

MR. FIRESTONE VISITING WEST

Noted Automobile Tire Manufacturer on Long Tour

There are few names in the automotive world more universally known than that of Harvey S. Firestone, who is now visiting the west. Many writers have said that his audience of recognition is exceeded only by that of Henry Ford among the country's automotive leaders.

Accompanying Mr. Firestone on his tour are two sons, Harvey S. Jr., and Russell A. Firestone, both of whom are actively engaged in the Firestone organization. Harvey S. Firestone, Jr., is in charge of the great Firestone Liberator project, while Russell Firestone, among his many other activities, is vice-president of the Firestone Tire & Rubber company of California.

Mr. Firestone has long been rated as one of the world's most famous men. Long before the automobile came into being, Mr. Firestone was connected with vehicular transportation, first as manager of a Detroit carriage house and then as a manufacturer of rubber-tired wheels for carriages. He organized the Firestone Tire & Rubber company, with a capital stock of \$50,000 in August, 1900. With a small working capital, a bookkeeper, and a stenographer, this young company began to make its impression upon the industry it was destined to serve. Today the interests of the Firestone organization are world-wide with great factories in Akron, Canada, England and California, and with vast rubber plantations in Liberia and the East Indies, and with branches and warehouses throughout the world. Firestone factories now have a total daily capacity of 65,000 tires.
