed from the bridge into the creek which was flooded swollen at the time of her disappearance.

BELIEVE THREE MEN DROWNED

FREMONT, Ohio, April 8. (AP)—The small boat which was occupied yesterday by three Fremont men fishing in Sandusky bay, was found early today overturned and empty, floating near the mouth of the bay. The capsized craft was discovered by coast guardsmen from Marblehead, who had searched the bay most of last night.

The coast guardsmen said that the three fishermen must have lost their lives, as the small fishing craft and its occupants were about two miles off shore when they disappeared in a 50 mile gale that suddenly struck the lake and bay.

**Fire Fighters
To Use Birds
For Messages**
APPELEGATE, April 8. (NCS)—A new experiment in Forest Service work in the Crater Forest will be made in the Applegate district this summer when carrier pigeons will be sent home from forest fires with reports and general information. Ranger Lee C. Port is now making preparations at the Ranker station here to care for a pair of birds which he expects to obtain from Medford in a few weeks.
Mr. Port says that pigeons have been used in this capacity to a certain extent in other National forests, but that they have never before been tried here. The birds which will be of great value in carrying reports from fires in isolated sections, also will be used for other purposes in forestry work here, although Mr. Port expects it to take some time to train them to return to the ranger station with their messages.
