Gene O'Grady, lightweight weight, pride of Ashland, will meet Najo Gorman, of Klamath Falls, who is staging a comeback to show the fans that it was not his fault that he did not appear to fight Darr recently.

Fighters, even main eventers, aren't getting rich and every chance to make money counts. Gorman fought in California and unable to go on the card here.

Gorman is in fine shape for the bout tonight and no matter whether he wins or loses will put up his usual good fight. He won the support of the fans in the last Chilquin fight when he fought like a demon, on two days notice, and although not in the best of shape after a layoff, he kept Darr busy. Darr got the decision although many of the fans thought the bout should have been a draw.

BEND MEN ARE IN CUSTODY ON STILL CHARGE

Chris Stock and Joe Miller, alleged still operators of Deschutes county, arrested several days ago 20 miles south of Bend by federal officers, will be given a preliminary hearing next Saturday morning before Bert C. Thomas, federal magistrate on charges of possession of a still, manufacture of liquor and possession of whiskey.

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F. M'CORNACK PASSES AWAY

per Klamath lake and it took him little time to choose that location for his home.

For forty years Mr. McCormack has resided in Klamath county and during that time has been an active participant in the growth of Klamath from a raw, pioneering country, to its present state of prominence. He served one term as county commissioner and, indirectly, has been an active force in public affairs outside of the public office he held.

Few Klamath citizens have attained the popularity of Mr. McCormack. It was a popularity born of unselfish acts, a desire to help the man who was in dire need of assistance.

Mr. McCormack was not "money-minded"; what wealth he had acquired during his lifetime was simply a means to an end and that end was always to lend timely help to his neighbors.

Scores of incidents were told today of how Mr. McCormack quietly loaned money to poverty-stricken farmers. Some times the money was returned, but often, very often, it was not, and Mr. McCormack took the loss with a smile and let it go at that.

Mr. McCormack was famous for his trait of helping out the so-called "under dog." One of his admirers today commented: "If Frank had been half as solicitous over his own welfare as he was over his friends', he would have amassed a fortune during his many years residence in Klamath Falls. But, at that, I believe his life was happier, for he derived real and lasting enjoyment over the good deeds he has done during his life."

Mr. McCormack's death comes as a shock to thousands of his friends. Not until he was rushed to the hospital yesterday was his condition realized. Several days ago, he was seen in his rough farming clothes chatting, as usual, with friends.

Mr. McCormack is a direct descendant of the famous McCormack clan of Scotland. The ancestral McCormack farm named Annaghish was located three miles from Kirkcubbin and seven miles from Newton Stewart in Wigtownshire, Scotland. It dates back to 1250.

Frank McCormack was one of 12 children. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew McCormack, who crossed the plains in 1852, taking six months to reach Olympia, Wash. They moved to Eugene, Ore., where Mr. McCormack was born, January 21, 1863.

In 1889, Mr. McCormack moved to Klamath county and on December 24, 1899 married Ross Wolf.

Besides his widow, Mr. McCormack leaves two sons, Eugene P. McCormack of Dilley, Ore., Frank H. McCormack Jr., of Klamath Falls; two daughters, Mrs. C. F. O'Laughlin, Klamath Falls and Mrs. R. P. Oliver, Klamath Falls; two grandchildren, Clyde Austin McCormack and Marjorie Ann McCormack; one brother, J. K. McCormack, Palouse, Wash., five sisters, Mrs. Janet M. Collier, Mrs. Helen Stevenson, Mrs. Leatha Wells, Miss Mary McCormack, all of Eugene, and Mrs. Agnes Geary of Portland. Five nephews reside in Klamath county. They include Everett Geary, E. A. Geary, George Stevenson, Andrew Collier and Alfred Collier.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Whether or not services will be at the Presbyterian church or the Earl Whitlock Funeral home had not been decided today. The Rev. D. V. Haight, pastor of the First Presbyterian church will preside.

The body will be interred in Linkville cemetery.

its case against an anticipated prosecution attack failed today when, after hearing considerable argument, the court ruled that Nick Harris, detective, could not be re-cross examined.

Harris was on the stand yesterday as a prosecution witness. He testified that he had not made reports to Judge Hardy of his findings in investigations for Angelus Temple after Mrs. Alimee Semple McPherson reappeared in 1926. The defense today tried to show that he had co-operated with the district attorney and peace officials of Los Angeles during his investigation as further proof that he did not obstruct justice.

SACRAMENTO, April 11. (A.P.)—Wallace Moore, newspaperman, declared on the witness stand of the Judge Carlos S. Hardy impeachment trial today that he is convinced the woman he saw with Kenneth Orniston in Santa Barbara during the disappearance of Alimee Semple McPherson was none other than the evangelist herself.

SEATTLE, April 11. (A.P.)—The breach of promise suit for \$50,000 brought against Mrs. Minnie E. Kennedy, mother of Alimee Semple McPherson, Los Angeles tabernacle evangelist, by the Rev. H. H. Clark, Seattle exchange minister, is "purely a damage action" and was not instituted with any intention of blackmail or compromise, Gordon McGauvran, Mr. Clark's attorney, declared here today.

McGauvran said that the suit was filed with the intention of following it through to its conclusion in the ordinary court processes.

Mrs. Kennedy characterized the charges made by Clark as "blackmail" and declared she had never paid blackmail and did not intend to do so now.

Clark charged that Mrs. Kennedy broke her promise to marry him after he had agreed to the marriage largely on the understanding that she would provide him with a tabernacle in Seattle and a gospel ship for missionary work.

He charged that Mrs. Kennedy had kept several "love trysts" with him in Seattle hotels, she having arranged the meetings.

FEDERAL MEN HOLD MEETING

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42 KILLED IN BIG TORNADO

the rain soaked soil, by debris which blocked the roads and by swollen streams.

The death list was expected to mount as the parties searched the desolate areas. Injured persons were being rushed to hospitals at Newport and Batesville.

Thirty-two caskets were sent by train from Little Rock early today with stretchers and first aid supplies and physicians and nurses.

Not a house was left standing at Possum Trot, and in Suede the only building to escape was the school house. Churches at both places were destroyed.

Red Cross officials at Batesville reported to the Associated Press early today that of 35 injured in hospitals there from Geion, several were so seriously injured that little hope was held for their recovery.

At Newport many seriously injured were in hospitals.

A vacant store building at Swifton was converted into a temporary morgue where mutilated bodies were placed, while attention was given the injured, most of whom were taken to hospitals in nearby places.

All the dead and injured in the Swifton section were farmers and their families. Several large families were crushed to death under the debris of their homes. The tornado disturbances affected an area within a radius of 50 miles of Swifton, rising out of the southwest about two miles from there.

It moved slowly along a path some 200 yards wide over a serpentine course for a distance of about 5 miles, observers said.

The worst destruction was along the Possum Trot-Suede road leading to Allica, 6 miles north of Swifton.

For a distance of two miles the giant cloud roared its way in a straight line along the highway, crumpling in its path some 25 dwellings situated on either side of the road. Hardly a family along the way escaped without the loss of one or more lives.
